## SENATE BILL NO. 910

## EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 24, 1998, Introduced by Senators DE GROW, SCHWARZ, STEIL, GOUGEON and MC MANUS and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of education and certain other purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, school districts, and other governmental bodies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain legal entities and state agencies.

10	constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources for fiscal
11	year 1998-99 is estimated at \$57,492,400.00 in this bill and state
12	spending from state sources paid to local units of government for fiscal
13	year 1998-99 is estimated at \$27,492,600.00. The itemized statement

31	Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under
32	this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
33	18.1101 to 18.1594.
34	Sec. 203. As used in this bill:
35	(a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.
36	(b) "DAG-FCS" means the DAG food and consumer service.

- 1 (c) "DED" means the United States department of education.
- 2 (d) "DED-OBEMLA" means the DED office of bilingual education and
- 3 minority languages affairs.
- 4 (e) "DED-OESE" means DED office of elementary and secondary
- 5 education.
- 6 (f) "DED-OSERS" means the DED office of special education
- 7 rehabilitative services.
- 8 (q) "DED-OVAE" means the DED office of vocational and adult
- 9 education.
- 10 (h) "Department" means the Michigan department of education.

- Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1998, there is a hiring freeze
- 24 imposed on the state classified civil service. State departments and
- 25 agencies are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified
- 26 civil service employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state
- 27 classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply
- 28 to internal transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another
- 29 within a department or to positions that are 80% or more federal or
- 30 restricted funds.
- 31 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
- 32 freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring freeze
- 33 will result in rendering a state department or agency being unable to
- 34 deliver basic services. The state budget director shall report by the
- 35 fifteenth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house
- 36 appropriations committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze

- 1 approved during the previous month and the justification for the
- 2 exclusion.
- 3 Sec. 205. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101,
- 4 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for federal
- 5 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
- 6 they have been transferred to another line item in this bill under
- 7 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
- 8 18.1393.
- 9 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is
- 10 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$700,000.00 for state restricted
- 11 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until
- 12 they have been transferred to another line item in this bill under
- 13 section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL
- 14 18.1393.
- 15 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is
- 16 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 for local contingency
- 17 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
- 18 been transferred to another line item in this bill under section 393(2)
- 19 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 20 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is
- 21 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$250,000.00 for private contingency
- 22 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have
- 23 been transferred to another line item in this bill under section 393(2)
- of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.
- 25 Sec. 206. The department of civil service shall bill departments
- 26 and/or agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1%
- 27 charges authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution
- 28 of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by
- 29 the end of the second fiscal quarter.
- 30 Sec. 207. The department may carry into the succeeding fiscal year
- 31 unexpended federal pass-through funds to local institutions and
- 32 governments that do not require additional state matching funds.
- 33 Federal pass-through funds to local institutions and governments that
- 34 are received in amounts in addition to those included in section 101 and
- 35 that do not require additional state matching funds are appropriated for
- 36 the purposes intended.

- 1 Sec. 208. The department shall provide the state budget director
- 2 and the senate and house fiscal agencies with copies of the state board
- 3 of education agenda and all supporting documents at the time the agenda
- 4 and supporting documents are provided to state board of education
- 5 members.
- 6 Sec. 209. (1) The department shall submit to the department of
- 7 management and budget, the house and senate appropriations committees,
- 8 the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the house and senate standing
- 9 committees having jurisdiction over technology issues, periodic reports
- 10 on the department's efforts to change the department's computer software
- 11 and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000 and
- 12 beyond. These reports shall identify actual progress in comparison to
- 13 the department's approved work plan for these efforts.
- 14 (2) The department may present progress billings to the department
- 15 of management and budget for the costs incurred in changing computer
- 16 software and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000
- 17 and beyond. At the time progress billings are presented for
- 18 reimbursement, the department shall identify and forward as appropriate
- 19 the funding sources that should support the work performed.
- 20 Sec. 210. The department shall not lease real property for less
- 21 than fair market value.

