#### SENATE BILL NO. 912

#### EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 24, 1998, Introduced by Senators MC MANUS, GAST, GOUGEON and STEIL and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of agriculture for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1998 and the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999; to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations; to create funds; to provide for the imposition of fees; to require reports, audits, and plans; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by certain state agencies.

(1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources for 16 fiscal year 1998-99 is estimated at \$69,853,200.00 in this bill and 17 state spending from state sources paid to local units of government 18 19 for fiscal year 1998-99 is estimated at \$1,400,000.00. The itemized statement below identifies appropriations from which spending to units 20 of local government will occur: 21 22 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE 23 Grants to soil conservation districts . . . . \$ 1,400,000 24 1,400,000 25 (2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a 26 department or branch that state spending to local units of government 27 will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended under 28 subsection (1), the principal executive officer shall immediately give 29 notice of the approximate shortfall to the state budget director. Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under 30 31 this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, 32 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594. 33 Sec. 203. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 34 101, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000.00 for 35 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for

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expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

4 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is
5 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$6,000,000.00 for state
6 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
7 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
8 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act,
9 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

10 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is 11 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency 12 funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have 13 been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 14 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

(4) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill pursuant to section 393 (2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1998, there is a hiring freeze 21 imposed on the state classified civil service. State departments and 22 agencies are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified 23 24 civil service employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply 25 to internal transfers of classified employees from 1 position to 26 another within a department or to positions that are 80% or more 27 federal or restricted funds. 28

(2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring freeze will result in the state department or agency being unable to deliver basic services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations committees the number of exclusions to the hiring

freeze approved during the previous month and the justification for
 the exclusion.

3 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill departments 4 and/or agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% 5 charges authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state 6 constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of 7 the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

8 Sec. 206. (1) The department shall submit to the department of 9 management and budget, the house and senate appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal agencies and the house and senate standing 10 11 committees having jurisdiction over technology issues, periodic reports on the department's efforts to change the department's 12 computer software and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the 13 year 2000 and beyond. These reports shall identify actual progress in 14 15 comparison to the department's approved work plan for these efforts. 16

(2) The department may present progress billings to the department of management and budget for the costs incurred in changing computer software and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 20 2000 and beyond. At the time progress billings are presented for reimbursement, the department shall identify and forward as appropriate the funding sources that should support the work performed.

24 Sec. 207. As used in this bill:

25 (a) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.

26 (b) "DAG-AMS" means the DAG agriculture marketing service.

27 (c) "DAG-APHIS" means the DAG animal and plant health inspection 28 service.

29 (d) "DAG-ERS-ARED" means the DAG economic research service-30 agriculture and rural economy division.

31 (e) "DAG-FS" means the DAG forest service.

32 (f) "Department" means the Michigan department of agriculture.33 (g) "Director" means the director of the department.

34 (h) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection

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"EPA-OECA" 1 agency. means the EPA office of enforcement and compliance assistance. 2 3 "EPA-OW" means the EPA office of water. (j) 4 (k) "EPA-RCRA" means the EPA resource conservation and recovery 5 act. "FTE" means full-time equated position. 6 (1) 7 "GREEEN" means generating research and extension to meet (m) environmental and economic needs. 8 "HHS" means the United States department of health and human 9 (n) 10 services. 11 (o) "HHS-FDA" means the HHS food and drug administration. "IDG" means interdepartmental grant. 12 (p) "MDCIS" means the Michigan department of consumer and 13 (q) 14 industry services. 15 "MDCIS LCC" means the MDCIS liquor control commission. (r) 16 "MDEQ" means the Michigan department of environmental (s) Sec. 208. (1) The unexpended and unobligated balance 17 quality. of any state restricted fund or account remaining at the end of the 18 fiscal year shall revert back to the state restricted fund or account 19 20 from which appropriated and be available for appropriation for the 21 next fiscal year. Appropriations that revert to a state restricted 22 fund or account 23 pursuant to this section shall not revert to the general fund of this 24 state. 25 (2) A state restricted revenue fund or account that receives revenues in excess of expenditures made from that state restricted 26 revenue fund or account shall not have the excess revenue revert to 27

28 the general fund of this state.

