## PART 2

## PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

**GENERAL SECTIONS**

28 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state  
 29 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under



1 part 1 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 is \$0.00 and  
2 total state spending from state sources to be paid to local units  
3 of government is \$0.00.

4 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized  
5 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,  
6 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made  
7 under this part and part 1 are subject to the management and budget  
8 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

9 Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under  
10 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount  
11 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent  
12 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and  
13 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within this act for the  
14 particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.

15 Sec. 204. Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to  
16 applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action  
17 shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified,  
18 including noncompliance identified in an audit finding. If any  
19 instance of noncompliance is identified, including noncompliance  
20 identified in an audit finding, the state budget director shall  
21 take necessary and immediate action to rectify it. The state budget  
22 director shall notify the senate and house appropriations  
23 committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies when an  
24 instance of noncompliance is identified.

25 Sec. 205. The state budget director shall report on the status  
26 of funds appropriated in part 1, and all funds appropriated related  
27 to the coronavirus relief effort, to the senate and house  
28 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies  
29 on a monthly basis until all funds are exhausted.



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**DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

3           Sec. 301. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal  
4 COVID epidemiology and laboratory capacity grant, not more than  
5 \$20,000,000.00 may be allocated for Michigan department of  
6 corrections testing.

7           Sec. 302. The funds appropriated in part 1 for federal COVID  
8 immunization and vaccine grant shall not be used to vaccinate an  
9 individual for the COVID-19 virus under a mandatory vaccination  
10 program of his or her employer or of state government.

11           Sec. 303. A recipient of a COVID-19 vaccine administered from  
12 the funds appropriated in part 1 for federal COVID immunization and  
13 vaccine grant shall be provided with information or informed if and  
14 in what manner the development of the vaccine utilized aborted  
15 fetal tissue or human embryonic stem cell derivation lines.

16           Sec. 304. (1) The department of health and human services  
17 shall report on a weekly basis to the senate and house  
18 appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies,  
19 the senate and house policy offices, and the state budget office on  
20 all of the following:

21           (a) The metrics used for calculating vaccine distribution to  
22 local health departments and enrolled providers and an analysis by  
23 county that shows how allocations were calculated.

24           (b) The number of vaccines distributed during the previous  
25 week to each local health department and enrolled provider. The  
26 number of vaccines distributed under this subdivision must be  
27 listed for each local health department and for each enrolled  
28 provider.

29           (c) The estimated number of vaccines to be distributed during



1 the current week to each local health department and enrolled  
2 provider. The estimated number of vaccines to be distributed under  
3 this subdivision must be listed for each local health department  
4 and for each enrolled provider.

5 (d) The estimated number of vaccines to be distributed next  
6 week to each local health department and enrolled provider. The  
7 estimated number of vaccines to be distributed under this  
8 subdivision must be listed for each local health department and for  
9 each enrolled provider.

10 (e) The number and estimated percentage of individuals  
11 vaccinated, categorized by each vaccination phase.

12 (f) The number and estimated percentage of individuals  
13 residing or working in nursing homes that have been vaccinated.

14 (g) The number and estimated percentage of individuals 65  
15 years of age and older that have been vaccinated.

16 (h) The total amount that has been expended from the funds  
17 appropriated in part 1 for federal COVID immunization and vaccine  
18 distribution and administration. The amount described in this  
19 subdivision shall be broken down by state general funds and federal  
20 funds.

21 (2) The reports required by this section must be made  
22 accessible to the public by placing the reports on an internet  
23 site.

24 Sec. 305. By March 1, 2021, the department of health and human  
25 services shall report to the senate and house appropriations  
26 committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, the senate and  
27 house policy offices, and the state budget office on an analysis on  
28 efficiencies of primary care physicians and independent pharmacists  
29 being more involved in the distribution process.



1           Sec. 306. The Michigan vaccination phase 1b shall have not  
2 more than 2 priority groups in order to ensure efficiency,  
3 effectiveness, and equity of the vaccine implementation schedule.

