

**SENATE SUBSTITUTE FOR
HOUSE BILL NO. 5591**

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to create funds and accounts; to require reports; to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state agencies and officials; to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies; and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies.

19 **GENERAL SECTIONS**

20 Sec. 201. (1) In accordance with the provisions of section 30 of
21 article IX of the state constitution of 1963, total state spending in
22 this appropriation act is \$199,978,100.00 and state appropriations to be
23 paid to local units of government are estimated at \$23,572,200.00. The
24 itemized statement below identifies appropriations from which spending
25 units of local government will occur:

13 (2) If it appears to the principal executive officer of a
14 department
15 or agency that state spending to local units of government will be less
16 than the amount that was projected to be expended under subsection (1),
17 the principal executive officer shall immediately give notice of the
18 approximate shortfall to the state budget director, the senate and house
19 appropriations committees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

20 Sec. 202. The expenditures and fund sources authorized under this
21 act are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
22 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

23 Sec. 203. As used in this act:

24 (a) "Commission" means the commission of natural resources.

25 (b) "DAG" means the United States department of agriculture.

26 (c) "Department" means the department of natural resources.

(d) "DOC" means the United States department of commerce.

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- 1 (e) "DOD" means the United States department of defense.
2 (f) "DOE" means the United States department of energy.
3 (g) "DOI" means the United States department of interior.
4 (h) "DOT" means the United States department of transportation.
5 (i) "EPA" means the United States environmental protection agency.
6 (j) "FTE" means full-time equated.
7 (k) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.
8 (l) "IDT" means intradepartmental transfer.
9 (m) "IGLFC" means international Great Lakes fish commission.
10 (n) "MDOT" means the Michigan department of transportation.

11 Sec. 204. (1) Beginning October 1, 1998, a hiring freeze is
imposed
12 on the state classified civil service. State departments and agencies
13 are prohibited from hiring any new full-time state classified civil
serv-
14 ice employees or prohibited from filling any vacant state classified
15 civil service positions. This hiring freeze does not apply to internal
16 transfers of classified employees from 1 position to another within a
17 department or to positions that are funded with 80% or more federal or
18 restricted funds.
19 (2) The state budget director shall grant exceptions to this hiring
20 freeze when the director believes that such a hiring freeze will result
21 in rendering a state department or agency unable to deliver basic
22 services. The state budget director shall report by the fifteenth of
23 each month to the chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations
24 committees the number of exclusions to the hiring freeze approved during
25 the previous month and the justification for each exclusion.

26 Sec. 205. The department of civil service shall bill departments
27 and agencies at the end of the first fiscal quarter for the 1% charges

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1 authorized by section 5 of article XI of the state constitution of 1963.
2 Payments shall be made for the total amount of the billing by the end of
3 the second fiscal quarter.

4 Sec. 206. (1) From funds appropriated under part 1, the department
5 shall prepare a report that lists all of the following regarding grant,
6 or loan, or grant and loan programs administered by the department for
7 the fiscal year ending on September 30, 1999:

8 (a) The name of each program.

9 (b) The goals of the program, the criteria, including filing fees,
10 and nominating procedures, eligibility, process, and deadlines for each
11 program.

12 (c) The maximum and minimum grant and loan available and whether
13 there is a match requirement for each program.

14 (d) The amount of any required match, and whether in-kind contribu-
15 tions may be used as part or all of a required match.

16 (e) Information pertaining to the application process, timeline for
17 each program, and the contact people within the department.

18 (f) The source of funds for each program, including the citation of
19 pertinent authorizing acts.

20 (g) Information regarding plans for the next fiscal year for the
21 phaseout, expansion, or changes for each program.

22 (h) A listing of all recipients of grants or loans awarded by the
23 department by type and amount of grant or loan.

24 (2) The reports required under this section shall be submitted to
25 the senate and house appropriations committees and the senate and house
26 fiscal agencies by January 1, 2000.

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1 (3) The department shall provide annual public notice of all grant
2 program deadlines or provide a minimum 60-day public notice of each
grant
3 program deadline.

4 Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for the
5 purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if competitively priced
6 American goods or services, or both, of comparable quality are
7 available. By May 1, 1999, the department shall submit a report to the
8 state budget director, the speaker and minority leader of the house of
9 representatives, the majority and minority leaders of the senate, the
10 chairpersons of the senate and house appropriations committees, and the
11 senate and house fiscal agencies on efforts to comply with this section.

12 Sec. 208a. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,
13 each of the following is appropriated:

14 (a) An amount not to exceed \$1,000,000.00 for federal contingency
15 funds.

