## SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 4481

A bill to establish the foster care independence program; to provide certain services for certain youth in foster care due to child abuse or child neglect; and to prescribe the duties of certain state departments.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. (1) This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 "foster care independence act".
- 3 (2) As used in this act:
- 4 (a) "Adjudicated delinquent" means an individual found to have
- 5 committed an offense that, if committed by an adult, would be a
- 6 criminal offense.
- 7 (b) "Child abuse" and "child neglect" mean those terms as
- 8 defined in section 2 of the child protection law, 1975 PA 238, MCL

- 2 (c) "Department" means the department of human services.
- 3 (d) "Foster care" means 24-hour substitute care for children
- 4 placed away from their parents or guardians for whom the state
- 5 agency has placement and care responsibility. Foster care placement
- 6 includes, but is not limited to, placement in foster family homes,
- 7 child care institutions, and preadoptive placements.
- 8 (e) "Young adult" means an individual 14 years of age or older
- 9 but less than 21 years of age.
- 10 Sec. 2. (1) The department shall establish the foster care
- 11 independence program to offer education, training, employment, and
- 12 financial support for young adults leaving foster care.
- 13 (2) The foster care independence program created under
- 14 subsection (1) shall do all of the following:
- 15 (a) Identify young adults who are likely to remain in foster
- 16 care until 18 years of age and help these children make the
- 17 transition to self-sufficiency by providing services such as
- 18 assistance in obtaining a high school diploma, career exploration,
- 19 vocational training, job placement and retention, training in daily
- 20 living skills, training in budgeting and financial management
- 21 skills, substance abuse prevention, and preventive health
- 22 activities, including smoking avoidance, nutrition education, and
- 23 pregnancy prevention.
- 24 (b) Help young adults who are likely to remain in foster care
- 25 until 18 years of age receive education, training, and services
- 26 necessary to obtain employment.
- (c) Help young adults who are likely to remain in foster care

- 1 until 18 years of age prepare for and enter postsecondary training
- 2 and education institutions.
- 3 (d) Provide personal and emotional support to children aging
- 4 out of foster care, through mentors and the promotion of
- 5 interactions with dedicated adults.
- 6 (e) Provide financial, housing, counseling, employment,
- 7 education, and other appropriate support and services to former
- 8 foster care recipients between 18 and 21 years of age to complement
- 9 their own efforts to achieve self-sufficiency and to assure that
- 10 program participants recognize and accept their personal
- 11 responsibility for preparing for and then making the transition
- 12 from adolescence to adulthood.
- Sec. 3. (1) A young adult is eligible for services under this
- 14 act if he or she is or has been in a foster care placement through
- 15 the state based on child abuse or child neglect on or after his or
- 16 her fourteenth birthday.
- 17 (2) A young adult is not eligible for services under this act
- 18 if 1 or more of the following apply:
- 19 (a) The young adult is in an out-of-home placement solely as
- 20 an adjudicated delinquent. If the young adult is currently an
- 21 adjudicated delinquent but met the eliqibility criteria before his
- 22 or her adjudication, services may be provided under this act.
- 23 (b) The young adult was never in an out-of-home placement
- 24 based on child abuse or child neglect.
- 25 (c) The young adult is in a detention facility or other state-
- 26 operated facility.
- 27 (3) Services under this act shall be provided to eligible

- 1 young adults 14 years of age and older regardless of the permanency
- 2 planning goal. Services under this act shall be available to all
- 3 eligible young adults after case closure through 20 years of age.
- 4 Services under this act shall be provided on an "as-needed" basis.
- 5 Sec. 4. (1) The department shall provide at least all of the
- 6 following goods and services to eligible young adults in the foster
- 7 care independence program:
- 8 (a) Services that are not available from other funding sources
- 9 or agencies for eligible young adults currently in the foster care
- 10 system and for young adults released from foster care before
- 11 reaching 21 years of age.
- 12 (b) Educational support.
- 13 (c) Classes or groups on interpersonal communication and
- 14 building and maintaining relationships and classes or groups on
- 15 independent living skills.
- 16 (d) Stipends to cover the cost of utility deposits, security
- 17 deposits, and first month's rent to eligible young adults who are
- 18 leaving foster care or have left foster care because they have
- 19 reached 18 years of age but have not reached 21 years of age. The
- 20 first month's rent and damage deposit may only be provided to young
- 21 adults 18 to 21 years of age who are leaving foster care or who
- 22 have left foster care because they attained 18 or 19 years of age
- 23 and have not reached 21 years of age.
- 24 (2) The department shall make known a list of goods and
- 25 services provided under the program established in this act.
- 26 Sec. 5. The department may provide goods and services allowed
- 27 under federal law and any other goods and services the department

1 considers appropriate.
