A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources and for local recreation grants for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1995; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

17 GENERAL SECTIONS

Sec. 201. In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of arti-19 cle IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in this 20 appropriation act is \$3,243,800.00 and state appropriations to be paid to 21 local units of government are \$1,700,000.00 as follows:

3 Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized under 4 this act and the departments, agencies, commissions, boards, offices, and 5 programs for which an appropriation is made under this act are subject to 6 the management and budget act, Act No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, 7 being sections 18.1101 to 18.1594 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

8 Sec. 203. For all projects and grant programs funded under this 9 act, the commission of natural resources or the department of natural 10 resources shall notify each legislator whose district is to receive a 11 grant 7 days before the grants are announced.

Sec. 204. It is the intent of the legislature that the state shall nake bonds issued pursuant to the environmental protection bond implementation act, Act No. 328 of the Public Acts of 1988, being sections 299.671 to 299.685 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, available to the citiers of the state by making a portion of the bonds available in denominations of \$500.00 or less, and shall otherwise encourage the participation 8 of the citizens of the state in the investment in environmental protec-19 tion bonds.

Sec. 205. (1) The unexpended portion of the appropriation in sec-21 tion 101 for local recreational grants projects in this act and Act 22 No. 55 of the Public Acts of 1990, Act No. 194 of the Public Acts of 23 1990, Act No. 30 of the Public Acts of 1991, Act No. 83 of the Public 24 Acts of 1992, and Act No. 74 of the Public Acts of 1993 are considered 25 work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are 26 carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in 27 compliance with section 451(3) of the management and budget act, Act

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No. 431 of the Public Acts of 1984, being section 18.1451 of the Michigan
Compiled Laws.

3 (2) For each of the projects described in subsection (1):

4 (a) The purpose of the local recreational grant to be carried for-5 ward is to improve the development of the state's recreational base.

6 (b) The project will be accomplished by contract.

7 (c) The total estimated costs of the project are identified in a8 line item appropriation.

9 (d) The tentative completion date for the project is September 30,10 1998.

11 WASTE MANAGEMENT

Sec. 301. The commission of natural resources shall annually report 13 to the governor, the house and senate appropriations committees, the 14 house and senate subcommittees on natural resources, the house and senate 15 standing committees on natural resources, and the house and senate fiscal 16 agencies the progress of resource recovery projects for which appropria-17 tions have been made under this act. This report shall include a listing 18 of applicants for grant money; the criteria used for project selection; a 19 list of projects funded including the name, address, county, and tele-20 phone number of the recipient or participant; bond funded actions taken 21 on each project; other sources of funds used on each project in addition 22 to bond proceeds, including private actions; the amount of funds expended 23 for each project; progress toward accomplishing the project's performance 24 goals; further actions anticipated on each project; and other information 25 considered pertinent by the commission of natural resources.

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Sec. 302. A grant or loan recipient shall submit project performance reports to the department in a format specified by the department annually for not less than 10 years, with the exception of resource recovery education, waste reduction research and demonstration and market development research and demonstration, which shall report annually for not less than 3 years. A recipient of a solid waste composting grant shall be required to develop and implement a technology transfer plan to share information on the composting project with interg ested parties and local units of government.

Sec. 303. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section 101 for solid waste alternatives projects shall be considered work projects and shall not lapse to the environmental protection bond fund but shall continue to be available for the purpose for which it was appropriated.

Sec. 304. The department shall include consideration of the overall financial solvency of a private business entity, and the percentage of real state investment in project funding, when, as part of solid waste alternatives program requirement, an applicant demonstrates his or her capability to carry out a proposed project. The department shall make provisions in each grant or loan project contract to protect the state's investment in the project.
