

SENATE BILL NO. 917

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 24, 1998, Introduced by Senators MC MANUS, GAST,
A. SMITH, GOUGEON, STEIL and HOFFMAN and referred to the
Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the department of environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 101. There is appropriated for the department of
2 environmental quality for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999,

17 **GENERAL SECTIONS**

18 Sec. 201. (1) Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
19 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources for
20 fiscal year 1998-99 is estimated at \$263,262,200.00 in this bill and
21 state spending from state sources paid to local units of government
22 for fiscal year 1998-99 is estimated at \$8,869,900.00. The itemized
23 statement below identifies appropriations from which spending to
24 units of local government will occur:

33 (2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a
34 department or branch that state spending to local units of government
35 will be less than the amount that was projected to be expended under

1 subsection (1), the principal executive officer shall immediately
2 give notice of the approximate shortfall to the state budget director

3 Sec. 202. The expenditures and funding sources authorized under
4 this bill are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
5 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

6 Sec. 203. As used in this bill:

7 (a) "CESARS" means chemical evaluation search and retrieval
8 system.

9 (b) "Department" means the department of environmental quality.

10) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

11 (d) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.

12 (e) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.

"EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.

14 (g) "EPA-GWDW" means the EPA groundwater drinking water.

15 (h) "EPA-LUST trust" means the EPA leaking underground storage
16 tank trust fund.

17 (i) "EPA-UST" means the EPA underground storage tank.

18 (j) "FEMA" means the federal emergency management agency.

19 (k) "FTE" means full-time equated position.

20 (l) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.

21 (m) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.

22 (n) "MDSP" means the Michigan department of state police.

23 (o) "MI" means Michigan.

24 (p) "MUSTFA" means the Michigan underground storage tank
25 financial assurance fund.

26 (q) "NPL" means the federal national priority list.

27 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1998, there is a hiring
28 freeze imposed on the state classified civil service. State
29 departments and agencies are prohibited from hiring any new full-time
30 state classified civil service employees or prohibited from filling
31 any vacant state classified civil service positions. This hiring
32 freeze does not apply
33 to internal transfers of classified employees from 1 position to
34 another within a department or to positions that are 80% or more

1 federal or restricted funds.

2 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this
3 hiring freeze when the state budget director believes that the hiring
4 freeze will result in the state department or agency being unable to
5 deliver basic services. The state budget director shall report by
6 the fifteenth of each month to the chairpersons of the senate and
7 house appropriations committees the number of exclusions to the
8 hiring freeze approved during the previous month and the
9 justification for the exclusion.

10 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill the
11 departments and/or agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter
12 for the 1% charges authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state
13 constitution of 1963. Payments shall be made for the total amount of
14 the billing by the end of the second fiscal quarter.

15 Sec. 206. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in section
16 101, there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000.00 for
17 federal contingency funds. These funds are not available for
18 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
19 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget
20 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

21 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there
22 is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state
23 restricted contingency funds. These funds are not available for
24 expenditure until they have been transferred to another line item in
25 this bill pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget
26 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

27 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there
28 is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local
29 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure
30 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
31 pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
32 431, MCL 18.1393.

33 (4) In addition to the funds appropriated in section 101, there
34 is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private
35 contingency funds. These funds are not available for expenditure

1 until they have been transferred to another line item in this bill
2 pursuant to section 393(2) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA
3 431, MCL 18.1393.

4 Sec. 207. (1) The department shall submit to the department of
5 management and budget, the house and senate appropriations
6 committees, the house and senate fiscal agencies, and the house and
7 senate standing committees having jurisdiction over technology
8 issues, periodic reports on the department's efforts to change the
9 department's computer software and hardware as necessary to perform
10 properly in the year 2000 and beyond. These reports shall identify
11 actual progress in comparison
12 to the department's approved work plan for these efforts.

13 (2) The department may present progress billings to the
14 department of management and budget for the costs incurred in
15 changing computer software and hardware as necessary to perform
16 properly in the year 2000 and beyond. At the time progress billings
17 are presented for reimbursement, the department shall identify and
18 forward as appropriate
19 the funding sources that should support the work performed.

20 Sec. 208. The department shall provide an annual report on the
21 total amount of funds received from responsible parties and legal
22 settlements, and the disposition of these funds.

23 Sec. 209. The level of revenue appropriated in section 101 of
24 this bill from oil and gas privilege fee revenue is contingent on the
25 enactment into law of House Bill No. 4820 and House Bill No. 4821 of
26 the 89th legislature.

27 Sec. 210. The level of revenue appropriated in section 101 of
28 this bill from land and water management permit fee revenue is
29 contingent on the enactment into law of House Bill No. 5114 of the
30 89th legislature.