4           Sec. 307. (1) By March 1, 2021, the department of health and  
5 human services shall report to the senate and house appropriations  
6 committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, the senate and  
7 house policy offices, and the state budget office on the formula,  
8 or other detailed methodology, used to distribute vaccines to each  
9 local health department and each enrolled provider. The report must  
10 also include an example of how the formula, or other detailed  
11 methodology, would distribute a statewide total of 100,000 vaccines  
12 to each local health department and each enrolled provider.

13           (2) Within 1 business day of any changes made by the  
14 department of health and human services to the formula, or other  
15 detailed methodology, used to distribute vaccines to each local  
16 health department and each enrolled provider, the department of  
17 health and human services shall report to the senate and house  
18 appropriations committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies,  
19 the senate and house policy offices, and the state budget office on  
20 the changes made to the formula, or other detailed methodology,  
21 used to distribute vaccines to each local health department and  
22 each enrolled provider, the rationale for the change to the  
23 formula, or other detailed methodology, used to distribute vaccines  
24 to each local health department and each enrolled provider, and an  
25 example of how the revised formula, or other detailed methodology,  
26 would distribute a statewide total of 100,000 vaccines to each  
27 local health department and each enrolled provider.

28           (3) By March 1, 2021, the department of health and human  
29 services shall report to the senate and house appropriations





1 committees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, the senate and  
 2 house policy offices, and the state budget office on the advantages  
 3 and disadvantages of incorporating a specific minimum, or baseline,  
 4 number of vaccines to be distributed on a weekly basis for each  
 5 specific local health department and enrolled provider.

6 (4) The reports required by this section must be made  
 7 accessible to the public by placing the reports on an internet  
 8 site.

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10 **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY**

11 Sec. 401. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for  
 12 emergency rental and utility assistance, the department of labor  
 13 and economic opportunity shall collaborate with the department of  
 14 health and human services, the judiciary, local community action  
 15 agencies, local nonprofit agencies, and legal aid organizations to  
 16 create a rental and utility assistance program.

17 (2) Not more than \$4,000,000.00 shall be distributed in grants  
 18 to legal aid organizations for legal services provided as part of  
 19 the program.

20 (3) Not more than \$4,000,000.00 shall be distributed to local  
 21 community action agencies for program case management staff and  
 22 related costs.

23 (4) Not more than \$2,000,000.00 shall be allocated to the  
 24 department of labor and economic opportunity for administrative  
 25 costs and to support a public awareness campaign.

26 (5) Remaining funds appropriated under this section shall be  
 27 used to pay for rent arrearages, utility arrearages, and rent  
 28 subsidies to minimize evictions due to economic hardship due to  
 29 COVID-19 in a rental and utility assistance program that does all



1 of the following:

2 (a) Offers voluntary participation on the part of landlords.

3 (b) Works within the procedures created by the Michigan  
4 supreme court and state court administrative office to assist in  
5 preventing evictions.

6 (c) Creates a structured payment program for COVID-19 rent  
7 debt under which landlords would agree to all the following:

8 (i) To receive partial payment in exchange for direct payment.

9 (ii) Not to evict a resident who is successfully making  
10 payments under the payment plan.

11 (iii) To waive fees and penalties.

12 (iv) Not to initiate any action that would affect the credit  
13 report of the renter or to pursue collections for the period  
14 covered under the payment program.

15 (6) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for emergency  
16 rental and utility assistance are designated as a work project  
17 appropriation. Any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse  
18 at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for  
19 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects  
20 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section  
21 451a(1) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL  
22 18.1451a:

23 (a) The purpose of the work project is to create an emergency  
24 rental and utility assistance program, which includes rental and  
25 utility assistance payments, housing stability services, and case  
26 management to eligible renter households impacted by COVID-19.

27 (b) The projects will be accomplished by utilizing state  
28 employees or by contracts.

29 (c) The total estimated cost of the work project is

2 (d) The tentative completion date is March 31, 2022.
