

HOUSE BILL No. 4601

March 14, 1995, Introduced by Reps. Wallace, Anthony, DeHart, Dobronski, Parks, Leland, Baird, Scott, Yokich, Brater, Martinez, Dolan, Hill, DeMars, Freeman, Saunders and Bobier and referred to the Committee on Health Policy.

A bill to provide for the execution of a declaration directing certain medical procedures be provided, withdrawn, or withheld under certain circumstances; to provide that certain actions be taken and certain actions not be taken with respect to a declaration; to provide for the revocation of a declaration; to prohibit certain persons and organizations from requiring the execution of such an order as a condition of receiving coverage, benefits, or services; to prohibit certain actions by certain insurers; to exempt certain persons from penalties and liabilities; and to prescribe liabilities.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 "Michigan medical self-determination act".
- 3 Sec. 2. As used in this act:

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- 1 (a) "Attending physician" means the physician who has
- 2 responsibility for the treatment and care of a declarant.
- 3 (b) "Declarant" means an individual who has executed a 4 declaration.
- 5 (c) "Health facility" means a health facility or agency as
- 6 defined in section 20106 of the public health code, Act No. 368
- 7 of the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.20106 of the
- 8 Michigan Compiled Laws.
- 9 (d) "Medical intervention" means medicine, a procedure, or a
- 10 device that a physician is not prohibited by law from prescrib-
- 11 ing, administering, performing, or authorizing.
- (e) "Permanently unconscious" means a state in which all
- 13 awareness of self or environment beyond simple reflex or reaction
- 14 to noxious stimuli is absent, which state is expected, in the
- 15 opinion of the attending physician, to last indefinitely without
- 16 improvement.
- (f) "Physician" means a person licensed in this state to
- 18 engage in the practice of medicine or osteopathic medicine and
- 19 surgery.
- 20 (g) "Terminally ill" means a state in which an incurable,
- 21 irreversible, and uncontrollable disease or condition will, in
- 22 the opinion of the attending physician, likely result in death
- 23 within 1 year.
- Sec. 3. (1) An individual 18 years of age or older who is
- 25 of sound mind may execute a declaration to authorize 1 or more
- 26 types or all types of medical intervention, to authorize the
- 27 withholding or withdrawal of 1 or more types or all types of

- 1 medical intervention, or to authorize ! or more types of medical
 2 intervention and the withholding or withdrawal of ! or more types
- 3 of medical intervention.
- 4 (2) A declaration executed under this section shall be writ-
- 5 ten, dated, and executed voluntarily. The declaration shall be
- 6 signed by the declarant, or in the declarant's presence at his or
- 7 her direction. The declaration shall be signed by 2 persons 18
- 8 years of age or older who witness the signing of the
- 9 declaration. At least 1 witness shall not be the declarant's
- 10 spouse, parent, child, sibling, or devisee.
- 11 Sec. 4. A valid declaration shall be implemented after all
- 12 of the following occur:
- (a) The attending physician knows the declaration exists.
- (b) The declarant has been determined by his or her attend-
- 15 ing physician and I other physician to be terminally ill or per-
- 16 manently unconscious.
- (c) In the opinion of the attending physician, the declarant
- 18 is unable to participate in medical treatment decisions.
- (d) The attending physician has no knowledge that the decla-
- 20 ration has been revoked.
- 21 Sec. 5. (1) A declarant may revoke a declaration at any
- 22 time and in any manner by which he or she is able to communicate
- 23 an intent to revoke the declaration. If the revocation is not in
- 24 writing, an individual who observes a revocation of a declaration
- 25 shall describe the circumstances of the revocation in writing and
- 26 sign the writing.

- 1 (2) A revocation of a declaration is binding upon a
- 2 physician or a health facility upon actual notice of the
- 3 revocation.
- 4 Sec. 6. (1) A physician or health facility that is provided
- 5 a copy of a declaration shall immediately make the declaration
- 6 part of the declarant's medical record. A physician or health
- 7 facility that has notice of a revocation of a declaration shall
- 8 immediately make the revocation part of the declarant's medical
- 9 record and note the revocation on the declaration.
- 10 (2) Upon determining that a declarant is terminally ill, an
- II attending physician who has notice of a declaration shall record
- 12 in the declarant's medical record that the declarant is termi-
- 13 nally ill and shall attempt to communicate that determination to
- 14 the declarant. Upon determining that a declarant is permanently
- 15 unconscious, an attending physician who has notice of a declara-
- 16 tion shall record in the declarant's medical record that the
- 17 declarant is permanently unconscious.
- (3) Upon determining that a declarant is terminally ill and
- 19 unable to participate in medical treatment decisions, an attend-
- 20 ing physician who has notice of a declaration shall record in the
- 21 declarant's medical record that the declarant is unable to par-
- 22 ticipate in medical treatment decisions, and shall attempt to
- 23 communicate to the declarant that the declaration is about to
- 24 take effect.
- Sec. 7. An attending physician shall implement a declara-
- 26 tion as provided in section 4, or shall take all reasonable steps
- 27 to transfer the care and treatment of the declarant to another

- physician or health facility willing to comply with the terms of the declaration.
- 3 Sec. 8. A person or health facility is not subject to civil
- 4 or criminal liability for causing, or participating in, the pro-
- 5 vision of medical intervention to, or the withholding or with-
- 6 drawal of medical intervention from, a declarant in accordance
- 7 with the declarant's declaration and with this act.
- 8 Sec. 9. A declarant or a declarant's spouse, parent, child,
- 9 or friend may bring an action for injunctive relief to ensure
- 10 compliance with the terms of a declaration.
- 11 Sec. 10. (1) An individual shall not be required to execute
- 12 a declaration as a condition for insurance coverage, for health
- 13 care benefits or services, or for any other reason.
- 14 (2) A health facility shall not deny admission to an indi-
- 15 vidual because he or she executes a declaration.
- 16 (3) A life insurer shall not do any of the following because
- 17 of the execution or implementation of a declaration:
- (a) Refuse to provide or continue coverage to the
- 19 declarant.
- 20 (b) Charge a declarant higher premiums.
- 21 (c) Offer a declarant different policy terms.
- 22 (d) Consider the terms of an existing policy to have been
- 23 breached or modified.
- 24 (e) Invoke a suicide or intentional death exemption.
- Sec. 11. If the declaration satisfies the requirements of
- 26 this act, a declaration executed prior to the effective date of
- 27 this act is valid.

- Sec. 12. The provisions of this act are cumulative and do
- 2 not impair or supersede a legal right that a person has to con-
- 3 sent to or refuse medical intervention.
