## **SENATE BILL NO. 1078**

June 09, 2022, Introduced by Senator MCBROOM and referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled "Michigan vehicle code,"

by amending sections 627 and 679a (MCL 257.627 and 257.679a), section 627 as amended by 2019 PA 31.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

Sec. 627. (1) A person An individual operating a vehicle on a highway shall operate that vehicle at a careful and prudent speed not greater than nor or less than is reasonable and proper, having due regard to the traffic, surface, and width of the highway and of 1 any other condition existing at the time. A person An individual
2 shall not operate a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than
3 that which will permit a stop within the assured, clear distance
4 ahead. A violation of this subsection shall be known and may be
5 referred to as a violation of the basic speed law or "VBSL".

6 (2) Except as provided in subsection (1), it is lawful for the
7 operator of a vehicle to operate that vehicle on a highway at a
8 speed not exceeding the following:

9 (a) 15 miles per hour on a highway segment within the
10 boundaries of a mobile home park, as that term is defined in
11 section 2 of the mobile home commission act, 1987 PA 96, MCL
12 125.2302.

13 (b) 25 miles per hour on a highway segment within a business14 district.

(c) 25 miles per hour on a highway segment within the boundaries of a public park. A local authority may decrease the speed limit to not less than 15 miles per hour in a public park under its jurisdiction.

(d) 25 miles per hour on a highway segment within the boundaries of a residential subdivision, including a condominium subdivision, consisting of a system of interconnected highways with no through highways and a limited number of dedicated highways that serve as entrances to and exits from the subdivision.

(e) Until January 1, 2024, 25 miles per hour on a highway
segment that is part of the local street system as designated by a
local jurisdiction and approved by the state transportation
commission under 1951 PA 51, MCL 247.651 to 247.675, and that is
within land that is zoned for residential use by the governing body
of an incorporated city or village under the Michigan zoning

enabling act, 2006 PA 110, MCL 125.3101 to 125.3702, unless another speed is fixed and posted. The department of state police shall perform a speed study on a random sample of local streets set under this subdivision. No later than January 1, 2023, the department of state police shall submit a report on the speed study required under this subdivision to the senate majority leader, the speaker of the house of representatives, and the governor.

8 (f) 25 miles per hour on a highway segment with 60 or more9 vehicular access points within 1/2 mile.

10 (g) 30 miles per hour on a highway segment with not less than 11 50 vehicular access points but no more than 59 vehicular access 12 points within 1/2 mile.

13 (h) 35 miles per hour on a highway segment with not less than
14 45 vehicular access points but no more than 49 vehicular access
15 points within 1/2 mile.

16 (i) 40 miles per hour on a highway segment with not less than 17 40 vehicular access points but no more than 44 vehicular access 18 points within 1/2 mile.

(j) 45 miles per hour on a highway segment with not less than
30 vehicular access points but no more than 39 vehicular access
points within 1/2 mile.

(3) A person An individual operating a truck with a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or more, a truck-tractor, a truck-tractor with a semi-trailer or trailer, or a combination of these vehicles shall not exceed a speed of 35 miles per hour during the period when reduced loadings are being enforced in accordance with this chapter.

28 (4) Where the posted speed limit is greater than 65 miles per
29 hour, a person an individual operating a school bus, a truck with a

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1 gross weight of 10,000 pounds or more, a truck-tractor, or a truck-2 tractor with a semi-trailer or trailer or a combination of these 3 vehicles shall not exceed a speed of 65 miles per hour on a limited 4 access freeway or a state trunk line highway.

5 (5) All of the following apply to the speed limits described6 in subsection (2):

7 (a) A highway segment adjacent to or lying between 2 or more
8 areas described in subsection (2) (a), (b), (c), or (d) shall is not
9 be considered to be within the boundaries of those areas.

10 (b) A highway segment of more than 1/2 mile in length with a 11 consistent density of vehicular access points equal to the number 12 of vehicular access points described in subsection (2)(f), (g), 13 (h), (i), or (j) shall must be posted at the speed limit specified 14 in the adjoining segment. A separate determination shall must be 15 made for each adjoining highway segment where vehicular access 16 point density is different.

(c) A speed limit may be posted on highways less than 1/2 mile
in length by prorating in 1/10 mile segments the vehicular access
point density described in subsection (2)(f), (g), (h), (i), or
(j).

