EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

February 21, 2007, Introduced by Senators SWITALSKI and SCHAUER and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to make appropriations for the state institutions of higher education and certain state purposes related to education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2008; to provide for the expenditures of those appropriations; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain state departments, institutions, agencies, employees, and officers.

11	Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state
12	constitution of 1963, total state spending from state resources
13	under part 1 for fiscal year 2007-2008 is \$846,644,400.00 and state
14	spending from state resources to be paid to local units of
15	government for fiscal year 2007-2008 is \$3,759,100.00. The
16	itemized statement below identifies the estimated appropriations

22	Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this bill are
23	subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101
24	to 18.1594.
25	Sec. 208. Unless otherwise specified, the institutions of

- 1 higher education receiving appropriations in part 1 shall use the
- 2 Internet to fulfill the reporting requirements of this bill. This
- 3 requirement may include transmission of reports via electronic mail
- 4 to the recipients identified for each reporting requirement, or it
- 5 may include placement of reports on an Internet or Intranet site.
- 6 Sec. 209. Funds appropriated in part 1 shall not be used for
- 7 the purchase of foreign goods or services, or both, if
- 8 competitively priced and of comparable quality American goods and
- 9 services, or both, are available. Preference should be given to
- 10 goods or services, or both, manufactured or provided by Michigan
- 11 businesses if they are competitively priced and of comparable
- 12 value.
- Sec. 212. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 to state
- 14 institutions of higher education, except for the one-time
- 15 supplemental payment, shall be paid out of the state treasury and
- 16 distributed by the state treasurer to the respective institutions
- in 11 monthly installments on the sixteenth of each month, or the
- 18 next succeeding business day, beginning with October 16, 2007.
- 19 Each institution shall accrue its July and August 2008 payments to
- 20 its institutional fiscal year ending June 30, 2008.
- 21 (2) The funds appropriated in part 1 to state institutions of
- 22 higher education for the one-time supplemental payment shall be
- 23 paid out of the state treasury and distributed by the state
- 24 treasurer to the respective institutions on October 16, 2007. Each
- 25 state institution of higher education shall accrue this payment to
- 26 its institutional fiscal year ending June 30, 2007.
- 27 (3) All universities receiving appropriation in part 1 shall

- 1 submit higher education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) data
- 2 and associated financial and program information requested by and
- 3 in a manner prescribed by the state budget director by October 15,
- 4 2007. If a university fails to submit HEIDI data and associated
- 5 financial aid program information in accordance with this reporting
- 6 schedule, the state treasurer shall withhold the monthly
- 7 installments under subsection (1) to the university until those
- 8 data are submitted.
- 9 Sec. 213. Funds received by the state from the federal
- 10 government or private sources for the use of a college or
- 11 university are appropriated for the purposes for which they are
- 12 provided. The acceptance and use of federal or private funds do
- 13 not place an obligation upon the legislature to continue the
- 14 purposes for which the funds are made available.
- 15 Sec. 214. If section 274 of the income tax act of 1967, 1967
- 16 PA 281, MCL 206.274, is not repealed and if a state institution of
- 17 higher education that receives funds under this bill notifies the
- 18 department of treasury regarding its tuition and fee rates in order
- 19 to qualify as an eligible institution for the Michigan tuition tax
- 20 credit under section 274 of the income tax act of 1967, 1967 PA
- 21 281, MCL 206.274, the institution shall also submit the
- 22 notification and applicable documentation of tuition and fee
- 23 changes to the house and senate fiscal agencies.
- Sec. 215. A state institution of higher education that
- 25 receives funds under this bill shall furnish all program and
- 26 financial information that is required by and in a manner
- 27 prescribed by the state budget director or the house or senate

1 appropriations committee.

