“Mr. Speaker and members of the House:

In adopting this package of bills, we seek stricter penalties on those criminals who demonstrate their contempt for law by way of assaulting police officers. Unfortunately, these two bills extend this principle much further than we should be willing to go. House bills 5442 and 5443 are about far more than protecting police officers. They add judges, attorneys, and other court officers to the list of citizens who should receive protected status under our criminal law. Equal protection under the law is a bedrock principle that sustains our society and legal institutions. We bend that principle significantly when we carve out special punishments for those who harm cops. We risk obliterating it entirely when we extend this protected status to anyone else.

If we punish a felon more severely when he beats up a judge than when he beats up a small business owner, or a teacher, then we implicitly send a message that the life of the judge is more valuable than the life of the common citizen. Amongst the favorable votes for these two bills there will surely be some that rightly oppose the establishment of ‘hate crimes’ legislation. Those persons should note that these bills have much in common with the creation of ‘hate crimes’ statutes. The end result of it all will be a legal system in which violent criminals are punished based upon their victim, rather than the severity of their crime. In effect, different legal protections for people based upon their race, their religion, and now their occupation. This is far from equal protection under the law. We are veering toward a caste system in which certain lives are more valuable than others.”
