## **SENATE BILL No. 804**

## September 24, 2007, Introduced by Senators SWITALSKI, JACOBS, PAPPAGEORGE and KAHN and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to amend 1979 PA 94, entitled

"The state school aid act of 1979,"

by amending section 98 (MCL 388.1698), as amended by 2006 PA 342.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1	Sec. 98. (1) From the state school aid fund money appropriated
2	in section 11, there is allocated an amount not to exceed
3	\$500,000.00 for 2006-2007 and from the general fund money
4	appropriated in section 11, there is allocated an amount not to
5	exceed <del>\$2,250,000.00</del> <b>\$1,750,000.00</b> for 2006-2007 to provide a grant
6	to the Michigan virtual university for the development,
7	implementation, and operation of the Michigan virtual high school;
8	to provide professional development opportunities for educators;
9	and to fund other purposes described in this section. In addition,
10	from the federal funds appropriated in section 11, there is

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1 allocated for 2006-2007 an amount estimated at \$3,250,000.00.

2 (2) The Michigan virtual high school shall have the following3 goals:

4 (a) Significantly expand curricular offerings for high schools
5 across this state through agreements with districts or licenses
6 from other recognized providers. The Michigan virtual high school
7 shall explore options for providing rigorous civics curricula
8 online.

9 (b) Create statewide instructional models using interactive
10 multimedia tools delivered by electronic means, including, but not
11 limited to, the internet, digital broadcast, or satellite network,
12 for distributed learning at the high school level.

13 (c) Provide pupils with opportunities to develop skills and14 competencies through on-line learning.

15 (d) Provide online test preparation resources for pupils.

16 (e) Grant high school diplomas through a dual enrollment17 method with districts.

(f) Act as a broker for college level equivalent courses, as
defined in section 1471 of the revised school code, MCL 380.1471,
and dual enrollment courses from postsecondary education

21 institutions.

(3) From the general fund money allocated in subsection (1),
an amount estimated at, but not to exceed \$500,000.00, shall be
used by the Michigan virtual high school to provide online test
preparation resources for all Michigan high school pupils using
web-based tools that align with the Michigan merit exam
requirements, including the ACT and the revised MEAP exam. These

1 resources shall include the following:

2 (a) Practice test opportunities for students.

3 (b) Information on effective test taking strategies.

4 (c) Diagnostic tools to identify student learning gaps.

5 (d) Self-paced online instructional tutorials.

6 (e) Electronic reports that provide feedback for students and
7 school personnel.

8 (3) (4)—The Michigan virtual high school course offerings
9 shall include, but are not limited to, all of the following:

10 (a) Information technology courses.

11 (b) College level equivalent courses, as defined in section12 1471 of the revised school code, MCL 380.1471.

13 (c) Courses and dual enrollment opportunities.

14 (d) Programs and services for at-risk pupils.

(e) General education development test preparation courses foradjudicated youth.

17 (f) Special interest courses.

18 (g) Professional development programs and services for19 teachers.

20 (4) (5) From the federal funds allocated in subsection (1), there is allocated for 2006-2007 an amount estimated at 21 22 \$2,250,000.00 from DED-OESE, title II, improving teacher quality 23 funds for a grant to the Michigan virtual university for the 24 purpose of this subsection. The state education agency shall sign a 25 memorandum of understanding with the Michigan virtual university 26 regarding the DED-OESE, title II, improving teacher quality funds 27 as provided under this subsection. The memorandum of understanding

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under this subsection shall require that the Michigan virtual
 university coordinate the following activities related to DED-OESE,
 title II, improving teacher quality funds in accordance with
 federal law:

5 (a) Develop, and assist districts in the development and use
6 of, proven, innovative strategies to deliver intensive professional
7 development programs that are both cost-effective and easily
8 accessible, such as strategies that involve delivery through the
9 use of technology, peer networks, and distance learning.

10 (b) Encourage and support the training of teachers and
11 administrators to effectively integrate technology into curricula
12 and instruction.

13 (c) Coordinate the activities of eligible partnerships that 14 include higher education institutions for the purposes of providing 15 professional development activities for teachers,

16 paraprofessionals, and principals as defined in federal law.