## 22 STATE BOARD/OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

- Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per
- 24 diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for each
- 25 day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is present;
- 26 for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective board,
- 27 committee, or commission; or for performing official business as
- 28 authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The per
- 29 diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:
- 30 (a) State board of education president . . \$ 110.00 per day
- 31 (b) State board of education member other than
- 33 (c) State tenure commission-member . . . . . . \$ 50.00 per day
- 34 (2) A state board of education member shall not be paid a per diem
- 35 for more than 24 days per year.
- 36 (3) The administrative secretary of the state board of education

- 1 shall report to the public, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and
- 2 the state budget director the previous month's expenses by fund source
- 3 for members of the state board of education related to the performance
- 4 of their responsibilities.
- 5 Sec. 302. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 to the
- 6 state board of education, not more than \$27,500.00 shall be expended for
- 7 travel.
- 8 (2) The state board of education shall not expend amounts for travel
- 9 appropriated from DED-OVAE, basic grants to states.
- 10 Sec. 303. (1) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for state
- 11 board/superintendent operations, there is allocated \$500,000.00 and 5.0
- 12 FTE positions to establish and operate a charter school office to
- 13 administer charter school legislation and associated regulations, and to
- 14 coordinate the activities of the department relating to charter schools.
- 15 (2) From the amount appropriated in section 101, there is allocated
- up to \$150,000.00 to continue performance studies of charter schools.
- 17 (3) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for state
- 18 board/superintendent operations, there is allocated up to \$250,000.00 to
- 19 fund an exchange program between teachers in Michigan school districts
- 20 and public school academies and teachers in Michigan's sister state of
- 21 Shiga in Japan.

## 22 TECHNOLOGY AND INFORMATION SERVICES

- 23 Sec. 401. Included in the appropriation for technology and
- 24 information services in section 101 is \$50,000.00 to publish and
- 25 distribute the Michigan school report.

# 26 STANDARDS, ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION SERVICES

- 27 Sec. 501. (1) From the general fund allocations in section 101, the
- 28 department may provide tests to nonpublic schools. The department shall
- 29 notify nonpublic schools that they are eligible to receive the tests
- 30 without cost to them.
- 31 (2) The department shall release test results at the same time to
- 32 all private schools and public school districts taking the tests and the
- 33 state budget director and house and senate fiscal agencies.
- 34 (3) From the amount appropriated in section 101 for test development
- 35 and administration, \$200,000.00 shall be expended to expedite the
- 36 reporting of high school proficiency test results and to improve the

- 1 method of reporting the results to enable pupils to accurately interpret
- 2 the information.

## 3 MICHIGAN SCHOOLS FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND

- 4 Sec. 601. The employees at the Michigan schools for the deaf and
- 5 blind who work on a school year basis shall be considered annual
- 6 employees for purposes of service credits, retirement, and insurance
- 7 benefits.
- 8 Sec. 602. For each student enrolled at the Michigan schools for the
- 9 deaf and blind, the department shall assess the intermediate school
- 10 district of residence 100% of the cost of operating the student's
- 11 instructional program. The amount shall exclude room and board related
- 12 costs and the cost of weekend transportation between the school and the
- 13 student's home.
- 14 Sec. 603. (1) The department may assess rent to the department of
- 15 corrections for Michigan school for the blind's former site space
- 16 occupied by the corrections staff training academy. The rental rates
- 17 and all leasing arrangements shall be subject to the approval of the
- 18 department of management and budget. Amounts received under section 101
- 19 for the corrections academy lease program may be expended by the
- 20 department for operation, maintenance, and renovation expenses
- 21 associated with the lease space.
- 22 (2) In addition, the department may receive and expend funds in
- 23 addition to those authorized in section 101 for the rental of facilities
- 24 at the Michigan school for the blind's former site to private or
- 25 publicly funded organizations.
- 26 (3) Security guards or other patrols at the Michigan school for the
- 27 blind's former site shall not be funded through section 101 funds
- 28 appropriated for the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind.
- 29 Sec. 604. The department shall assess rent to the state employee
- 30 child care center for the rental of space it occupies at the Michigan
- 31 school for the blind's former site. The rental rates and all leasing
- 32 arrangements shall be subject to the approval of the department of
- 33 management and budget. Amounts received under section 101 for the child
- 34 care center may be expended by the department for the operation,
- 35 maintenance, and renovation of the leased space.
- 36 Sec. 605. Proceeds from the sale of surplus property and facilities

