9 Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under 10 this bill are subject to the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of 11 the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the 12 Michigan Compiled Laws.

Sec. 203. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$10,000,000.00 for federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1393 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

20 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is 21 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$200,000.00 for state restricted 22 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until 23 they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant 24 to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the 25 Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1393 of the Michigan Compiled 26 Laws.

(3) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$400,000.00 for local and private contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant

Sec. 208. The department shall annually compile the number and percent by county of prisoners for which the state felony sentencing guidelines upper limit for the recommended minimum sentence is 12 months or less. The department shall report this data to the senate and house fiscal agencies and the department of management and budget for the previous calendar year by April 1 of each year.

10 Sec. 209. (1) Pursuant to the provisions of civil service rules 11 and regulations and applicable collective bargaining agreements, 12 individuals seeking employment with the department shall submit to a 13 controlled substance test. The test shall be administered by the 14 department.

15 (2) Individuals seeking employment with the department who refuse 16 to take a controlled substance test or who test positive for the 17 illicit use of a controlled substance on such a test shall be denied 18 employment by the department for a minimum of 1 year.

Of the general fund/general purpose revenue appropriated 30 in section 101, \$46,505,700.00 represents a state spending increase over the amount provided to the department of corrections for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1996, and may be used to meet state match requirements of programs contained in the federal violent crime control and law enforcement act of 1994, or successor grant programs, so that any additional federal funds received shall supplement funding provided to the department of corrections in section 101.

7 EXECUTIVE

8 Sec. 301. All reports required by this bill shall include a brief 9 executive summary of the report.

10 Sec. 302. The department shall report to the senate and house 11 appropriations subcommittees on corrections, the senate and house 12 fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget by April 13 1, 1997, on the ratio of correctional officers to prisoners for all 14 correctional institutions, the ratio of shift command staff to line 15 custody staff, and the ratio of noncustody institutional staff to 16 prisoners for all correctional institutions.

17 Sec. 303. The department shall submit 3-year and 5-year prison 18 population projection updates by December 1, 1996, to the senate and 19 house appropriations subcommittees on corrections, the senate and house 20 fiscal agencies, and the department of management and budget.

Sec. 304. It is the intent of the legislature that from the funds 21 appropriated in section 101 the department, with the cooperation of the 22 state library, create and implement electronic library services, 23 including, but not limited to, electronic law library services, for 24 prisoner use. The department shall submit a report to the senate and 25 house appropriations subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal 26 agencies of the progress of the project not later than April 1, 1997. 27 Sec. 305. (1) The department shall annually prepare and submit 28 individual reports for the technical rule violator program, the 29 probation detention program, the community residential program, the 30

electronic tether program, and the special alternative to incarceration
 program. The reports shall include the following:

3 (a) Monthly new participants.

4 (b) Monthly participant unsuccessful terminations, including cause.

5 (c) Number of successful terminations.

6 (d) Average monthly population by facility.

7 (e) Average length of placement.

8 (f) Return to prison statistics.

9 (g) Description of program location(s) including capacity and 10 staffing.

(h) Sentencing guideline scores and actual sentence statistics for participants.

13 (i) Comparison with prior year statistics.

14 (j) Analysis of the cost effectiveness of the program.

(2) Annual reports shall be prepared and submitted by April 1,
16 1997, to the corrections subcommittees of the house and senate
17 appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and
18 the department of management and budget.

19 FIELD OPERATIONS

20 Sec. 701. The department shall develop guidelines for all 21 probation personnel who are responsible for making sentencing recommendations for convicted felons. For a sentence recommendation in 22 a presentence investigation report under section 14 of chapter XI of 23 24 the code of criminal procedure, Act No. 175 of the Public Acts of 1927, 25 being section 771.14 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the guidelines 26 shall require probation staff to recommend a sentence other than prison for short-term nonviolent offenses and should recommend prison 27 sentences only when required by law or when no alternative community 28 sentence will provide public protection, pursuant to OPBFS 71.01. 29 Probation staff shall review all options for alternatives to 30

incarceration and recommend nonprison sentences for all nonviolent 1 offenders, excluding sentences for which there is a mandatory 2 prison sentence. If the probation staff deviates from these 3 guidelines, reasons for the deviation shall be attached to the 4 5 recommended prison sentence and included with the presentence 6 investigation report. The department shall ensure that this data is 7 collected as part of the department's overall information systems upgrade project and that it is compiled in an annual report submitted 8 to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on corrections, 9 the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management 10 and budget by April 1 of each year. 11