Sec. 209. (1) Of the funds appropriated in section 101, the department may provide for indemnity as provided for pursuant to the animal industry act of 1987, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747, not to exceed \$10,000.00 per order from any line item for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999. Before the department provides for an indemnification under this section, the department shall report the

1 reason for the indemnification, the amount of the indemnification, and 2 to whom the indemnification is to be paid. The report shall be given 3 to the state budget director, to each member of the senate and house 4 appropriations subcommittees on agriculture and to the senate and 5 house fiscal agencies.

#### 6 EXECUTIVE

7 Sec. 301. The appropriations in section 101 may be used for per 8 diem payments to members of boards, committees, and commissions for a 9 full day's board, committee, or commission work at which a quorum is 10 present; for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective 11 board, committee, or commission; or for performing official business 12 as authorized by the respective board, committee, or commission. The 13 per diem payments shall be at a rate as follows:

14(a) Commission of agriculture . . . . . . \$ 75.00 per day15(b) Upper Peninsula state fair board . . . \$ 50.00 per day16(c) Agricultural marketing and bargaining

board . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . \$

18 Sec. 302. The department may receive and expend revenue and use 19 that revenue to cover necessary expenses related to publications, 20 audit and licensing functions, livestock sales, certification of 21 nursery stock, bean inspection services, and laboratory analyses as 22 specified in the following:

23 (a) Management services publications.

24 (b) Management services audit and licensing functions.

25 (c) Upper Peninsula state fair livestock sales.

26 (d) Pesticide and plant pest management propagation and27 certification of virus free foundation stock.

(e) Pesticide and plant pest management bean inspection andgrading services.

30 (f) Laboratory support testing for testing horses in draft horse 31 pulling contests at county fairs when local jurisdictions request 32 state assistance.

(g) Laboratory support analyses to determine foreign substances inhorses engaged in racing or pulling contests at tracks.

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(h) Laboratory support analysis of food, livestock, and
 agricultural products for disease, toxic materials, foreign products
 for disease, toxic materials, foreign substances, and quality
 standards.

5 (i) Laboratory support test samples for other agencies and 6 organizations.

7 (j) Fruit and vegetable inspection at shipping and termination8 points and processing plants.

9 Sec. 303. The appropriation in section 101 for an environmental 10 technology research grant is allocated to the Michigan biotechnology 11 institute, pending receipt of matching federal funds, for the 12 development and implementation of innovative technologies to be used 13 for environmentally safe products, biodegradable chemicals, 14 environmental cleanup, and waste stream minimization projects in 15 Michigan.

# 16 ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

17 Sec. 401. A county fair, district fair, 4-H fair, or state fair 18 receiving funds under this bill to be used for prizes or awards, in 19 whole or in part, as a condition precedent to the receiving of the 20 funds for those purposes, shall publish the rules relative to the 21 prizes, awards, and deadlines for entries eligible for the funds in 22 their official premium books or lists relative to the prizes or 23 awards. An aggrieved exhibitor may make a written complaint to the 24 fair within 10 days after the fair ends. If the fair has not 25 satisfactorily settled the grievance within 45 days after it is 26 submitted to the fair, the aggrieved person may file the complaint 27 with the department and the department shall investigate the complaint 28 and make a finding of fact regarding the complaint and take 29 appropriate action regarding the

30 complaint.

31 Sec. 402. Of the amount appropriated in section 101 for purses 32 and supplements fairs/licensed tracks, a sufficient amount is 33 appropriated to provide for overnight purse supplements pursuant to 34 the

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horse racing law of 1995, 1995 PA 279, MCL 431.301 to 431.336. 1 2 Sec. 403. From the appropriations for premiums-county and state 3 fairs, \$120,000.00 shall be awarded through a competitive grant 4 program to local, regional, or state fairs or expositions to promote youth involvement and adult exhibitions in the animal agriculture 5 industry. Appropriate exhibition classes for youth shall be developed 6 7 that encourage a production exhibit for which premium awards may be The age for youth exhibitors shall be determined by the 8 paid. 9 standards of the association requesting the grant or, if standards do not exist, the age for youth exhibitors shall be ages 9 through 21. 10 Implementation of the latest technologies into the evaluation of the 11 animals shall be encouraged in the production exhibit. Adult 12 exhibitions should focus on the performance or end product, or both, 13 14 with the appropriate technologies used to enhance placings and the 15 awarding of premiums.