- 1 at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind are hereby appropriated
- 2 for the purposes of repairs, renovations, and maintenance of the
- 3 school's campus. Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on
- 4 September 30, 1999 from such proceeds shall be carried forward as a work
- 5 project for the purposes of repairs, renovations, and maintenance of the
- 6 school's campus. The work shall be carried out by state employees, or
- 7 by contract as necessary, at an estimated cost of \$132,000.00. The
- 8 estimated completion date of the work is September 30, 2000.
- 9 Sec. 606. The department may assist the department of community
- 10 health, other departments, and local school districts to secure reim-
- 11 bursement for eligible services provided in Michigan schools from the
- 12 federal medicaid program. The department may submit reports of direct
- 13 expenses related to this effort to the department of community health
- 14 for reimbursement.
- 15 Sec. 607. The unexpended balances of appropriations for the schools
- 16 for the deaf and blind operations shall not lapse to the state general
- 17 fund at the end of the fiscal year. Any unexpended and unencumbered
- 18 funds remaining on September 30, 1999, shall be carried forward as a
- 19 work project and expended for special maintenance and repairs of
- 20 facilities at the Michigan schools for the deaf and blind. The work
- 21 shall be carried out by state employees, or by contract as necessary, at
- 22 an estimated cost of \$100,000.00. The estimated completion date of the
- work is September 30, 2000.
- Sec. 608. The unexpended balances of appropriations and any surplus
- 25 restricted revenue for the former school for the blind site in Lansing
- 26 shall not lapse to the state general fund at the end of the fiscal year.
- 27 Any unexpended and unencumbered funds remaining on September 30, 1999,
- 28 shall be carried forward as a work project or as a restricted revenue
- 29 carryforward and expended for special maintenance and repairs of
- 30 facilities at the former Michigan school for the blind site in Lansing.

31

- 32 Sec. 609. The Michigan schools for the deaf and blind may promote
- 33 their residential program as a possible appropriate option for children
- 34 who are deaf or hard of hearing or who are blind or visually impaired.
- 35 The Michigan schools for the deaf and blind shall distribute information
- 36 detailing its services to all intermediate school districts in the

1 state.

# 2 PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION SERVICES

- 3 Sec. 701. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for
- 4 professional preparation operations, the department shall maintain the
- 5 professional personnel register and certificate revocation/felony
- 6 conviction files.

### GRANTS AND DISTRIBUTIONS

- 8 Sec. 801. In the absence of an existing payment schedule, the
- 9 department shall disburse the funds to a general fund grantee in
- 10 accordance with the same standards of timing and amount that apply to
- 11 disbursements made by the department to a federal fund grantee. The
- 12 disbursement shall be restricted to the minimum amount needed for
- 13 immediate disbursement by the grantee. The department may waive this
- 14 section if extenuating circumstances warrant and are substantiated in
- 15 the grantee's application or other appropriate documentation. A waiver
- 16 granted pursuant to this section shall not be effective until 15 days
- 17 after written notice of the proposed waiver is given to the state budget
- 18 director and the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations
- 19 subcommittees having jurisdiction over the department budget.
- Sec. 802. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for school
- 21 breakfast programs shall be made available to all eligible applicant
- 22 public school districts and public school academies as follows:
- 23 (a) The district or public school academy participates in the
- 24 federal school breakfast program and meets all standards as prescribed
- 25 by 7 C.F.R. parts 220 and 245.
- 26 (b) Payment is made for each breakfast served meeting standards
- 27 prescribed in subdivision (a).
- 28 (c) The payment for a district or public school academy is at a per
- 29 meal rate equal to the lesser of the district's or public school
- 30 academy's actual cost, or 100% of the cost of a breakfast served by an
- 31 efficiently operated breakfast program as determined by the department,
- 32 less federal reimbursement, participant payments, and other state
- 33 reimbursement. Determination of efficient cost by the department shall
- 34 be determined by using a statistical sampling of statewide and regional
- 35 cost as reported in a manner approved by the department for the
- 36 preceding school year.

