Whereas, With Detroit Metropolitan Airport's expansion, the Detroit area is well served with airport capacity. Increases proposed at City Airport will not be significant enough to warrant the expenditure of somewhere between \$100 and \$145 million, as estimates indicate; and

Whereas, The plans for Detroit City Airport are ambitious and a major commitment for the area. In addition to the financial commitment, which would include the costs for relocating a portion of Van Dyke Avenue, the proposal entails environmental issues, especially increased noise. To take on a task like this, it must be clear that the benefits are worth the expenditures and the impact on the community. In this instance, with ample airport resources in the area, the project should not be undertaken; now, therefore, be it
