Whereas, Manufacturing is a cornerstone of our economy in Michigan and the United States of America. Nearly 608,500 men and women are directly employed in the manufacturing industry. Michigan's manufacturing total output exceeds \$92.55 billion annually. Michigan has created more than 156,500 new manufacturing jobs in the last eight years, an increase of 34.6 percent thus remaining the national leader in manufacturing job creation and outpacing all other states; now, therefore, be it

House Concurrent Resolution No. 11.

A concurrent resolution to urge the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and federal prosecutors to either enforce the federal statute criminalizing marijuana or the U.S. Congress to amend the Controlled Substances Act of 1970 to defer to the states the right to regulate marijuana within its borders under state law.

(For text of concurrent resolution, see House Journal No. 59, p. 1073.)

With the recommendation that the following substitute (H-2) be adopted and that the concurrent resolution then be adopted.

Substitute for House Concurrent Resolution No. 11.

A concurrent resolution to urge the Congress of the United States to clarify its position on the legality of marijuana under the Controlled Substances Act of 1970.

Whereas, Despite federal law criminalizing marijuana, many states have exercised their authority to enact marijuana laws that reflect the needs and interests of their citizens. Currently, the state of Michigan is among a majority of states that have chosen to regulate marijuana under state law; and

Whereas, The federal government's lack of clarity and inconsistency in its interpretation of the legality of marijuana under the Controlled Substances Act of 1970 has created confusion and uncertainty for states legislating marijuana operations. This, in turn, affects law enforcement, banking, taxation, and zoning; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate concurring), That we urge the Congress of the United States to clarify its position on the legality of marijuana under the Controlled Substances Act of 1970; and be it further