Sec. 702. (1) The \$501,300.00 appropriated in section 101 for the community service work program shall be used for salaries and wages, and fringe benefit costs of community service coordinators employed by the department to supervise offenders participating in work crew assignments. Funds shall also be used to cover motor transport division rates on state vehicles used to transport offenders to community service work project sites.

19 (2) As used in this section, community service work means work 20 performed by an offender in an unpaid position with a nonprofit or tax 21 supported agency for a specified number of hours of work or service 22 within a given time period.

(3) The community service work program shall provide adult offenders with community service work of tangible benefit to a community while fulfilling court-ordered community service work sanctions and other post conviction obligations.

27 COMMUNITY PLACEMENT

28 Sec. 801. (1) All community placement prisoners, probationers, and 29 parolees involved with the electronic tether program shall reimburse 30 the department for costs associated with the equipment and telephone

charges associated with their participation in the program. The
 department shall require community service work reimbursement as a
 means of payment for those able-bodied individuals unable to pay for
 the cost of the equipment.

5 (2) Program participant contributions and local community tether 6 program reimbursement for the electronic tether program appropriated in 7 section 101 are related to program expenditures and may be used to 8 offset expenditures for this purpose.

(3) Included in the appropriation in section 101 is adequate 9 10 funding to implement the community tether program to be administered by 11 the department. The community tether program is intended to provide 12 sentencing judges and county sheriffs in coordination with local community corrections boards access to the state's electronic tether 13 program based on a 2-tier reimbursement schedule. The state will, for 14 15 \$5.30 per diem, provide counties with the tether equipment, replacement 16 parts, administrative oversight of the equipment's operation, notification of violators, and periodic reports regarding county 17 program participants. Under the \$5.30 per diem option, counties are 18 19 responsible for tether equipment installation and service, and 20 apprehension of program violators. For \$7.50 per diem, the state will provide the equipment, staff to install and service the equipment, 21 22 administrative oversight staff, periodic reports regarding county 23 program participants, and notification of program violators. County 24 officials shall be responsible for the coordination and apprehension of program violators. The department shall assist in determining the 25 26 appropriate distribution of the tether units throughout the state based on analysis of community demand through community comprehensive plans 27 and department data analysis and communicate this information to the 28 department for implementation. County officials are responsible for 29 30 collecting per diem fees from community tether program offenders if a

per diem fee is initiated by the county programs. Any county with
 tether charges outstanding over 60 days shall be considered in
 violation of the community tether program agreement and lose access to
 the program.

5 Sec. 802. Community placement prisoners shall reimburse the 6 department for the operational costs of the program. As an alternative 7 method of payment, the department may develop a community service work 8 schedule for those individuals unable to meet reimbursement 9 requirements established by the department.

10 SPECIAL ALTERNATIVE INCARCERATION PROGRAM

Sec. 901. The department shall establish a uniform rate to be paid by agencies that benefit from public work services provided by special alternative incarceration participants and prisoners.

14 OFFICE OF COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

1001. The office of community corrections shall provide and 15 Sec. 16 coordinate the delivery and implementation of services in communities 17 to facilitate successful offender reintegration into the community. Programs and services to be offered shall include, but are not limited 18 to, new program startup funding, program funding for those programs 19 delivering services for eligible offenders in geographic areas 20 identified by the office of community corrections as having a shortage 21 of available services, technical assistance, referral services for 22 education, employment services, and substance abuse and family 23 counseling. 24

25 Sec. 1002. (1) Included in the appropriation in section 101 for 26 OCC community corrections comprehensive plans and services, is 27 \$9,980,000.00 for the development and implementation of programs 28 designed to achieve the following objectives:

29 (a) Diversion of felony offenders from state prisons.

30 (b) Diversion of offenders from county jails.

