SUMMARY:

House Bill 4082 would amend 1921 PA 2, which prescribes certain powers and duties of the State Administrative Board, to provide that the board may not transfer funds from the Strategic Outreach and Attraction Reserve Fund, the Critical Industry Program, or the Michigan Strategic Site Readiness Program.

1921 PA 2 created the State Administrative Board and enumerates several of its powers and duties. Under the act, the board does not have the power to transfer to a state department, board, commission, officer, or institution any sum from the amount appropriated by the legislature for any other purpose, except that the board may inter-transfer funds within the appropriation for a particular department, board, commission, officer, or institution.

Under the bill, the State Administrative Board could not transfer or inter-transfer any funds that are appropriated to or deposited in the Strategic Outreach and Attraction Reserve Fund created under the Michigan Trust Fund Act or that are appropriated or transferred for the Critical Industry Program created under the Michigan Strategic Fund Act or the Michigan Strategic Site Readiness Program created under the Michigan Strategic Fund Act.

[The Strategic Outreach and Attraction Reserve Fund, the Michigan Strategic Site Readiness Program, and the Critical Industry Program are respectively proposed by Senate Bills 769, 770, and 771 and the largely identical House Bills 5602, 5603, and 5604.]

House Bill 4082 is tie-barred to Senate Bills 769 and 771 and House Bill 5603, which means that it could not take effect unless all three of those bills were also enacted.
