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HOUSE BILL No. 5876

EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 23, 2010, Introduced by Rep. Miller and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for community colleges and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to establish or continue certain funds, programs, and categories; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, employees, and officers.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 PART 1

LINE-ITEM APPROPRIATIONS

Sec. 101. Subject to the conditions set forth in this bill, the amounts listed in this part are appropriated for community colleges and certain other state purposes relating to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011, from the funds indicated

in this part. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state 6 7 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources under part 1 for fiscal year 2010-2011 is \$299,100,500.00 and state 8 9 spending from state resources to be paid to local units of 10 government for fiscal year 2010-2011 is \$299,100,500.00. The appropriations authorized under this bill are 18 subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 19 to 18.1594. 20 Sec. 203. Unless otherwise specified, a community college 21 receiving appropriations in part 1 and the department of energy, 22 labor, and economic growth shall use the Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This requirement may include 23 24 transmission of reports via electronic mail to the recipients 25 identified for each reporting requirement or it may include

- 1 placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.
- 2 Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for
- 3 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if
- 4 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods or
- 5 services, or both, are available. Preference should be given to
- 6 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 7 businesses, if they are competitively priced and of comparable
- 8 quality. In addition, preference should be given to goods or
- 9 services, or both, that are manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 10 businesses owned and operated by veterans, if they are
- 11 competitively priced and of comparable quality.
- Sec. 210. The principal executive officer of each community
- 13 college receiving appropriations in part 1 shall take all
- 14 reasonable steps to ensure businesses in deprived and depressed
- 15 communities compete for and perform contracts to provide services
- 16 or supplies, or both. Each principal executive officer shall
- 17 strongly encourage firms with which the community college contracts
- 18 to subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and deprived
- 19 communities for services or supplies, or both.
- 20 Sec. 211. (1) The money appropriated in this bill is
- 21 appropriated for community colleges with fiscal years ending June
- 22 30, 2011 and shall be paid out of the state treasury and
- 23 distributed by the state treasurer to the respective community
- 24 colleges in 11 monthly installments on the sixteenth of each month,
- 25 or the next succeeding business day, beginning with October 16,
- 26 2010. Each community college shall accrue its July and August 2011
- 27 payments to its institutional fiscal year ending June 30, 2011.

- 1 However, if a community college fails to submit all verified
- 2 Michigan community colleges activities classification structure
- 3 data for school year 2009-2010 to the department of energy, labor,
- 4 and economic growth by November 1, 2010, the monthly installments
- 5 shall be withheld from that community college until those data are
- 6 submitted. The amount distributed to a community college or
- 7 department shall not exceed the net state allocation authorized by
- 8 this bill.
- 9 (2) Except as otherwise provided by law, each of the amounts
- 10 appropriated shall be used solely for the respective purposes
- 11 stated in this bill. The money appropriated in this bill may be
- 12 used to match the cost of any available programs under the Carl D.
- 13 Perkins vocational and applied technology education act of 1998, 20
- 14 USC 2301 to 2414, including local administration.
- Sec. 216. (1) A community college shall pay the employer's
- 16 contributions to the Michigan public school employees' retirement
- 17 system created by the public school employees retirement act of
- 18 1979, 1980 PA 300, MCL 38.1301 to 38.1408, as a condition of
- 19 receiving money appropriated under this bill.
- 20 (2) A community college shall not pay an employer's
- 21 contribution to more than 1 retirement fund providing benefits for
- 22 an employee.
- 23 Sec. 217. Money appropriated in part 1 shall not be used to
- 24 pay for the construction or maintenance of a self-liquidating
- 25 project.
- Sec. 224. (1) Recognizing the critical importance of education
- 27 in strengthening Michigan's workforce, the state's public community

- 1 colleges are encouraged to explore ways of increasing collaboration
- 2 and cooperation with 4-year universities, particularly in the areas
- 3 related to training, instruction, and program articulation.
- 4 (2) Recognizing the central role of community colleges in
- 5 responding to local employment needs and challenges, community
- 6 colleges shall develop and continue efforts to collaborate with
- 7 local employers and students to identify local employment needs and
- 8 strategies to meet them.
- 9 (3) Community colleges are encouraged to collaborate with each
- 10 other on innovations to identify and meet local employment needs.
- 11 Sec. 234. Community colleges shall do the following:
- 12 (a) Undertake active measures to promote equal opportunities,
- 13 eliminate discrimination, and foster a diverse student body and
- 14 administration among all people including, but not limited to,
- 15 women, minorities, seniors, veterans, and people with disabilities.
- 16 (b) Review, analyze, and eradicate activities that may tend to
- 17 discriminate.
- 18 Sec. 241. (1) Community colleges are encouraged to expand
- 19 their current nursing education programs and increase nursing
- 20 education program enrollments. This expansion may include, but is
- 21 not limited to, creating partnerships with hospitals and other
- 22 health care providers, encouraging programs that assist in placing
- 23 students at all levels of nursing, recruiting and hiring a larger
- 24 number of individuals with masters degrees in nursing as
- 25 instructors, and redirecting existing institutional resources
- 26 toward nursing education programs.
- 27 (2) Community colleges are encouraged to coordinate with the