16 (b) An amount not to exceed \$5,000,000.00 for state restricted con-
17 tingency funds.

18 (c) An amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for local contingency
19 funds.

20 (d) An amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for private contingency
21 funds.

22 (2) The funds appropriated under subsection (1)(a), (b), (c), or
(d)
23 are not available for expenditure until they have been transferred to
24 another line item in this act pursuant to section 393(2) of the manage-
25 ment and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

26 Sec. 209. The state budget director shall provide a list of
27 proposed work projects funded, in whole or in part, from appropriations

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1 in this act to the house and senate appropriations committees on
2 November 15, 1998. This list shall provide detailed information includ-
3 ing the total work project funding level, spending for the fiscal year
4 ending September 30, 1998, and the amount of budget authority required
to
5 complete the project.

6 Sec. 211. (1) The department shall submit to the department of
man-
7 agement and budget, the senate and house appropriations committees, the
8 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the house and senate standing com-
9 mittees having jurisdiction over technology issues quarterly reports on
10 the department's efforts to change the department's computer software
and
11 hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000 and beyond.
12 These reports shall identify actual progress in comparison to the
13 department's approved work plan for these efforts.

14 (2) The department may present progress billings to the department
15 of management and budget for the costs incurred in changing computer
16 software and hardware as necessary to perform properly in the year 2000
17 and beyond. When progress billings are presented for reimbursement, the
18 department of management and budget shall identify and forward as appro-
19 priate the funding sources that should support the work performed.

20 Sec. 212. (1) In the expenditure of funds appropriated under this
21 act, the director of the department of natural resources shall take all
22 reasonable steps to ensure that businesses in deprived and depressed
com-
23 munities compete for and perform contracts to provide services or sup-
24 plies, or both, for the department.

25 (2) The director of the department of natural resources shall
26 strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts to

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1 subcontract with businesses certified by the department of civil rights
2 in depressed and deprived communities for services or supplies, or both.

12 Sec. 214. The department shall provide the state budget director,
13 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources,
14 and the senate and house fiscal agencies with a report twice a year on
15 restricted fund balances, projected revenues, and expenditures.

16 Sec. 215. (1) The department shall provide to the senate and house
17 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies all
 of

18 the following:

19 (a) A monthly report on all personal service contracts awarded
 with-
20 out competitive bidding, pricing, or rate-setting. The report shall
21 include all of the following:

22 (i) The total dollar amount of the contract.

23 (ii) The duration of the contract.

24 (iii) The name of the vendor.

25 (iv) The type of service to be provided.

26 (b) For personal service contracts of \$100,000.00 or more, a
 monthly

27 report including all of the following:

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1 (i) The total dollar amount of the contract.

2 (ii) The duration of the contract.

3 (iii) The name of the vendor.

4 (iv) The type of service to be provided.

5 (c) A monthly listing of all bid requests for proposal that were
6 issued.

7 (d) A monthly summary listing of information that identifies any

12 Sec. 216. The department shall submit to the state budget
director,
13 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources,
14 and the senate and house fiscal agencies by December 30, 1999 an
itemized
15 report of all revenue received by, expenditures made from, and transfers
16 made to or from the Michigan state waterways fund during the fiscal year
17 ending September 30, 1999.

18 Sec. 218. A copy of all reports to the legislature required under
19 this act shall be forwarded to the senate and house majority and
minority
20 policy offices.

21 Sec. 219. The department shall prepare a report on allowing firing
22 of multiple rounds at shooting ranges, specifically addressing safety
and
23 the impact on targets, target areas, and related shooting range
24 infrastructure. The report shall be prepared by April 1, 1999 and

4 Sec. 402. Of the state general fund/general purpose resources
5 appropriated in section 103 to administrative services, \$2,210,000.00 is
6 to provide reimbursement to the game and fish protection fund for senior
7 citizen reimbursement.

8 DEPARTMENTAL OPERATIONAL SUPPORT

9 Sec. 501. On February 1, 1999, the department shall report on
10 gifts, bequests, grants, and donations to the senate and house
appropria-

11 tions subcommittees on natural resources and to the senate and house
12 fiscal agencies. The report shall include both of the following:

13 (a) The amount of contributions, gifts, bequests, grants, and dona-
14 tions received by the department for the fiscal year ending September
30,
15 1998.

16 (b) A listing of the expenditures made from the amounts received as
17 reported in subdivision (a).

18 FISHERIES MANAGEMENT

19 Sec. 602. The department shall annually report to the state budget
20 director, the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural
21 resources, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the amount and dispo-
22 sition of funds received from the Great Lakes fisheries trust. The

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1 report shall include a copy of the trust's annual report and a copy of
2 form 990 filed with the attorney general's office.