2 GRANTS AND FINANCIAL AID

- 3 Sec. 301. (1) Payments of the amounts included in part 1 for
- 4 the state competitive scholarship program shall be distributed
- 5 pursuant to 1964 PA 208, MCL 390.971 to 390.981.
- 6 (2) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
- 7 implement a proportional competitive scholarship maximum award
- 8 level for recipients enrolled less than full-time in a given
- 9 semester or term.
- 10 (3) If a student who receives an award under this section has
- 11 his or her tuition and fees paid under the Michigan educational
- 12 trust program, pursuant to the Michigan education trust act, 1986
- 13 PA 316, MCL 390.1421 to 390.1442, and still has financial need, the
- 14 funds awarded under this section may be used for educational
- 15 expenses other than tuition and fees.
- 16 (4) If the Michigan higher education assistance authority
- 17 increases the maximum award per eligible student from that provided
- 18 in the previous fiscal year, it shall not have the effect of
- 19 reducing the number of eligible students receiving awards in
- 20 relation to the total number of eligible applicants. Any increase
- 21 in the maximum grant shall be proportional for all eligible
- 22 students receiving awards.
- 23 (5) Students who receive aid under 1964 PA 208, MCL 390.971 to
- 24 390.981, shall be awarded scholarships on the basis of merit and
- 25 financial need. Veterans administration benefits shall not be
- 26 considered in determining eligibility under 1964 PA 208, MCL

- **1** 390.971 to 390.981.
- 2 Sec. 303. (1) Included in the appropriation in part 1 is
- 3 funding for the Michigan work-study program established under 1986
- 4 PA 288, MCL 390.1371 to 390.1382, and 1986 PA 303, MCL 390.1321 to
- 5 390.1332. An effort should be made by each institution
- 6 participating in the Michigan work-study program to assure that not
- 7 less than 10 percent of those undergraduate, graduate, and
- 8 professional students eligible to participate in the program are
- 9 placed with for-profit employers no later than December 31 of each
- 10 year for which funding is provided under this bill.
- 11 (2) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
- 12 allocate funds to institutions eligible for work-study money based
- 13 upon each institution's specific Pell grant index and each
- 14 institution's utilization rate of work-study funds for the 3 most
- 15 recent years for which statistics are available.
- 16 (3) The Michigan higher education assistance authority shall
- 17 set aside not more than 5 percent of the total work-study
- 18 appropriation to process requests from participating institutions
- 19 for allocation adjustments. Allocation adjustments shall be based
- 20 on criteria set by the authority prior to making the allocations
- 21 under subsection (2).
- 22 Sec. 307. The auditor general may audit selected enrollments,
- 23 degrees, and awards at selected independent colleges and
- 24 universities receiving awards administered by the department of
- 25 treasury. The audits shall be based upon definitions and
- 26 requirements established by the Michigan higher education
- 27 assistance authority, the state budget director, and the senate and

- 1 house fiscal agencies. The auditor general shall accept the Free
- 2 Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form as the standard of
- 3 residency documentation. The auditor general shall submit a report
- 4 of findings to the senate and house appropriations committees and
- 5 state budget director by May 1, 2008.
- 6 Sec. 308. The sums appropriated in part 1 for the student
- 7 financial aid programs shall be paid out of the state treasury and
- 8 shall be distributed to the respective institutions under a
- 9 quarterly payment system as follows:
- (a) For the state competitive scholarship, nursing
- 11 scholarship, and tuition incentive programs, 40 percent shall be
- 12 paid at the beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter, 40
- 13 percent at the beginning of the state's second fiscal quarter, 10
- 14 percent at the beginning of the state's third fiscal quarter, and
- 15 10 percent at the beginning of the state's fourth fiscal quarter.
- 16 (b) For the work-study program, payments shall be made in 11
- 17 monthly installments from October 1 to August 31 of any year.
- 18 (c) For the part-time independent student program and the
- 19 Michigan education opportunity grant program, 50 percent shall be
- 20 paid at the beginning of the state's first fiscal quarter, 25
- 21 percent at the beginning of the state's second fiscal quarter, and
- 22 25 percent at the beginning of the state's third fiscal quarter.
- 23 (d) For the Robert C. Byrd honors scholarship program, 50
- 24 percent shall be paid at the beginning of the state's first fiscal
- 25 quarter and 50 percent at the beginning of the state's second
- 26 fiscal quarter.
- 27 Sec. 309. The Michigan higher education assistance authority