Sec. 404. Indirect costs may not be charged against the future farmers of America grant in section 101 by any administering agency. **PESTICIDE AND PLANT PEST MANAGEMENT** 

19 Sec. 501. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 to the 20 pesticide and plant pest management division, up to \$100,000.00 may be 21 made available to the Michigan cooperative extension service for the 22 purpose of training of applicators. Reimbursement shall be based on 23 actual expenditures and revenue availability.

Sec. 502. From the appropriation in section 101 for the disease and pesticide intervention fund program, the department of agriculture shall utilize these funds as needed to respond to plant pest diseases.

### 28 LABORATORY PROGRAM

Sec. 601. If House Bill Nos. 4820 and 4821 of the 89th Legislature are enacted into law, there is appropriated an interdepartmental grant from MDEQ from the oil and gas regulatory fund created in section 61525b of the natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.61525b, an amount not to exceed \$180,000.00 to purchase meter calibration equipment to be used by the

department's laboratory division for the purpose of monitoring oil and
 gas well meters on state-owned land.

# 3 ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

Sec. 701. From the amount appropriated in section 101 for energy
conservation program/local soil conservation districts, \$100,000.00
shall be allocated to Michigan State University for improved
technology for energy conservation in Michigan.

8 Sec. 702. The amount appropriated in section 101 for grants to 9 local soil conservation districts shall be used for providing financial assistance to all soil conservation districts in order to 10 permit the districts to engage in programs that conserve soil 11 12 resources and prevent and control soil erosion. All grants to local soil conservation districts shall be allocated according to a formula 13 14 approved by the commission of agriculture. Any soil conservation 15 district that allows payment for expenses to the district associate 16 directors shall be considered ineligible to receive grant money.

17 Sec. 703. (1) The department may expend the amount appropriated in section 101 for migrant labor housing grants for construction of 18 19 new migrant labor housing. Project grants shall not exceed \$2,000.00 per unit. An applicant is not eligible for more than a \$10,000.00 20 grant in any fiscal year. Units shall be equivalent in construction 21 22 to units approved by the DAG rural development agency for low interest construction loans and shall be not less than 484 square feet in size 23 24 and be self-contained with a minimum of 1 bedroom, a kitchen, flush 25 toilet, lavatory, and bathing facilities.

26 (2) Any unexpended migrant labor housing funds from the prior year27 shall be available for grants in the subsequent fiscal year.

Sec. 704. (1) From the amounts appropriated in section 101 for migrant labor housing, no less than \$100,000.00 shall be allocated to a private, nonprofit entity for the purpose of providing matching grants

32 for the improvement or new construction of migrant labor housing. The 33 terms or requirements imposed on a recipient of a grant awarded for 34 migrant labor housing improvement or new construction by a private, nonprofit entity shall be no less stringent than those imposed by the
 department on recipients of similar grants awarded by the department.
 An entity receiving funds under this section shall use no greater than
 7% of the state allocation for the administration of this program.

(2) A private nonprofit entity that receives an allocation to 5 administer a migrant labor housing construction grant program shall 6 7 give priority to grant applicants who are on the department's waiting list of applicants for migrant labor housing construction grants. 8 The applicants for migrant labor construction grants administered by a 9 nonprofit entity who are on the department's waiting list shall be 10 served in the order in which they reside on the department's waiting 11 list. 12

### 13 MARKET DEVELOPMENT

14 Sec. 801. Within the appropriations in section 101 for market 15 development, \$433,800.00 is for the grape and wine industry council, 16 from which the department may provide grants for the purposes as 17 described in section 16b of the Michigan liquor control act, 1933 (Ex 18 Sess) PA 8, MCL 436.16b.

Sec. 802. In any given year when insufficient amounts of Michigan surplus products are offered to the food bank council and accepted for distribution, unused funds may be applied by the food bank council for the direct purchase of foods from Michigan growers, manufacturers, or wholesalers.

Sec. 803. (1) The \$100,000.00 appropriated in section 101 for the grown in Michigan program is to provide competitive grants to Michigan nonprofit organizations to raise in-state consumer awareness of Michigan grown commodities.