3 Sec. 604. (1) From the appropriation in section 106 for stream
4 habitat improvement, not more than \$575,000.00 shall be allocated for

5 grants
6 to watershed councils, resource development councils, soil conservation

7 districts, local government units, and other nonprofit organizations for
8 stream habitat stabilization and soil erosion control.

9 (2) The fisheries division of the department shall develop priority
10 and cost estimates for all recommended projects. Priority shall be

Sec. 608. The department shall not impede the certification
process for water control structures on Michigan waterways. All
certification conditions necessary for compliance with section 401 of
title IV of the federal water pollution control act, chapter 758, 86
Stat. 877, 33 U.S.C. 1341, that are required or requested by the
department shall be paid for, by the department, from funds appropriated
in section 106.

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1 PARKS AND RECREATION

2 Sec. 701. The department may charge the appropriations contained
3 in part 1, including all special maintenance and capital projects appropri-
4 ated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999, for engineering
5 ices provided, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
6 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the
7 engineer-
8 ing services charges provided for in part 1.

8 Sec. 702. The department shall charge state officials that are not
9 on official state business the same fees for admission to state park and
10 recreation facilities as other citizens of the state are charged.

11 Sec. 703. In accordance with section 1902(2) of the natural
12 resources and environmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.1902,
13 there is appropriated from the Michigan natural resources trust fund to
14 the Michigan state parks endowment fund an amount not to exceed
15 \$10,000,000.00 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999.

16 Sec. 703a. The amount appropriated in section 101 from the
17 Michigan
18 civilian conservation corps revenues shall be used to provide job train-
19 ing for public assistance recipients and other low-income youth for
20 natu-
21 ral resources and conservation projects.

22 Sec. 708. The department shall develop a feasibility study to
23 comply with each lake water protection plan which requires owners of
24 lakefront property to transport and dispose of sanitary sewerage or
25 storm
26 water sewerage, or both, at an off-site location. The department shall
provide a copy of each study to each legislator who represents the dis-
trict where the lakefront property is located, and to the senate and
house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources.

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1 MACKINAC ISLAND STATE PARK

2 Sec. 801. This appropriation act includes funding for department
3 technology upgrades and other organizational enhancements financed in
4 whole or in part from early retirement savings generated through section
5 19f of the state employees' retirement act, 1943 PA 240, MCL 38.19f.
The
6 Mackinac Island state park commission shall provide a spending plan
which
7 identifies the amount of these budget savings realized in the fiscal
year
8 ending September 30, 1998 and included in the appropriation for the
9 fiscal year ending September 30, 1999, the purpose and amount of
expendi-
10 tures for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999, and the amount
11 explicitly earmarked for technological improvements financed from early
12 retirement savings. This plan shall be provided to the house and senate
13 appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and to the senate and
14 house fiscal agencies on or before December 15, 1998.

15 FOREST RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

16 Sec. 901. The commission may establish and collect fees for the
17 processing of applications for the use of state forests that require
18 extensive review. The fees shall cover the cost to the department of
19 processing the applications. Any unexpended application fees for the
use
20 of state forests, along with any excess collections from prior fiscal
21 years, shall be carried over into subsequent fiscal years and shall be
22 available for appropriation.

23 Sec. 903. Of the funds appropriated in section 109, the department
24 shall not allow the amount of timber marked for harvest to decrease
below
25 855,000 cords provided that the department takes into consideration the
impact of timber harvesting on wildlife habitat and recreation uses.

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1 Sec. 904. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 for the forest
2 finance authority in the timber harvest program line item in section
3 109,
4 no more than 10.0 FTEs shall be assigned to implement the program. Any
5 additional program administration shall be accomplished through
6 contracts
7 with consulting foresters.

8 Sec. 905. The appropriation in section 109 for abandoned mine
9 shaft
10 closures shall be used to inventory abandoned mine shafts and to reclaim
11 and cap abandoned mine shafts in order of priority as determined by the
12 department. Funds appropriated in section 110 may be used to complete
13 the mine shaft inventory.

14 Sec. 906. With money received from the sale of timber on state
15 land
16 and appropriated in part 1, the department may employ an additional 20
17 full-time temporary employees to serve as firefighters for the 6-month
18 period in which the risk of forest fires is the highest.

19 Sec. 907. As a condition of expenditure of appropriations under
20 section 109, the department shall develop a plan to privatize snowmobile
21 trail grooming activities during the 1999-2000 winter season for state
22 owned or maintained snowmobile trails. This plan shall be submitted to
23 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources
24 and the senate and house fiscal agencies on December 31, 1998.