- 1 shall determine the needs analysis criteria for students to qualify
- 2 for the state competitive scholarship program. To be consistent
- 3 with federal requirements, student wages may be taken into
- 4 consideration when determining the amount of the award.
- 5 Sec. 310. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the tuition
- 6 incentive program shall be distributed as provided in this section
- 7 and pursuant to the administrative procedures for the tuition
- 8 incentive program of the department of treasury.
- 9 (2) As used in this section:
- 10 (a) "Phase I" means the first part of the tuition incentive
- 11 assistance program defined as the academic period of 80 semester or
- 12 120 term credits, or less, leading to an associate degree or
- 13 certificate.
- 14 (b) "Phase II" means the second part of the tuition incentive
- 15 assistance program which provides assistance in the third and
- 16 fourth year of 4-year degree programs.
- 17 (c) "Department" means the department of treasury.
- 18 (3) A person shall meet the following basic criteria and
- 19 financial thresholds to be eligible for tuition incentive benefits:
- 20 (a) To be eligible for phase I, a person shall meet all of the
- 21 following criteria:
- (i) Apply for certification to the department before
- 23 graduating from high school or completing the general education
- 24 development (GED) certificate.
- 25 (ii) Be less than 20 years of age at the time of high school
- 26 graduation or GED completion.
- 27 (iii) Be a United States citizen and a resident of Michigan

- 1 according to institutional criteria.
- 2 (iv) Be at least a half-time student, earning less than 80
- 3 semester or 120 term credits at a participating educational
- 4 institution within 4 years of high school graduation or GED
- 5 certificate completion.
- 6 (v) Request information on filing a FAFSA.
- 7 (b) To be eligible for phase II, a person shall meet either of
- 8 the following criteria in addition to the criteria in subdivision
- **9** (a):
- 10 (i) Complete at least 56 transferable semester or 84
- 11 transferable term credits.
- 12 (ii) Obtain an associate degree or certificate at a
- 13 participating institution.
- 14 (c) To be eligible for phase I or phase II, a person must be
- 15 financially eligible as determined by the department. A person is
- 16 financially eligible for the tuition incentive program if that
- 17 person was Medicaid eligible for 24 months within the 36 months
- 18 before application. Certification of eligibility may begin in the
- 19 sixth grade.
- 20 (4) For phase I, the department shall provide payment on
- 21 behalf of a person eliqible under subsection (3). The department
- 22 shall reject billings that are excessive or outside the guidelines
- 23 for the type of educational institution.
- 24 (5) For phase I, all of the following apply:
- 25 (a) Payments for associate degree or certificate programs
- 26 shall not be made for more than 80 semester or 120 term credits for
- 27 any individual student at any participating institution.

- 1 (b) For persons enrolled at a Michigan community college, the
- 2 department shall pay the current in-district tuition and mandatory
- 3 fees. For persons residing in an area that is not included in any
- 4 community college district, the out-of-district tuition rate may be
- 5 authorized.
- 6 (c) For persons enrolled at a Michigan public university, the
- 7 department shall pay lower division resident tuition and mandatory
- 8 fees for the current year.
- 9 (d) For persons enrolled at a Michigan independent, nonprofit
- 10 degree-granting college or university, or a Michigan federal
- 11 tribally controlled community college, or Focus: HOPE, the
- 12 department shall pay mandatory fees for the current year and a per-
- 13 credit payment that does not exceed the average community college
- 14 in-district per-credit tuition rate as reported on August 1, for
- 15 the immediately preceding academic year.
- 16 (6) A person participating in phase II may be eligible for
- 17 additional funds not to exceed \$500.00 per semester or \$400.00 per
- 18 term up to a maximum of \$2,000.00 subject to the following
- 19 conditions:
- 20 (a) Credits are earned in a 4-year program at a Michigan
- 21 degree-granting 4-year college or university.
- 22 (b) The tuition reimbursement is for coursework completed
- 23 within 30 months of completion of the phase I requirements.
- 24 (7) The department shall work closely with participating
- 25 institutions to develop an application and eligibility
- 26 determination process that will provide the highest level of
- 27 participation and ensure that all requirements of the program are