(6) A person An individual operating a vehicle on a highway, 21 22 when entering and passing through a work zone described in section 23 79d(a) where a normal lane or part of the lane of traffic has been closed due to highway construction, maintenance, or surveying 24 25 activities, shall not exceed a speed of 45 miles per hour unless a different speed limit is determined for that work zone by the state 26 27 transportation department, a county road commission, or a local 28 authority, based on accepted engineering practice. The state 29 transportation department, a county road commission, or a local

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authority shall post speed limit signs in each work zone described in section 79d(a) that indicate the speed limit in that work zone and shall identify that work zone with any other traffic control devices necessary to conform to the Michigan manual of on uniform traffic control devices. A person An individual shall not exceed a speed limit established under this section or a speed limit established under section 628.

8 (7) The state transportation department, a county road 9 commission, or a local authority shall decrease the speed limit in 10 a hospital highway zone by up to 10 miles per hour upon request of 11 a hospital located within that hospital highway zone. The state 12 transportation department, county road commission, or local authority may decrease the speed limit in a hospital highway zone 13 14 by more than 10 miles per hour if the decrease is supported by an 15 engineering and safety study. The state transportation department, 16 county road commission, or local authority shall post speed limit signs in a hospital highway zone that indicate the speed limit in 17 18 that hospital highway zone and shall identify that hospital highway 19 zone with any other traffic control devices necessary to conform to 20 the Michigan manual of on uniform traffic control devices. If a 21 change in a sign, signal, or device, is necessitated by a speed limit decrease described in this subsection, the hospital 22 23 requesting the decrease shall pay the cost of doing so. As used in this subsection, "hospital highway zone" means a portion of state 24 25 trunk line highway maintained by the state transportation department that has a posted speed limit of at least 50 miles per 26 27 hour and has 2 or fewer lanes for travel in the same direction, traverses along property owned by a hospital, contains an ingress 28 29 and egress point from hospital property, and extends not more than

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1,000 feet beyond the boundary lines of hospital property in both 1 2 directions in a municipality.

(8) Subject to subsection (17), the maximum speed limit on all 3 limited access freeways upon which a speed limit is not otherwise 4 5 fixed under this act is 70 miles per hour, which shall be known as 6 the "limited access freeway general speed limit". The minimum speed 7 limit on all limited access freeways upon which a minimum speed 8 limit is not otherwise fixed under this act is 55 miles per hour. 9 This subsection does not apply to an implement of husbandry 10 operating on a limited access freeway between the ingress and 11 egress points on the limited access freeway closest to the Mackinac 12 Bridge for the purpose of crossing the Mackinac Bridge.

(9) Subject to subsection (17), the speed limit on all trunk 13 14 line highways and all county highways upon which a speed limit is 15 not otherwise fixed under this act is 55 miles per hour, which 16 shall be known as the "general speed limit".

17 (10) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the 18 speed limit on all county highways with a gravel or unimproved surface upon which a speed limit is not otherwise fixed under this 19 20 act is 55 miles per hour, which shall be known as the "general gravel road speed limit". Upon request of a municipality located 21 within a county with a population of 1,000,000 or more, the county 22 23 road commission, in conjunction with the requesting municipality, 24 may lower the speed limit to 45 miles per hour on the requested 25 road segment and if a sign, signal, or device is erected or maintained, taken down, or regulated as a result of a request by a 26 27 municipality for a speed limit of 45 miles per hour, the municipality shall pay the costs of doing so. If a municipality 28 29 located within a county with a population of 1,000,000 or more

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requests a speed different than the speed described in this 1 subsection, the county road commission, in conjunction with the 2 department of state police and the requesting municipality, may 3 conduct a speed study of free-flow traffic on the fastest portion 4 5 of the road segment in question for the purpose of establishing a 6 modified speed limit. A speed study conducted under this subsection 7 shall must be completed between 3 and 14 days after a full gravel 8 road maintenance protocol has been performed on the road segment. A 9 full gravel road maintenance protocol described in this subsection 10 shall must include road grading and the application of a dust 11 abatement chemical treatment. Following a speed study conducted 12 under this subsection, the speed limit for the road segment shall **must** be established at the nearest multiple of 5 miles per hour to 13 14 the eighty-fifth percentile of speed of free-flow traffic under 15 ideal conditions for vehicular traffic, and shall must not be set 16 below the fiftieth percentile speed of free-flow traffic under 17 ideal conditions for vehicular traffic. A speed study conducted 18 under this subsection shall be is the responsibility of the department of state police, and if a sign, signal, or device is 19 20 erected or maintained, taken down, or regulated as a result of a request by a municipality under this subsection, the municipality 21 22 shall pay the costs of doing so.