31 Sec. 211. The level of revenue appropriated in section 101 of
32 this bill from air emission fee revenue is contingent upon the
33 enactment into law of Senate Bill No. 813 of the 89th legislature.

34 **GEOLOGICAL SURVEY**

35 Sec. 301. The total appropriation in section 101 from oil and

1 gas privilege fee revenue for fiscal year 1998-99 is \$7,317,100.00 in
2 the geological survey division. If total estimated revenue for
3 fiscal year 1998-99 is expected to be less than the total
4 appropriation, programs shall be reduced on an equal basis throughout
5 the division.

6 Sec. 302. From the funds appropriated in section 101 for
7 services to oil and gas programs, \$180,000.00 may be transferred to
8 the department of agriculture laboratory program to establish a
9 program for monitoring oil and gas production meters pending
10 enactment of House Bill No. 4820 and House Bill No. 4821 of the 89th
11 Legislature.

12 **AIR QUALITY**

13 Sec. 401. From the funds appropriated in section 101, the
14 department shall report on the status of implementation planning and
15 permit backlog reduction activities under part 55 (air pollution
16 control) of the natural resources and environmental protection act,
17 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.5501 to 324.5542, including status of revenue
18 collections, on an annual basis. The report shall be provided to the
19 house and senate appropriations subcommittees on natural resources
20 and environmental quality, the standing committees of the house of
21 representatives and the senate that are responsible for issues
22 pertaining to air quality, and the state budget director on or before
23 March 1, 1999.

24 **SURFACE WATER QUALITY**

25 Sec. 501. The appropriation in section 101 for the surface water
26 permits program includes \$1,500,000.00 to reduce the backlog of
27 discharge permits. The department shall prioritize its use of funds
28 to ensure the elimination of the backlog of those permits that result
29 in discharges into surface waters where public health problems have
30 arisen and recreational use of the surface water curtailed. This
31 backlog shall be eliminated within 1 fiscal year.

32 Sec. 502. Of the funds appropriated in section 101 for surface
33 water surveillance, a minimum of \$250,000.00 shall be designated for
34 grants to local organizations for water quality monitoring
35 activities.

1 **ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSE**

2 Sec. 601. From the appropriation in section 101 for the program
3 under part 201 (environmental remediation) of the natural resources
4 and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to
5 324.20142 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, the
6 department shall continue to make authorizations for response
7 activities at environmental contamination sites and for the
8 administration of the program created by part 201 (environmental
9 remediation) of the natural resources and environmental protection
10 act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.20101 to 324.20142.

11 Sec. 602. The department shall report all of the following
12 information relative to allocations made in section 101 for the
13 environmental cleanup and redevelopment program and the superfund
14 cleanup program to the state budget director, the senate and house
15 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies by
16 March of each year:

17 (a) The name and location of the site for which an allocation is
18 made.

19 (b) The nature of the problem encountered at the site.

20 (c) A brief description of how the allocated funds will be used
21 to resolve the problem.

22 (d) The amount of the allocation.

23 (e) A summary of the sites and the total amount of funds
24 allocated and expended at the sites at the conclusion of the fiscal
25 year.

26 (f) The number of sites that would qualify as brownfields that
27 were redeveloped.

28 Sec. 603. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section
29 101 for the state cleanup program, environmental cleanup and
30 redevelopment program, emergency cleanup action, NPL-Municipal
31 Landfill match grants and superfund cleanup projects is considered
32 work project appropriations and any unencumbered or unallotted funds
33 are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following
34 is in compliance with section 451(3) of the management and budget
35 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

13 Sec. 701. (1) The funds appropriated in section 101 from the
14 Michigan underground storage tank financial assurance fund for the
15 purpose of carrying out the duties and responsibilities as specified
16 in part 215 (underground storage tank financial assurance) of the
17 natural
18 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
19 324.21501
20 to 324.21551, are considered work project appropriations and any
21 unencumbered funds are carried forward into the succeeding fiscal
22 year. The following is in compliance with section 451(3) of the
23 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

14 Reports shall include the fund balance, estimate of available

18 Sec. 703. The unexpended portion of the appropriation in section

32 Sec. 801. If a certified health department does not exist in a
33 city, county, or district or does not fulfill its responsibilities

35 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.11701 to

1 324.11719, then the department may spend funds appropriated in
2 section 101 under the septage waste compliance program in accordance
3 with section 11716 of part 117 (septage waste services) of the
4 natural resources and
5 environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, 324.11716.

6 Sec. 802. Loans provided by the water pollution control
7 revolving fund pursuant to the appropriation in section 101 are to be
8 repaid on schedule and penalties shall be assigned for delinquent
9 repayment as provided in part 53 (clean water assistance) of the
10 natural resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL
11 324.5301 to 324.5316.