- 1 met.
- 2 (8) Applications for the tuition incentive program may be
- 3 approved at any time after the student begins the sixth grade. If a
- 4 determination of financial eligibility is made, that determination
- 5 is valid as long as the student meets all other program
- 6 requirements and conditions.
- 7 (9) Each institution shall ensure that all known available
- 8 restricted grants for tuition and fees are used prior to billing
- 9 the tuition incentive program for any portion of a student's
- 10 tuition and fees.
- 11 (10) The department shall ensure that the tuition incentive
- 12 program is well publicized and that potentially eligible Medicaid
- 13 clients are provided information on the program. The department
- 14 shall provide the necessary funding and staff to fully operate the
- 15 program.
- 16 (11) A person eligible for the tuition incentive program must
- 17 not be enrolled in an institution whose primary purpose is to
- 18 prepare students for ordination or appointment as a member of the
- 19 clergy of a church, denomination, or religious association, order,
- 20 or sect.
- 21 Sec. 311. To enable the legislature and the state budget
- 22 director to evaluate the appropriation needs of higher education,
- 23 each independent college and university shall make available to the
- 24 legislature or state budget director, upon request, data regarding
- 25 grants for the preceding, current, and ensuing fiscal years.
- 26 Sec. 312. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for nursing
- 27 scholarship and grant programs, the Michigan higher education

- 1 assistance authority shall administer any nursing scholarship or
- 2 nursing school grant programs authorized under the Michigan nursing
- 3 scholarship act, 2002 PA 591, MCL 390.1181 to 390.1189.
- 4 Sec. 314. By December 1 of each year, the Michigan higher
- 5 education assistance authority shall submit a report to the state
- 6 budget director, the house and senate appropriations subcommittees
- 7 on higher education, and the house and senate fiscal agencies for
- 8 the preceding fiscal year on the children of veterans tuition grant
- 9 program. The report shall include, but is not limited to, the total
- 10 number of tuition grants paid by the authority in the preceding
- 11 fiscal year, the total dollar amount of those tuition grants, and
- 12 the number of students receiving tuition grants and the total
- 13 amount of those tuition grants at each eligible institution.

14 STATE UNIVERSITIES

- 15 Sec. 405. The funds appropriated in part 1 for higher
- 16 education database modernization and conversion shall be expended
- 17 to maintain, coordinate, and improve the higher education
- 18 institutional data inventory (HEIDI) established under section 1299
- 19 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1299. The
- 20 advisory committee established under that section shall meet
- 21 regularly to review data definitions and requirements in order to
- 22 advise the state budget director regarding changes to those
- 23 definitions and requirements that would result in more useful and
- 24 reliable data being provided to state policymakers and university
- 25 officials.
- Sec. 436. If any Michigan public university increases its

- 1 resident undergraduate tuition and required fees from academic year
- 2 2006-2007 to academic year 2007-2008, that university shall
- 3 increase its fiscal year 2007-2008 general fund expenditures for
- 4 student financial aid by at least the same percentage as the
- 5 percentage change in resident undergraduate tuition and required
- 6 fees. Each public university shall report its proposed fiscal year
- 7 2007-2008 general fund expenditures for student financial aid
- 8 compared to its projected fiscal year 2006-2007 general fund
- 9 expenditures for student financial aid, and its projected academic
- 10 year 2007-2008 resident undergraduate tuition and required fee
- 11 changes from academic year 2006-2007, to the state budget director
- 12 and the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on higher
- education by November 15, 2007.
- 14 Sec. 440. All universities shall submit the amount of tuition
- 15 and fees actually charged to a full-time resident undergraduate
- 16 student for academic year 2007-2008 as part of their higher
- 17 education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) data by August 31,
- 18 2007. A university shall report any revisions for any semester of
- 19 the reported academic year 2007-2008 tuition and fee charges to
- 20 HEIDI within 15 days of being adopted.
- 21 Sec. 461. From the amount appropriated in part 1 to Lake
- 22 Superior State University for operations, \$100,000.00 shall be paid
- 23 to Bay Mills Community College for the costs of waiving tuition for
- 24 North American Indians under 1976 PA 174, MCL 390.1251 to 390.1253.

