THE APPARENT PROBLEM:

The Natural Resources Management and Environmental Code Commission was formed under Executive Order 1991-32, and was charged with the task of creating a cohesive code that integrated existing natural resources management and environmental protection laws into a more understandable and workable statute. The ultimate goal was the creation of a code that was simpler and more user-friendly than existing statutes. Commission members were appointed in December, 1992, reviewed and analyzed current laws during the following year, and prepared and presented a draft code for public review. The structural outline, or "functional taxonomy", of the draft assembled various laws in a logical framework, so that laws of similar purpose were located together. Public Act 451 of 1994 created the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, and incorporated some of the concepts (commonly referred to as Part 1 of the recommendations) in the code commission's recommendations into Articles I and II of the new statute. It included acts that had been established since the code's introduction, and Executive Order 1994-7, relating to the administration of the state's underground storage tank programs. Legislation has been proposed that would complete Part 2 of the recommendations by incorporating the remainder of the statutes which

relate to natural resources management and recreation into Articles I, II, and III.

THE CONTENT OF THE BILLS:

House Bills 4348, 4349, 4350, 4351 and 4385 would amend the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (NREPA) to recodify current natural resources management statutes concerning wildlife conservation, recreation, habitat protection, and environmental issues, respectively, repealing and reenacting existing laws by inserting them into the (The 1994 act was enacted as the NREPA. beginning of the recodification of the statutes into one code, and contained parts of Articles I and II). In addition, House Bills 4348-4351 would delete references to -- and, in instances, repeal -- various natural resources' acts which created certain committees, boards and commissions; and House Bill 4385 would transfer the powers and duties of these committees, boards and commissions to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). Most of the language of existing laws would be retained under the bills, although many archaic references would be deleted. The bills are tie-barred to each other. The following is a brief outline of the contents of the bills, including the public act numbers from which each subsection was derived.

House Bill 4385. House Bills 4348-4351 would repeal laws that created certain boards and commissions. House Bill 4385 would amend NREPA (MCL 324.502 et al.) to delete references to those acts and to transfer the powers and duties of these entities to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). House Bill 4385 would also make various technical amendments to NREPA.

Transfers of Duties to DNR. Under the bill, the powers and duties of the following commissions, boards, and committees would be transferred to the DNR: the Nongame Fish and Wildlife Advisory Committee; the Great Lakes Fishery Advisory Committee: the Hunting Area Control Committee: the Forest and Mineral Resource Development Fund Board: the State Forest Products Industry Development Council; the Advisory Board created under former Public Act 61 of 1939; the Mineral Well Advisory Board (Note: House Bill 4348 would abolish the Mineral Well Advisory Board); the Michigan Unitization Law Appeal Board; the Inventory Advisory Committee; the Marine Safety Education Commission: the Marine Safety Advisory Council; the Wilderness and Natural Areas Advisory Board; the State Recreation and Cultural Arts Advisory Committee; the Air Pollution Control Commission; the Water Resources Commission; the Critical Materials Advisory Committee; the Clean Michigan Fund Act Advisory Panel; and the Hazardous Waste Policy Committee.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

According to House Fiscal Agency estimates, the bills would have no impact on state funds. (2-23-95)

ARGUMENTS:

For:

By drawing the statutes pertaining to conservation and the environment together into a coherent, uniform code, the bills would complete the incorporation of the state's natural resources laws introduced under Public Act 451 of 1994. By doing so, the responsibilities for providing adequate protection of the environment can be clearly and rationally assigned. The bills make no changes to existing laws; they do change the structure of the law by bringing together separate natural resources and environmental statutes into an orderly framework.

Against:

The bills reflect both the Environmental Code Commission's recommendations and the provisions of two executive orders (E.O. 1991-22 and 1991-31). which reorganized the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and eliminated several boards and commissions. Many people are of the view that the DNR reorganization was not in the public interest, since it virtually eliminated public review of environmental decisions. These views were strengthened by the recent revelation that the Natural Resources Commission improperly held a closed session at its January, 1995 meeting. (The commission has since acknowledged its mistake and has agreed to make the minutes of the closed meeting available to the public.) Some feel that the DNR should be governed by the same requirements regarding open meetings and public disclosure that bind other state agencies, and would support a version of House Bill 4385 that would explicitly require DNR compliance with both the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) and the Open Meetings Act.

Further, Public Act 12 of 1993 established the Clean Air Assistance Program and the Small Business Clean Air Compliance Advisory Panel -- consisting primarily of members of the small business community -- to assist small businesses in complying with the state's air quality enforcement program. In testimony presented to the House Conservation, Environment, and Great Lakes Committee, a member of the panel expressed the opinion that public participation would be increased if more funds were allocated toward augmenting DNR's computer systems to allow citizens to participate in public meetings via Internet.
