THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

Sec. 319. (1) The secretary of state shall immediately suspend 2 a person's license as provided in this section upon receiving a 3 record of the person's conviction for a crime described in this 4 section, whether the conviction is under a law of this state, a 5 local ordinance substantially corresponding to a law of this state, or a law of another state substantially corresponding to a law of

- 1 (2) The secretary of state shall suspend the person's license
- 2 for 1 year for any of the following crimes:

- 12 secretary of state under any law requiring the registration of a
- 13 motor vehicle or regulating the operation of a vehicle on a