(c) Reduction of crime and recidivism through the delivery of
 effective state and community-based programs.

3

(d) Strengthen offender accountability.

4 (2) The department shall coordinate with community corrections
5 boards for available services including, but not limited to, education,
6 employment, mental health, and substance abuse, to implement a cost7 effective comprehensive community corrections program for offenders.

Sec. 1003. (1) As part of the March biannual report specified 8 9 under section 12 (2) of the community corrections act, Act No. 511 of 10 the Public Acts of 1988, being section 791.412 of the Michigan Compiled 11 Laws, which requires an analysis of the impact of that act on prison 12 admissions and jail utilization, the department shall submit to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on corrections, the 13 14 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the department of management and 15 budget the following information for each county and counties 16 consolidated for comprehensive corrections plans:

(a) Approved comprehensive corrections plans including each program
and level of funding, the utilization level of each program, and
profile information of enrolled offenders.

(b) If federal funds are made available, the number of participants funded, the number served, the number successfully completing the program, and a summary of the program activity.

(c) Status of the community corrections information system and thejail population information system.

(d) Data on probation residential centers, including participant
data, participant sentencing guideline scores, program expenditures,
average length of stay, and bed utilization data.

(2) The report required under subsection (1) shall include the
total funding allocated, program expenditures, required program data,
and year-to-date totals.

1 Sec. 1004. (1) Included in the appropriation in section 101 is 2 funding for the JPIS and CCIS data base. The department shall identify 3 and coordinate information regarding the availability of and the demand 4 for community corrections programs, jail-based community corrections 5 programs, and basic state required jail data.

6 (2) The department shall be responsible for the administration, 7 collection, analysis, and reporting of state required jail data.

8 (3) As a prerequisite to participation in the programs and services 9 offered through the department, counties shall provide basic jail data 10 to the department.

11 Sec. 1005. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for 12 community corrections comprehensive plans and services, no funds shall 13 be awarded to local jurisdictions that have not had their comprehensive 14 corrections plans officially approved by the state community 15 corrections board.

16 Sec. 1006. (1) The department shall administer a county jail 17 reimbursement program from the funds appropriated in section 101 for 18 that purpose.

(2) The county jail reimbursement program shall reimburse counties 19 for housing convicted felons who would otherwise have been sentenced to 20 a state prison term with a minimum state felony sentencing guidelines 21 score of 12 months or more or who were convicted of a violation of 22 section 625 (1) of the Michigan vehicle code, Act No. 300 of the Public 23 Acts of 1949, being section 257.625 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, that 24 is punishable under section 625(6)(d) of that act, or who were 25 sentenced under section 10, 11, 12, or 13 of chapter IX of the code of 26 criminal procedure, Act No. 175 of the Public Acts of 1927, being 27 sections 769.10, 769.11, 769.12, and 769.13 of the Michigan Compiled 28 Laws, Provided the minimum minimum state felony sentencing guideline 29 score for the underlying felony is 12 months or more. The provisions 30

of this subsection shall be superseded by the provisions of the state/local partnership legislation pertaining to the county jail reimbursement program on the effective date of those state/local partnership provisions.

5 (3) The county jail reimbursement program shall reimburse counties 6 for housing parole violators and offenders being returned by the 7 department from community placement to institutional status and for 8 prisoners who volunteer for placement in a county jail.

9 (4) State reimbursement under this section shall be for prisoner 10 housing and custody expenses in the amount of \$38.00 per diem per 11 diverted offender for the first 180 days of incarceration and \$35.00 12 per diem per diverted offender for the remainder of the term of 13 incarceration not to exceed 1 year.

14 CONSENT DECREES

Sec. 1101. Expenditures from the funds appropriated in section 101 for the federal court consent decree and the Hadix court consent decree shall be transferred by the department to separate accounts created for the purpose of separately identifying costs associated with each consent decree.

20 Sec. 1102. The funds appropriated in section 101 for additional 21 acute care beds may only be expended for additional acute and 22 residential mental health beds if specifically required in the DOJ 23 consent decree.