- (d) The payment determined under subdivision (c) is prorated if the 1 2 appropriation in section 101 is not sufficient to fund all payments determined under this section. 3
- (2) Of the appropriation of federal funds in section 101 for the 4 5 national school lunch program, expenditures shall not be made in fiscal year 1998-1999 for any programs other than those authorized by the 6 7 department and funded from this line item in fiscal year 1997-1998.
- 8 Sec. 803. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 for school 9 readiness programs shall be made available through a competitive 10 application process as follows:
- (a) An applicant may be any public or private nonprofit legal entity 11 12 or agency other than a local or intermediate school district except a 13 local or intermediate school district acting as a fiscal agent for a 14 child caring organization regulated under 1973 PA 116, MCL 722.111 to 15 722.128.
- 16 (b) Applications shall be submitted in a form and manner as required 17 by the department.
- (c) Applications shall be reviewed by a diverse interagency 18 19 committee composed of representatives of the department, appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations, and 20 21 parents.
- 22 (d) Priority in the recommendation for awarding of grants by the 23 state board of education to applicants shall be based upon the following criteria: 24
- 25 (i) Compliance with standards for early childhood development con-26 sistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state board of education. 27
- 28 (ii) Active and continuous involvement of the parents or guardians 29 of the children participating in the program.
- 30 (iii) Employment of teachers possessing proper training in early childhood development, including an early childhood (ZA) endorsement or 31 32 child development associate, and trained support staff.
- (iv) Evidence of collaboration with the community of providers in 33 34 early childhood development programs including documentation of the total number of children in the community who would meet the criteria 35 established in subparagraph (vi), and who are being served by other 36

- 1 providers, and the number of children who will remain unserved by other
- 2 community early childhood programs if this program is funded.
- (v) The extent to which these funds will supplement other federal,
- 4 state, local, or private funds.
- 5 (vi) The extent to which these funds will be targeted to children
- 6 who will be at least 4, but less than 5, years of age as of December 1
- 7 of the year in which the programs are offered and who show evidence of 2
- 8 or more "at-risk" factors as defined in the state board of education
- 9 report entitled, "children at risk" that was adopted by the state board
- 10 on April 5, 1988.
- 11 (e) Whether the application contains a comprehensive evaluation plan
- 12 that includes implementation of all program components required and an
- 13 assessment of the gains of children participating in an early childhood
- 14 development program.
- 15 (f) Applications shall provide for the establishment of a school
- 16 readiness advisory committee that shall be involved in the planning and
- 17 evaluation of the program and provides for the involvement of parents
- 18 and appropriate community, volunteer, and social service agencies and
- 19 organizations. There shall be on the committee at least 1 parent or
- 20 guardian of a program participant for every 18 children enrolled in the
- 21 program, with a minimum of 2 parent or guardian representatives. The
- 22 committee shall do all of the following: . . (i) Review the
- 23 mechanisms and criteria used to determine referrals for participation
- 24 in the school readiness program.
- 25 (ii) Review the health screening program for all participants.
- 26 (iii) Review the nutritional services provided to all participants.
- 27 (iv) Review the mechanisms in place for the referral of families to
- 28 community social service agencies, as appropriate.
- 29 (v) Review the collaboration with and the involvement of appropriate
- 30 community, volunteer, and social service agencies and organizations in
- 31 addressing all aspects of education disadvantage.
- (vi) Review, evaluate, and make recommendations for changes in the
- 33 school readiness program.
- 34 (g) More than 50% of the children participating in the program shall
- 35 meet the income eligibility criteria for free or reduced price lunch, as
- 36 determined under the national school lunch act, chapter 281, 60 Stat.