(11) A public record of all traffic control orders establishing statutory speed limits authorized under this section shall must be filed with the office of the clerk of the county in which the county highway is located or at the office of the city or village clerk or administrative office of the airport, college, or university in which the local highway is located, and a certified copy of the traffic control order shall be is evidence in every

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court of this state of the authority for the issuance of that 1 traffic control order. The public record filed with the county, 2 city, or village clerk or administrative office of the airport, 3 college, or university shall must not be required as evidence of 4 5 authority for issuing a traffic control order in the case of signs 6 temporarily erected or placed at points where construction, 7 maintenance, or surveying activities is in progress. A traffic and 8 engineering investigation is not required for a traffic control 9 order for a speed limit established under subsection (2). A traffic 10 control order shall, must, at a minimum, contain all of the 11 following information:

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(a) The name of the road.

13 (b) The boundaries of the segment of the road on which the 14 speed limit is in effect.

15 (c) The basis upon which the speed limit is in effect. 16 (d) The section of law, including a reference to the 17 subsection, under which the speed limit is established.

18 (12) Except for speed limits described in subsections (1), 19 (2) (d), (2) (e), and (9), speed limits established under this 20 section are not valid unless properly posted. In the absence of a properly posted sign, the speed limit in effect is the basic speed 21 law described in subsection (1). Speed limits established under 22 23 subsection (2)(b), (f), (g), (h), (i), and (j) are not valid unless 24 a traffic control order is filed as described in subsection (11). 25 (13) Nothing in this section prevents the establishment of a

modified speed limit after a speed study as described in section 26 27 628. A modified speed limit established under section 628 supersedes a speed limit established under this section. 28

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(14) All signs erected or placed under this section shall must

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conform to the Michigan manual on uniform traffic control devices.

2 (15) If upon investigation the state transportation department or county road commission and the department of state police 3 determine that it is in the interest of public safety, they may 4 5 order city, village, airport, college, university, and township 6 officials to erect and maintain, take down, or regulate speed limit 7 signs, signals, and devices as directed. In default of an order, 8 the state transportation department or county road commission may 9 cause designated signs, signals, and devices to be erected and 10 maintained, removed, or regulated in the manner previously directed 11 and pay the costs for doing so out of the designated highway fund. 12 An investigation, including a speed study, conducted under this subsection shall be is the responsibility of the department of 13 14 state police.

15 (16) A person who violates a speed limit established under 16 this section is responsible for a civil infraction.

17 (17) No later than January 5, 2018, the state transportation 18 department and the department of state police shall increase the speed limits on at least 600 miles of limited access freeway to 75 19 20 miles per hour if an engineering and safety study and the eightyfifth percentile speed of free-flowing traffic under ideal 21 conditions of that section contain findings that the speed limit 22 23 may be raised to that speed, and the department shall increase the speed limit of 900 miles of trunk line highway to 65 miles per hour 24 25 if an engineering and safety study and the eighty-fifth percentile speed of free-flowing traffic under ideal conditions of that 26 27 section contain findings that the speed limit may be raised to that 28 speed.

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(18) As used in this section:

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(a) "Traffic control order" means a document filed with the
 proper authority that establishes the legal and enforceable speed
 limit for the highway segment described in the document.

4 (b) "Vehicular access point" means a driveway or intersecting5 roadway.

6 Sec. 679a. (1) A person Subject to subsection (3), an 7 individual shall not operate a motorcycle with less than a 125 8 cubic centimeter engine, moped, farm tractor, or other self-9 propelled farm implement - nor shall a on a limited access freeway 10 in this state. A pedestrian, bicycle, except as provided in this 11 section, or other nonmotorized traffic be-is not permitted on a 12 limited access highway freeway in this state. Bicycles shall be are permitted on paths constructed separately from the roadway and 13 14 designated for the exclusive use of bicycles.

15 (2) A person who violates this section is responsible for a16 civil infraction.

17 (3) This section does not apply to an implement of husbandry
18 operating on a limited access freeway between the ingress and
19 egress points on the limited access freeway closest to the Mackinac
20 Bridge for the purpose of crossing the Mackinac Bridge.