(2) The grants are to be made by the Michigan commission of
agriculture on a competitive basis considering the following order of
priority:

31 (a) Cooperative efforts by recognized, statewide, grower funded 32 organizations.

33 (b) The number of consumers made aware of the benefits of Michigan 34 grown commodities.

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(c) The number of Michigan grown products encompassed in the
 proposal.

(d) The amount of the match.

4 (3) A grant made under this section shall not be less than 5 \$5,000.00 or more than \$25,000.00.

6 (4) Each grant shall be matched equally with grantees' funds. In-7 kind contributions shall not be considered as match.

### 8 AGRICULTURE EQUINE INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT

9 Sec. 901. The racing commissioner may pay rewards of not more 10 than \$5,800.00 to a person who provides information that results in 11 the arrest and conviction on a felony or misdemeanor charge for a 12 crime that involves the horse racing industry. A reward paid pursuant 13 to this section shall be paid out of the office of racing commissioner 14 line item.

Sec. 902. The department shall submit a report each month for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999 to the state budget director, the senate and house appropriations committees and to the senate and house fiscal agencies that sets forth the simulcasting revenues generated in the preceding month by each licensed track and the amount received from license fees.

Sec. 903. Of the \$52,300.00 appropriated in section 101 for the draft horse show, \$18,800.00 shall be made available for the Michigan dynamometers association, \$30,900.00 shall be made available for the Michigan draft horse breeders association, and \$2,600.00 shall be used for advertisement and promotion of an annual Great Lakes international draft horse show.

Sec. 904. (1) The appropriation of \$194,000.00 in section 101 for standardbred purses and supplements-licensed tracks is intended to provide state purse supplements for 4 races at state licensed parimutuel horse racing tracks. The purse supplements are to be used for races comprised only of Michigan bred horses segregated into a 4-yearold colt trot division, a 4-year-old filly trot division, a 4-year-old colt pace division, and a 4-year-old filly pace division.

34 (2) The appropriation in section 101 for licensed tracks - light

horse racing shall be allocated as follows:
 Arabian and Appaloosa horse racing......\$ 14,000.00
 Quarter horse racing.....\$ 41,800.00

Sec. 905. Included in the appropriation made in section 101 for the thoroughbred program is \$30,500.00 for the Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners association to conduct a thoroughbred yearling show. The Michigan united thoroughbred breeders and owners association shall submit to the department an itemized list of expenses showing that the expenses of the yearling show were paid.

10 Sec. 906. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for 11 thoroughbred owners' awards, the department shall develop a program to 12 provide for thoroughbred owners' awards that will be given to owners 13 of Michigan-bred horses finishing first in nonrestricted races at 14 licensed pari-mutuel tracks in Michigan.

#### 15 FISCAL YEAR 1997-1998 ANIMAL INDUSTRY

16 Sec. 1001. Funds appropriated in section 102 for bovine 17 tuberculosis surveillance and eradication are considered work project 18 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried 19 forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in 20 compliance with section 451(3) of the management and budget act, 1984 21 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

(a) The purpose of the project to be carried over is to provide
for bovine tuberculosis surveillance and eradication activities,
pursuant to executive directive 1998-1.

(b) This project will be accomplished through the efforts of stateemployees and through contracted services.

(c) The total estimated cost of this project is \$500,000.00.

28 (d) The tentative completion date for this project is September29 30, 1999.

30 Sec. 1002. Funds appropriated in section 102 for the bovine 31 tuberculosis indemnification project are considered work project 32 appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds are carried 33 forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in 34 compliance with section 451 (3) of the management and budget act, 1984 1 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

(a) The purpose of the project to be carried over is to provide
for indemnification provisions as provided by section 14 (3), 1988 PA
466, MCL 287.714, to indemnify livestock owners for animals ordered
destroyed by the director in accordance with 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701
to 287.747.

7 (b) This project will be accomplished through payments for
8 indemnification agreements entered into between the department and
9 livestock owners.

10 (c) The total estimated cost of this project is determined by the 11 number of animals ordered destroyed by the director in accordance with 12 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701 to 287.747.

13 (d) The tentative completion date for this project will be14 September 30, 1999.

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