- 1 chief nurse executive in the department of community health and
- 2 with 4-year universities to improve access to nursing programs and
- 3 to assist students to successfully enter the nursing workforce.
- 4 Sec. 247. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used to
- 5 enter into a lease for, or to purchase, a vehicle assembled or
- 6 manufactured outside of the United States if competitively priced
- 7 and comparable quality vehicles made in the state of Michigan or
- 8 elsewhere in the United States of America are available.
- 9 Sec. 249. Community college districts are encouraged to
- 10 evaluate and pursue efficiency and cost-containment measures that
- 11 maximize state funding. Community colleges shall identify practices
- 12 that increase efficiencies, including, but not limited to,
- 13 establishing joint ventures, consolidating services, utilizing
- 14 program collaborations, maximizing educational benefits through
- 15 optimal class sizes and frequency of course offerings, increasing
- 16 web-based instruction, eliminating low-enrollment and high-cost
- 17 instructional programs, using self-insurance, practicing energy
- 18 conservation, and utilizing group purchasing. Efficiency efforts
- 19 shall also include reviewing proposed capital outlay projects to
- 20 increase coordination and utilization of new facilities, renovation
- 21 projects, and technology improvements.

22 STATE AID - OPERATIONS

- Sec. 301. Unless otherwise stated, all data items used in
- 24 determining state aid in this bill are as defined in the "2001
- 25 Manual for Uniform Financial Reporting, Michigan Public Community
- 26 Colleges," which shall be the basis for reporting data, and the
- 27 "Activities Classification Structure Manual for Michigan Community

- 1 Colleges," as amended, which shall be used to document financial
- 2 needs of the community colleges.
- 3 Sec. 302. A community college shall not include in the
- 4 enrollment data reported for determining state aid under this bill
- 5 any student credit hours or student contact hours for a student
- 6 incarcerated in a Michigan penal institution. Exclusion of these
- 7 students is intended to avoid the payment of state aid under this
- 8 bill for the same individuals for whom reimbursement is provided by
- 9 the state correctional system.

10 GRANTS

- 11 Sec. 401. (1) The community college at-risk student success
- 12 program is continued. The funding shall be prorated among community
- 13 colleges based on the number of student contact hours for
- 14 developmental and preparatory instruction reported by each
- 15 community college to the department of energy, labor, and economic
- 16 growth pursuant to the "Activities Classification Structure Manual
- 17 for Michigan Community Colleges, " as amended. Of the amount
- 18 appropriated in part 1 for the at-risk student success program,
- 19 \$1,120,000.00 is allocated for base grants of \$40,000.00 each, to
- 20 address the special needs of at-risk students at community
- 21 colleges.
- 22 (2) Of the amount appropriated in part 1 for the at-risk
- 23 student success program, the balance of the appropriated money
- 24 shall be distributed on a proration utilizing the sum of the most
- 25 recent 3 years developmental/preparatory contact hours divided by
- 26 the sum of the 3-year total contact hours at each college. Each
- 27 community college's percentage shall be divided by the sum of all

the percentages systemwide to obtain each community college'sprorated grant amount.

- 6 (4) As used in this bill, "at-risk students" means students
- 7 who meet 1 or more of the following criteria:
- 8 (a) Are initially placed in 1 or more developmental courses as
 9 a result of standardized testing or as a result of failure to make
 10 satisfactory academic progress.
- 11 (b) Are diagnosed as learning disabled.
- 12 (c) Require English as a second language (ESL) assistance.
- (5) Grant funding under this section shall be utilized to 13 14 address the special needs of at-risk students. Activities related to services provided to at-risk students include, but are not 15 16 limited to, pretesting for academic ability, counseling contacts, 17 and special programs. Equipment or information technology hardware 18 or software purchased under this section must be associated with 19 the operation of a program designed to address the needs of at-risk 20 students.
- 21 (6) Grant funding under this section shall not be used for 22 indirect costs including, but not limited to, rent, utilities, or, 23 except as provided in this section, college administration.
- 24 (7) Each community college shall report to the department of 25 energy, labor, and economic growth a summary of all accomplishments 26 under, expenditures for, and compliance with the intent of this 27 program, including the number of at-risk students served. The

- 1 report is subject to audit as provided for in section 502(1). The
- 2 report shall be submitted not later than 90 days after the end of
- 3 the state's fiscal year.
- 4 Sec. 404. The appropriation in part 1 for renaissance zone
- 5 reimbursements shall be made to each eligible recipient no later
- 6 than 60 days after the department of treasury certifies to the
- 7 state budget director that it has received all necessary
- 8 information to properly determine the amounts due each eligible
- 9 recipient under section 12 of the Michigan renaissance zone act,
- 10 1996 PA 376, MCL 125.2692.
- 11 Sec. 405. A community college receiving funds under this bill
- 12 shall cooperate with the state to comply with the provisions of the
- 13 American recovery and reinvestment act of 2009, Public Law 111-5,
- 14 requiring the establishment of a statewide P-20 longitudinal data
- 15 system.

