Protest

Senator V. Smith, under his constitutional right of protest (Art. IV, Sec. 18), protested against the passage of Senate Bill No. 717.

Senator V. Smith's statement is as follows:

I voted "no" on Senate Bill No. 717. It just slid through here as all these other tax breaks slide through here. I voted "no" because the reductions in state tax revenues will continue to haunt us in the future. I know times are very good right now and I know we are probably in the best economy Michigan has ever seen in its history. The upside has been up for quite a while, but at some point, we will see the other side of the coin. And when we do see the other side of the coin, we are going to regret the day that we continue to reduce state revenues.

I think we should surely regret the fact of reducing even further the single business tax revenues. This Legislature, on behalf of my Republican colleagues, put the change in the single business tax which they felt the business community had to have. It reduced single business tax revenues by 16%. That means that as revenues increase in income tax, and as revenues increase in every other taxing area of the state, which created some \$200 million surplus, your constituents who elected you are paying more, but the business community is paying less. We continue to see the business revenue slide under the present administration. It is an outright travesty of using other tax giveaways to the business community, which has already seen most of the large 21 tax cuts that are bragged about so vividly by the other side of the aisle.

So, I only have one vote and I've cast it. I cast it in opposition of Senate Bill No. 717 and I will continue to cast votes in opposition of these continued tax giveaways to the business community that has already been able to stuff its pockets with tax revenues which my constituents pay.

The question being on concurring in the committee recommendation to give the bill immediate effect,

The recommendation was concurred in, 2/3 of the members serving voting therefor.

Pursuant to Joint Rule 20, the full title of the bill shall read as follows:

"An act to provide for the imposition, levy, computation, collection, assessment and enforcement, by lien or otherwise, of taxes on certain commercial, business, and financial activities; to prescribe the manner and times of making certain reports and paying taxes; to prescribe the powers and duties of public officers and state departments; to permit the inspection of records of taxpayers; to provide for interest and penalties on unpaid taxes; to provide exemptions, credits, and refunds; to provide penalties; to provide for the disposition of funds; to provide for the interrelation of this act with other acts; and to provide an appropriation,".

The Senate agreed to the full title of the bill.

Protest

Senator V. Smith, under his constitutional right of protest (Art. IV, Sec. 18), protested against the passage of Senate Bill No. 705 and House Bill No. 4091 and moved that the statement he made during the discussion of Senate Bill No. 705 be printed as his reasons for voting "no."

Senator V. Smith's statement is as follows:

I voted "no" against Senate Bill No. 705 because I am beginning to wonder where this Legislature is beginning to go on taxes. I, as much as everyone else, would like to have a good business climate, but I do think there needs to be some fairness and some equity between what businesses have to pay in order to support state government and what individuals have to pay to support state government. I do think that we continue to see an increase of taxes for the average tax paying individual, as we see continued reductions in taxes that the business community has to pay. Therefore, I am rethinking whether we should continue to support all of these tax breaks, and as for this one, it is probably a good tax break if you have to give a tax break. I still wonder why you have to pay the business community in order for them to consider to be charitable.