25 MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. - CESAR CHAVEZ - ROSA PARKS PROGRAMS

Sec. 501. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public

- 1 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 2 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks future faculty program, that is intended
- 3 to increase the pool of minority candidates pursuing faculty
- 4 teaching careers in postsecondary education. Each university shall
- 5 apply the percentage change applicable to every university in the
- 6 calculation of appropriations in part 1 to the amount of funds
- 7 allocated to the future faculty program.
- 8 (2) The program shall be administered by each university in a
- 9 manner prescribed by the Michigan department of labor and economic
- 10 growth. The Michigan department of labor and economic growth shall
- 11 use a good faith effort standard to evaluate whether a fellowship
- 12 is in default.
- Sec. 502. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
- 14 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 15 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks college day program that is intended to
- 16 introduce schoolchildren underrepresented in postsecondary
- 17 education to the potential of a college education.
- 18 (2) Individual program plans of each university shall include
- 19 a budget of equal contributions from this program, the
- 20 participating public university, the participating school district,
- 21 and the participating independent degree-granting college. College
- 22 day funds shall not be expended to cover indirect costs. Not more
- 23 than 20 percent of the university match shall be attributable to
- 24 indirect costs. Each university shall apply the percentage change
- 25 applicable to every university in the calculation of appropriations
- 26 in part 1 to the amount of funds allocated to the college day
- 27 program.

- 1 (3) The program shall be administered by each university in a
- 2 manner prescribed by the Michigan department of labor and economic
- 3 growth.
- 4 Sec. 503. (1) Included in part 1 is funding for the Martin
- 5 Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks select student support
- 6 services program for developing academically and economically
- 7 disadvantaged student retention programs for 4-year public and
- 8 independent educational institutions in this state.
- 9 (2) An award made under this program to any 1 institution
- 10 shall not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount awarded shall
- 11 be matched on a 70 percent state, 30 percent college or university
- 12 basis.
- 13 (3) The program shall be administered by the Michigan
- 14 department of labor and economic growth.
- Sec. 504. (1) Included in part 1 is funding for the Martin
- 16 Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks college/university
- 17 partnership program between 4-year public and independent colleges
- 18 and universities and public community colleges, which is intended
- 19 to increase the number of academically and economically
- 20 disadvantaged students who transfer from community colleges into
- 21 baccalaureate programs.
- 22 (2) The grants shall be made under this program to Michigan
- 23 public and independent colleges and universities. An award to any
- 24 1 institution shall not be greater than \$150,000.00, and the amount
- 25 awarded shall be matched on a 70 percent state, 30 percent college
- 26 or university basis.
- 27 (3) The program shall be administered by the Michigan

- 1 department of labor and economic growth.
- 2 Sec. 505. (1) Included in the appropriation for each public
- 3 university in part 1 is funding for the Martin Luther King, Jr. -
- 4 Cesar Chavez Rosa Parks visiting professors program which is
- 5 intended to increase the number of underrepresented minority
- 6 instructors in the classroom and provide role models for
- 7 underrepresented minority students.
- 8 (2) The program shall be administered by the Michigan
- 9 department of labor and economic growth.
- 10 Sec. 506. (1) Included in the appropriation in part 1 is
- 11 funding under the Martin Luther King, Jr. Cesar Chavez Rosa
- 12 Parks initiative for the Morris Hood, Jr. educator development
- 13 program which is intended to increase the number of minority
- 14 students, especially males, who enroll in and complete K-12 teacher
- 15 education programs at the baccalaureate level.
- 16 (2) The program shall be administered by each state-approved
- 17 teacher education institution in a manner prescribed by the
- 18 Michigan department of labor and economic growth.
- 19 (3) Approved teacher education institutions may and are
- 20 encouraged to use student support services funding in coordination
- 21 with the Morris Hood, Jr. funding to achieve the goals of the
- 22 program.
- 23 Sec. 507. Each state institution of higher education receiving
- 24 funds under section 503, 504, or 506 shall notify the Michigan
- 25 department of labor and economic growth by April 15, 2008 as to
- 26 whether it will expend by the end of its fiscal year the funds
- 27 received under section 503, 504, or 506. Notwithstanding the award

5 STUDENT PERFORMANCE REPORTING

- 6 Sec. 601. (1) From the amount appropriated in part 1 for state
- 7 universities, the state universities shall systematically inform
- 8 Michigan high schools regarding the academic status of students
- 9 from each high school in a manner prescribed by the presidents
- 10 council, state universities of Michigan in cooperation with the
- 11 Michigan association of secondary school principals.
- 12 (2) The Michigan high schools shall systematically inform the
- 13 state universities about the use of information received under this
- 14 section in a manner prescribed by the Michigan association of
- 15 secondary school principals in cooperation with the presidents
- 16 council, state universities of Michigan.
- 17 Sec. 602. From the amount appropriated in part 1 for state
- 18 universities, the state universities shall inform Michigan
- 19 community colleges regarding the academic status of community
- 20 college transfer students in a manner prescribed by the presidents
- 21 council, state universities of Michigan in cooperation with the
- 22 Michigan community college association.

