

# DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE



## COLONEL MICHAEL D. ROBINSON, DIRECTOR

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Act 53 of 1917 established the State Troops as a wartime constabulary. The State Troops were to provide internal state security against the dangers of espionage and sabotage, labor agitation and unrest, and military draft dodging. Act 26 of 1919 created the Department of Public Safety and gave it expanded responsibilities. Act 59 of 1935 created the Department of Michigan State Police with a commissioner as its executive head. Act 380 of 1965 reorganized state government into 19 principal departments, the Department of State Police was established, and the title of commissioner was changed to director.

The director is appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate and serves at the pleasure of the governor. The director and department are under the immediate control and direction of the governor. Its members may also be employed by the attorney general in any investigation or matter under his or her jurisdiction. The director and all sworn officers have, and exercise, the powers of a peace officer in the enforcement of criminal laws of the state, including those for the discovery and prevention of crime. Any sworn officer of the department may serve and execute all criminal and civil process when directed to do so by the governor, or the attorney general, in actions and matters in which the state is a party.

The purpose of the department is to provide 24-hour statewide quality police service for the safety and protection of the people and their property in the state of Michigan. Its primary responsibilities are to reduce the opportunities for crime, to reduce traffic accidents through diligent and fair enforcement of the laws of this state, and to act as a first responder to any citizen's needs that can be addressed through the resources of the criminal justice system.

The director is the executive head and, as such, is also the State Fire Marshal and State Director of Emergency Management. The director, or his or her designee, is a member of the Michigan State Safety Commission, Aeronautics Commission, Michigan Justice Training Commission, Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board, Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, Fire Fighters Training Council, Electrical Administrative Board, Construction Code Commission, Emergency Telephone Service Committee, Automobile Theft Prevention Authority, and the Criminal Justice Information Systems Policy Council.

The **Office of the Director** consists of 3 divisions—the Executive Division, Office of Highway Safety Planning, and the Emergency Management Division.

The **Executive Division** provides staff support for the director and department commanders in areas of policy development, legislative analysis and liaison, legal and operational research, managerial productivity information, public affairs, security for the governor, and staff support for the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority. The **Office of Highway Safety Planning** serves as a coordinating agency for traffic safety in the state and distributes federal funds for development, implementation, and evaluation of traffic safety projects. The **Emergency Management Division** works in the area of emergency preparedness for the prevention, mitigation and relief of, or recovery from, disasters that occur in the state.

The **Office of Organizational Development** consists of the Human Resources Division, Training Division, Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, and Office of Behavioral Science. The *Human Resources Division* provides supervisory control of personnel activities relating to recruiting, selection, classification, employee benefits, and labor relations. The *Training Division* provides recruit in-service, managerial, and career development training and houses a criminal justice library. The *Commission on Law Enforcement Standards*, a policy-making body, develops and sets the minimum employment standards for police officers and certifies law enforcement academies which provide police education. The *Office of Behavioral Science* provides individual psychological counseling, training, employee development services, and direct investigative support services.

The **Uniform Services Bureau** is responsible for all patrol and uniformed support services for the department. The bureau is administered by a deputy director who coordinates and supervises the bureau. The Uniform Services Bureau consists of 7 districts, the Motor Carrier Division, and the Special Operations Division. The 7 districts are composed of the troopers and motor carrier enforcement officers operating from the 64 state police posts and teams throughout the state. The *Motor Carrier Division* ensures compliance of laws governing the size, weight, safety, and ownership of commercial vehicles, economic regulations, and criminal laws associated with commercial vehicles and their operations. This division has responsibility for scalehouse, road patrol, investigative support, hazardous materials transportation and inspection, and school bus inspection activities. The *Special Operations Division* supplies dispatch, communication network, aircraft, crime prevention, canine, underwater recovery, juvenile support, substance abuse education, and specialized traffic services for the department.

The **Investigative Services Bureau** is comprised of all the divisions that provide investigative services for the department. The bureau is administered by a deputy director who coordinates and supervises bureau activities. It consists of the Field Detective Division, two Criminal Investigation Divisions, Fire Marshal Division, and Forensic Science Division. The *Field Detective Division* is composed of detectives assigned to posts and districts throughout the state. The *Criminal Investigation Divisions* consist of detectives assigned to the specialized investigative units and task forces throughout the state. The *Fire Marshal Division* conducts arson investigations and provides training in fire investigation to local police and fire agencies. The *Forensic Science Division* provides scientific crime detection for the department and local police agencies through 7 regional crime laboratories.