25 Sec. 908. Of the funds received from the sale of timber on state
land and appropriated in section 109, \$1.00 shall be provided as
reimbursement to the game and fish protection fund if the natural
resources commission does not approve the use of screw-in tree steps for
hunting on state game and recreation areas.

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1 REAL ESTATE

2 Sec. 1001. The department may charge land acquisition projects
3 appropriated for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999, and for
4 prior
5 fiscal years, a standard percentage fee to be determined by the state
6 budget director, and may use the revenue derived to support the land
7 acquisition service charges provided for in section 110.

8 Sec. 1002. The land sale fund is created. An amount equal to the
9 cost of personal services, printing, postage, advertising, contractual
10 services, and facility rental associated with tax reverted lands shall
11 be
12 deducted from the sales and credited to the land sale fund.

13 Sec. 1003. The \$20,000.00 appropriation in section 110 for urban
14 residential property rehabilitation shall be expended in demonstration
15 projects in depressed urban areas. The purpose of these projects shall
16 be to determine the desirability of tax lien purchase agreements as a
17 means to provide clear title to prospective buyers of tax reverted resi-
18 dential properties.

19 Sec. 1004. As a condition for the expenditure of appropriations
20 under section 110, the department shall refund the fee paid by an unsuc-
21 cessful bidder who has nominated state property for sale, when the land
22 is sold.

21 LAW ENFORCEMENT

22 Sec. 1101. A conservation officer or other employee or agent of
23 the
24 department who is paid through an appropriation provided in part 1 and
25 who is acting in an investigative or other official capacity shall not

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1 enter a private residence, vehicle, boat, or other private property
2 without a warrant or consent of the owner, or exception allowed by law.

3 Sec. 1102. As a condition of expenditure of appropriations under
4 section 111, the department shall, in consultation with the snowmobile
5 advisory committee, develop a plan to transfer primary enforcement
6 responsibility, relating to part 821 of the natural resources and envi-
7 ronmental protection act, 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.82101 to 324.82160, to
8 local law enforcement agencies. This plan shall be submitted to the
9 senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources and
10 the senate and house fiscal agencies by February 12, 1999.

11 **GRANTS**

12 Sec. 1201. The amount appropriated in section 113 for federal-
13 rural
14 community fire protection/dry hydrant demonstration projects shall be
15 awarded as grants to local fire protection departments. To be eligible,
16 local fire protection departments shall be located in governmental units
17 or fire protection districts with permanent populations of less than
18 10,000 and contain 1,000 or more acres of publicly owned forested land.
19 Grants shall be limited to a maximum of \$5,000.00 to be used for the
20 pur-
21 chase of materials.

22 Sec. 1202. Of the funds appropriated in section 113 for marine
23 safety grants, \$400,000.00 is appropriated to provide additional patrol
24 hours on Michigan lakes. The department shall report on the
25 distribution
26 of these additional funds to the subcommittees on natural resources of
27 the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on natural resources
28 and the senate and house fiscal agencies by September 30, 1999.

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1 Sec. 1203. (1) Of the funds appropriated in section 113 for
2 community recreation infrastructure grants, \$750,000.00 shall be used to
3 provide grants and loans to local units of government to redevelop and
4 reuse vacant manufacturing facilities or abandoned industrial sites pur-
5 suant to section 71508(1)(c) of 1994 PA 451, MCL 324.71508.

6 (2) The department shall give funding priority to grant and loan
7 requests for \$50,000.00 or less pursuant to this section.

8 **WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT**

9 Sec. 1402. The department shall prepare a report on the number and
10 type of accidents due to the use of raised platforms during firearm deer
11 season. The department shall provide the report to the senate and house
12 appropriations subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies by
13 December 1, 1998.

14 Sec. 1403. Of the funds appropriated in section 105 for wildlife
15 management, \$85,000.00 shall be used to fund a research study at
Michigan

16 State University on the control of swimmer's itch in inland lakes.

Sec. 1404. As a condition of expenditure of appropriations under
section 105, the department shall issue a combined hunting license for
the harvest of deer during firearm, bow and arrow, and any other deer
hunting season. The department shall allow the license applicant to
determine the number of kill tags to be included in the license.
However, the number of kill tags shall not be less than 2 or greater
than a maximum number to be set by the department. The license fee
shall reflect the number of kill tags included in the license. This
section does not prohibit the issuance of any other deer hunting license
otherwise provided for by law.