23 GENERAL REPORTS AND AUDITS

- Sec. 701. (1) The auditor general shall review higher
- 25 education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) enrollment data

- 1 submitted by all public universities and may perform audits of
- 2 selected public universities if determined necessary. The review
- 3 and audits shall be based upon the definitions, requirements, and
- 4 uniform reporting categories established by the state budget
- 5 director and the senate and house fiscal agencies. The auditor
- 6 general shall submit a report of findings to the house and senate
- 7 appropriations committees and the state budget director no later
- 8 than July 1, 2008.
- 9 (2) Student credit hours reports shall not include the
- 10 following:
- 11 (a) Student credit hours generated through instructional
- 12 activity by faculty or staff in classrooms located outside
- 13 Michigan, with the exception of instructional activity related to
- 14 study-abroad programs or field programs.
- 15 (b) Student credit hours generated through distance learning
- 16 instruction for students not eligible for the institution's in-
- 17 state main campus resident tuition rate.
- 18 (c) Student credit hours generated through credit by
- 19 examination.
- 20 (d) Student credit hours generated through inmate prison
- 21 programs regardless of teaching location.
- 22 (e) Student credit hours generated in new degree programs
- 23 after January 1, 1975, that have not been specifically authorized
- 24 for funding by the legislature, except spin-off programs converted
- 25 from existing core programs that do all of the following:
- 26 (i) Represent new options, fields, or concentrations within
- 27 existing programs.

- 1 (ii) Are consistent with the current institutional role and
- 2 mission.
- 3 (iii) Are accommodated within the continuing funding base of
- 4 the institution.
- 5 (iv) Do not require a new degree level beyond that which the
- 6 institution is currently authorized to grant within that discipline
- 7 or field.
- 8 (v) Do not require funding from the state other than that
- 9 provided by the student credit hours generated within the program,
- 10 either before program initiation or within the first 3 years of
- 11 program operation.
- 12 (3) The auditor general shall periodically audit higher
- 13 education institutional data inventory (HEIDI) data as submitted by
- 14 the state universities for compliance with the definitions approved
- 15 by the HEIDI advisory committee for the HEIDI database.
- 16 (4) "Distance learning instruction" as used in subsection (2)
- 17 means instruction that occurs solely in other than a traditional
- 18 classroom setting where the student and instructor are in the same
- 19 physical location and for which a student receives course credits
- 20 and is charged tuition and fees. Examples of distance learning
- 21 instruction are instruction delivered solely through the Internet,
- 22 cable television, teleconference, or mail.
- 23 Sec. 702. The principal executive officer of each institution
- 24 of higher education receiving an appropriation under this bill
- 25 shall expend a portion of the funds appropriated to that
- 26 institution to make a report to the auditor general, the house and
- 27 senate fiscal agencies, and the state budget director within 60

- 1 days after the auditor general issues his or her report on the
- 2 operation of the institution. The institution's report shall
- 3 specify all of the following:
- 4 (a) The recommendations of the auditor general implemented by
- 5 the institution, including projected dates and resources required,
- 6 if any, to achieve compliance.
- 7 (b) The recommendations of the auditor general not implemented
- 8 by the institution or implemented by the institution as modified.
- 9 (c) The rationale for not implementing a recommendation of the
- 10 auditor general or of implementing a recommendation as modified.
- 11 Sec. 708. The auditor general may conduct performance audits
- 12 of state universities during the fiscal year ending September 30,
- 13 2008 as the auditor general considers necessary.
- 14 Sec. 709. An institution receiving funds under this bill and
- 15 also subject to the student right-to-know and campus security act,
- 16 Public Law 101-522, 104 Stat. 2381, shall make a copy of all
- 17 material prepared pursuant to the public information reporting
- 18 requirements under the crime awareness and campus security act of
- 19 1990, title II of the student right-to-know and campus security
- 20 act, Public Law 101-542, 104 Stat. 2381, available in electronic
- 21 Internet format on their websites.