- 1 230, 42 U.S.C. 1751 to 1753, 1755 to 1761, 1762a, 1765 to 1766b, and
- 2 1769 to 1769h, or meet income and all other eligibility criteria for
- 3 participation in the Michigan family independence agency unified child
- 4 day care program.
- 5 (2) Grant awards by the state board of education may be at whatever
- 6 level the board determines appropriate. A grant, when combined with
- 7 other sources of state revenue for this program, shall not exceed
- 8 \$3,100.00 per child or the cost of the program, whichever is less.
- 9 (3) Except as otherwise provided, an applicant that received a grant
- 10 under this section in the 1997-1998 fiscal year shall receive priority
- 11 for funding in 1998-1999. However, continuation of funding is
- 12 contingent on the availability of funds and documented evidence of
- 13 grantee compliance with standards for early childhood development
- 14 consistent with programs for 4-year-olds, as approved by the state board
- 15 of education, and with all operational, fiscal, administrative, and
- 16 other program requirements. After 3 years of funding, a program that
- 17 received a grant under this section may reapply for funding, but will
- 18 compete for available funds with other new programs and other programs
- 19 also completing their third year of funding under this section. A
- 20 program which offers supplementary day care and thereby offers full-day
- 21 programs as part of its early childhood development program shall
- 22 receive priority in the allocation of these competitive funds.
- 23 Sec. 804. (1) The reading plan for Michigan (RPM) is a series of
- 24 elementary education strategies created for the purpose of improving
- 25 reading skills of K-3 students so that all students are reading at an
- 26 appropriate grade level prior to the start of the fourth grade.
- 27 (2) In order to implement the reading plan for Michigan, the
- 28 department shall do at least all of the following:
- 29 (a) Develop a model summer reading program for students who will be
- 30 attending grades 1 through 4 in the following school year and who have
- 31 demonstrated the need for additional reading skills training, as
- 32 evidenced by standardized test results on tests approved by the
- 33 department for this purpose. The model reading program shall be in
- 34 conformance with the national education goals and shall also meet
- 35 criteria for DED-OESE, Title I program funding.
- 36 (b) Recommend diagnostic tools and student assessments to local

- 1 districts to determine reading readiness and ensure progress in reading
- 2 skills.
- 3 (c) Develop and disseminate reading readiness kits to parents of
- 4 students in preschool and kindergarten to provide parents with
- 5 information about how they can prepare their children for reading
- 6 success.
- 7 (d) Develop and make available a statewide resource guide of public
- 8 and private service providers to assist parents in improving their
- 9 children's reading skills.
- 10 (3) The funds appropriated in section 101 for the reading plan for
- 11 Michigan grants shall be allocated by the department on a competitive
- 12 grant basis to districts or consortia of districts which meet the
- 13 following criteria:
- 14 (a) The district must offer a summer reading program based upon the
- 15 model reading program developed by the department pursuant to subsection
- 16 (1) beginning after the close of the 1998-99 school year.
- 17 (b) The district must identify monies from other sources available
- 18 to the district which will be used to support at least 50% of the total
- 19 costs of the summer reading program.
- 20 (c) Other criteria determined by the department.
- 21 (4) Applications for funding must be submitted to the department no
- 22 later than December 31, 1998. The department shall notify recipients of
- the grants no later than March 30, 1999.
- 24 (5) Beginning in the 2001-2002 school year, no student shall be
- 25 advanced from the third grade to the fourth grade without having
- 26 achieved a score on a standardized test approved by the department which
- 27 indicates that student is reading at the third grade level, unless
- 28 otherwise indicated by a student individualized education plan.