The **Administrative and Information Services Bureau** is responsible for all of the divisions that provide support and training services for the department and law enforcement agencies statewide. It is administered by a deputy director who coordinates and supervises the bureau. It consists of the Budget Office, Central Records Division, Communication Division, Criminal Justice Data Center, and the Management Services Division. The *Budget Office* is responsible for the overall development and management of the department's budget. The *Central Records Division* maintains and supervises all criminal and noncriminal records, freedom of information requests, firearm and licensing information, and uniform crime reporting. The *Criminal Justice Data Center* is responsible for computer data processing conducted by the department, including the Law Enforcement Information Network and the Automated Fingerprint Identification System. The *Management Services Division* provides financial management of the department's operations, such as quartermaster, tailoring, inventory warehouse, purchasing, payroll, and pension activities, as well as the responsibility for maintaining and improving department facilities.

Agencies of the Department of State Police include the Automobile Theft Prevention Authority Board of Directors, Criminal Justice Information Systems Policy Council, Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Commission, Fire Fighters Training Council, State Fire Safety Board, Michigan Justice Training Commission, Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, Michigan Truck Safety Commission, and the Michigan State Safety Commission.

Act 174 of 1992 reestablished the **Automobile Theft Prevention Authority** as a separate body within the Department of State Police. Six of the 7 members comprising the board of directors are appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate, to serve 4-year terms. Upon expiration of a term, a member may continue to serve until a successor is appointed. The seventh member is the director of the Department of State Police.

The purpose of the authority is to provide a plan of operation to combat automobile theft within the state, including an assessment of the scope of the problem, an analysis of the methods to combat it, and means to provide financial support to fight automobile theft.

The Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) Policy Council was established pursuant to Act 163 of 1974 to create policy and promulgate rules regarding the operational procedures to be followed by agencies using the law enforcement information network, to review applications for network terminals and approve or disapprove the applications and the sites for terminal installations and to establish minimum standards for terminal sites and installations. The Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) Policy Council was established pursuant to Act 307 of 1988 to, among other things, create policy and promulgate rules regarding the operation and audit procedures to be followed by agencies using the AFIS, to design and provide for statewide identification of individuals using an AFIS, to establish minimum standards for AFIS sites and installation, to review proposed applications for the AFIS and approve or disapprove the applications and the sites for system installations and to establish policy and promulgate rules restricting the dissemination of identification information to individuals and agencies.

The LEIN Policy Council and the AFIS Policy Council were abolished by E.R.O. No. 1998-1 (MCL §28.161), effective April 13, 1998, and the powers and duties of both policy councils were transferred to the **Criminal Justice Information Systems (CJIS) Policy Council** created within the Department of State Police by E.R.O. No. 1998-1. In addition to the responsibilities transferred to it by the executive reorganization order, the CJIS Policy Council serves in an advisory capacity to the Director of the Department of State Police on issues related to the development and deployment of information management systems that facilitate the rapid exchange of accurate information between the various components of the criminal justice community.



The **Emergency Telephone Service Committee** was originally created by Act 32 of 1986 to make recommendations to the legislature on the coordination and establishment of a statewide emergency telephone system. The authorizing legislation was repealed December 31, 1998.



The **Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards (COLES)**, formerly the Law Enforcement Officers Training Council (MLEOTC), has the statutory responsibility (P.A. 203 of 1965, as amended) to prepare and publish mandatory minimum recruitment, selection, and training standards for entry-level law enforcement officers in the state of Michigan. The commission sets these standards for traditional municipal, county and state agencies, and a variety of specialized

agencies, such as tribal, railroads, airports, and park police. More than 600 law enforcement agencies that employ over 20,000 officers must comply with the commission's standards.

The Commission is an 11-member governing body that represents a cross section of the law enforcement community. The commission consists of 3 sheriffs, 3 chiefs of police, and representatives of 3 police employee organizations who are appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate. The attorney general and the director of the Michigan state police also serve by virtue of their office. The commission has independent authority to establish standards and policy to regulate the selection and training of law enforcement officers.

The **Michigan State Safety Commission** was created by Act 188 of 1941. It is the duty of the commission to consult and cooperate with all departments of state government in the promotion of greater safety on the public streets and highways and elsewhere; to cooperate with safety officials of the federal government and local governments; to encourage safety education, and to do whatever is possible or necessary for more effective safety conditions; and to form the Michigan Safety Council.