16 REPORTS AND AUDITS

- 17 Sec. 502. (1) The auditor general or a certified public
- 18 accountant appointed by the auditor general may conduct performance
- 19 audits of community colleges as the auditor general considers
- 20 necessary.
- 21 (2) Not more than 60 days after an audit report is released by
- 22 the office of the auditor general, the principal executive officer
- 23 of the community college that was audited shall submit to the house
- 24 and senate appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal
- 25 agencies, the department of energy, labor, and economic growth, the
- 26 auditor general, and the state budget director a plan to comply
- 27 with audit recommendations. The plan shall contain projected dates

- 1 and resources required, if any, to achieve compliance with the
- 2 audit recommendations, or a documented explanation of the college's
- 3 noncompliance with the audit recommendations concerning the matters
- 4 on which the audited community college and office of the auditor
- 5 general disagree.
- 6 Sec. 504. (1) A community college shall retain certified class
- 7 summaries, class lists, registration documents, and student
- 8 transcripts that are consistent with the taxonomy of courses. For
- 9 each enrollment period during the fiscal year, these certified
- 10 documents shall identify clearly by course the number of in-
- 11 district and out-of-district student credit and contact hours. The
- 12 class summaries and class lists shall be consistent with each other
- 13 and shall include the course prefix and numbers, course title,
- 14 course credit and contact hours, credit and contact hours generated
- 15 by each student, and activity classifications consistent with the
- 16 taxonomy. An auditable process shall be used by the community
- 17 college to determine the unduplicated head count for in-district
- 18 students, out-of-district students, and prisoners for each
- 19 enrollment period during the fiscal year.
- 20 (2) Contracts between the community college and agencies that
- 21 reimburse the community college for the costs of instruction shall
- 22 be retained for audit purposes.
- 23 Sec. 505. Each community college shall have an annual audit of
- 24 all income and expenditures performed by an independent auditor and
- 25 shall furnish the independent auditor's management letter and an
- 26 annual audited accounting of all general and current funds income
- 27 and expenditures including audits of college foundations to the

- 1 members of the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on
- 2 community colleges, the senate and house fiscal agencies, the
- 3 auditor general, the department of energy, labor, and economic
- 4 growth, and the state budget director before November 15, 2010. If
- 5 a community college fails to furnish the audit materials, the
- 6 monthly state aid installments shall be withheld from that college
- 7 until the information is submitted. All reporting shall conform to
- 8 the requirements set forth in the "2001 Manual for Uniform
- 9 Financial Reporting, Michigan Public Community Colleges."
- 10 Sec. 506. (1) Each community college shall report the
- 11 following to the department of energy, labor, and economic growth
- 12 no later than November 1, 2010:
- 13 (a) The number of North American Indian students enrolled each
- 14 term for the previous fiscal year, using guidelines and procedures
- 15 developed by the department of energy, labor, and economic growth
- 16 and the Michigan commission on Indian affairs.
- 17 (b) The number of North American Indian tuition waivers
- 18 granted each term, and the monetary value of the waivers for the
- 19 previous fiscal year.
- 20 (2) Colleges shall use the criteria cited in 1976 PA 174, MCL
- 21 390.1251 to 390.1253, to determine eligibility for tuition waivers,
- 22 and shall grant those waivers to individuals who meet the criteria
- 23 and request tuition waivers.
- Sec. 507. Upon request, a community college shall inform
- 25 interested Michigan high schools of the aggregate academic status
- 26 of its students for the prior academic year, in a manner prescribed
- 27 by the Michigan community college association and in cooperation

- 1 with the Michigan association of secondary school principals.
- 2 Sec. 508. Each community college shall report to the house and
- 3 senate fiscal agencies, the state budget director, and the
- 4 department of energy, labor, and economic growth by August 31,
- 5 2010, the tuition and mandatory fees paid by a full-time in-
- 6 district student and a full-time out-of-district student as
- 7 established by the college governing board for the 2010-2011
- 8 academic year. This report should also include the annual cost of
- 9 attendance based on a full-time course load of 30 credits. Each
- 10 community college shall also report any revisions to the reported
- 11 2010-2011 academic year tuition and mandatory fees adopted by the
- 12 college governing board to the house and senate fiscal agencies,
- 13 the state budget director, and the department of energy, labor, and
- 14 economic growth within 15 days of being adopted.
- Sec. 509. Each community college shall report to the
- 16 department of energy, labor, and economic growth the numbers and
- 17 types of associate degrees and other certificates awarded during
- 18 the previous fiscal year. The report shall be made not later than
- 19 November 15, 2010.
- 20 Sec. 510. A community college receiving funding under this
- 21 bill and also subject to the student right-to-know and campus
- 22 security act, Public Law 101-542, 104 Stat. 2381, shall make a copy
- 23 of all material prepared in accordance with the public information
- 24 reporting requirements under the crime awareness and campus
- 25 security act of 1990, title II of the student right-to-know and
- 26 campus security act, Public Law 101-542, 104 Stat. 2384, available
- 27 in hard copy and electronic format accessible through the Internet

1 for school districts, parents, and students.
