The report shall include fund sources used and the amount of expenditures and shall be submitted to the legislature by December 31, 2015.

Sec. 504. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the department shall provide a report to the legislature on the use of registration fees collected from privately owned cervid operations. Appropriations in part 1 from cervidae licensing and inspection

# 11 GENERAL SECTIONS

Sec. 2001. It is the intent of the legislature to provide 12 appropriations for the fiscal year ending on September 30, 2017 for 13 14 the line items listed in part 1. The fiscal year 2016-2017 15 appropriations are anticipated to be the same as those for fiscal 16 year 2015-2016, except that the line items will be adjusted for 17 changes in caseload and related costs, federal fund match rates, 18 economic factors, and available revenue. These adjustments will be 19 determined after the January 2016 consensus revenue estimating 20 conference.