24 HEALTH CARE

25 Sec. 1151. (1) The department shall contract for utilization 26 review of all major medical procedures including, but not limited to, 27 application of guidelines for outside medical referrals and controls 28 that verify the necessity of recommended medical tests, treatments, and 29 procedures.

30 (2) The department shall report by June 1, 1997, to the house and

1 senate fiscal agencies and to the department of management and budget 2 the results of the telemedicine pilot program, the restructuring of 3 clinical operations, and the implementation of managed care contracts 4 for hospital services.

5 Sec. 1152. The department may establish and collect a fee from 6 prisoners choosing to access nonemergency health care services. The 7 revenue collected is appropriated to cover costs directly related to 8 providing these services.

9 INSTITUTIONAL OPERATIONS

Sec. 1201. (1) The maximum reimbursement to colleges participating in the prisoner rehabilitation and education program (PREP) shall be limited to \$4.00 per student contact hour not to exceed 19.5 contact hours per semester credit hour.

(2) The department shall report annually by April 1, 1997, on the
 PREP program. Information shall include types of programs offered and
 the number of students awarded a degree or certificate.

Sec. 1202. The appropriation in section 101 for central region food service operations shall be operated through a revolving fund established by the department in accordance with the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

22 Sec. 1203. The department shall maintain the Michigan braille 23 transcribing service at its current location at the state prison of 24 southern Michigan complex.

25 Sec. 1204. (1) It is the intent of the department that no 26 appropriations in this bill shall be used to pay any costs associated 27 with college or university programming for prison inmates, unless such 28 payments are required by existing court orders or consent decrees.

(2) It is the intent of the department to petition the federal
 court to modify the out-of-cell activity plan previously adopted as

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part of the <u>Hadix v Johnson</u> consent decree. The modification proposed by the department shall eliminate state funded college and university programming for prison inmates and replace such programming with general education development, adult basic education, and vocational education programming.

(3) If the department is successful in modifying the consent decree 6 to eliminate required college and university programming, all funding 7 for the prisoner rehabilitation and education program is transferred to 8 vocational/education line items in the budget to eliminate waiting 9 lists for general education development, adult basic education, and 10 vocational education programming. Transfers for this purpose shall be 11 12 made through the legislative transfer process pursuant to section 393 13 (2) of the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1393 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. 14

15 Sec. 1205. It is the intent of the department that if funds appropriated under section 101 for the prisoner rehabilitation and 16 education program are expended to pay for higher education expenses of 17 a prisoner, the prisoner, as a condition for receiving those funds, 18 shall contractually agree with the department to repay those funds. 19 It 20 is the intent of the department that this requirement will not be implemented if a federal judge determines that implementation would 21 22 violate a federal consent decree or court order.

Sec. 1206. If a correctional officer or other departmental 23 24 employee is exposed to a prisoner's blood or other bodily fluid as a 25 result of an assault, an emergency, or an urgent care situation, the department shall cause blood and bodily fluid specimens of the prisoner 26 to be submitted to a clinical laboratory approved by the department for 27 the purpose of performing department approved tests for HIV or an 28 antibody to HIV, and for hepatitis B. Upon receiving positive tests 29 results, and except as otherwise provided by law, the department shall 30

immediately notify the correctional officer or other departmental
 employee of the test results.

3 Sec. 1207. Funds appropriated under section 101 shall not be 4 expended to purchase a color television for prisoner use.

5 Sec. 1208. From the funds appropriated in section 101, the 6 department shall allocate sufficient funds to develop a pilot 7 children's visitation program. The pilot program shall teach parenting 8 skills and arrange for day visitation at these facilities for parents 9 and their children.

10 INMATE HOUSING FUND

11 Sec. 1301. (1) The inmate housing fund shall be used for the 12 custody, treatment, clinical, and administrative costs associated with 13 the housing of prisoners other than those specifically budgeted for 14 elsewhere in this act. Expenditures from the inmate housing fund shall 15 be transferred by the department to existing accounts or to separate 16 accounts created to separately identify costs for specific purposes.

(2) Quarterly reports on all expenditures from the inmate housing
fund shall be submitted by the department to the department of
management and budget, the senate and house appropriations
subcommittees on corrections, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.