17 (d) Offer teachers opportunities to learn new skills and18 strategies for developing and delivering instructional services.

(e) Provide online professional development opportunities for
educators to update and expand knowledge and skills needed to
support the Michigan merit curriculum core content standards and
credit requirements.

(5) (6) The Michigan virtual university shall offer at least
200 hours of online professional development for classroom teachers
under this section each fiscal year beginning in 2006-2007 without
charge to the teachers or to districts or intermediate districts. A
district or intermediate district may require a full-time teacher

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to participate in at least 5 hours of online professional development provided by the Michigan virtual university under subsection (5)-(4). Five hours of this professional development shall be considered to be part of the 38 hours allowed to be counted as hours of pupil instruction under section 101(10).

6 (6) (7) From the federal funds appropriated in subsection (1), there is allocated for 2006-2007 an amount estimated at 7 \$1,000,000.00 from the DED-OESE, title II, educational technology 8 9 grant funds to support e-learning and virtual school initiatives 10 consistent with the goals contained in the United States national 11 educational technology plan issued in January 2005. Not later than 12 November 30, 2006, from the funds allocated in this subsection, the 13 department shall award a single grant of \$1,000,000.00 to a 14 consortium or partnership established by the Michigan virtual 15 university that meets the requirements of this subsection. To be 16 eligible for this funding, a consortium or partnership established 17 by the Michigan virtual university shall include at least 1 18 intermediate district and at least 1 high-need local district. All 19 of the following apply to this funding:

20 (a) An eligible consortium or partnership must demonstrate the21 following:

(i) Prior success in delivering online courses and
instructional services to K-12 pupils throughout this state.

24 (*ii*) Expertise in designing, developing, and evaluating online
25 K-12 course content.

26 (iii) Experience in maintaining a statewide help desk service27 for pupils, online teachers, and other school personnel.

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(*iv*) Knowledge and experience in providing technical assistance
 and support to K-12 schools in the area of online education.

3 (v) Experience in training and supporting K-12 educators in
4 this state to teach online courses.

5 (vi) Demonstrated technical expertise and capacity in managing6 complex technology systems.

7 (vii) Experience promoting twenty-first century learning skills8 through the use of online technologies.

9 (b) The Michigan virtual university, which operates the
10 Michigan virtual high school, shall perform the following tasks
11 related to this funding:

12 (i) Examine the curricular and specific course content needs of
13 middle and high school students in the areas of mathematics and
14 science.

15 (*ii*) Design, develop, and acquire online courses and related 16 supplemental resources aligned to state standards to create a 17 comprehensive and rigorous statewide catalog of online courses and 18 instructional services.

19 (*iii*) Conduct a demonstration pilot to promote new and20 innovative online courses and instructional services.

(*iv*) Evaluate existing online teaching and learning practices
and develop continuous improvement strategies to enhance student
achievement.

(v) Develop, support, and maintain the technology
infrastructure and related software required to deliver online
courses and instructional services to students statewide.

27 (7) (8) From the state school aid fund allocation in

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subsection (1), an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00 for 2006-2007
 shall be awarded as a single grant to an intermediate district
 working in partnership with the Michigan virtual high school for a
 statewide license for "my dream explorer", a career exploration and
 planning tool, to be made available to all pupils at no cost.

6 (8) (9) If a home-schooled or nonpublic school student is a
7 resident of a district that subscribes to services provided by the
8 Michigan virtual high school, the student may use the services
9 provided by the Michigan virtual high school to the district
10 without charge to the student beyond what is charged to a district
11 pupil using the same services.

12 (9) (10) All activities funded under this section relating to 13 science shall include the use of the scientific method to 14 critically evaluate scientific theories and the use of relevant 15 scientific data to assess the validity of those theories.

16 (10) (11) As used in this section:

17 (a) "DED-OESE" means the United States department of education18 office of elementary and secondary education.

19 (b) "High-need local district" means a local educational 20 agency as defined in the enhancing education through technology 21 part of the no child left behind act of 2001, Public Law 107-110.

22 (c) "State education agency" means the department.

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
