## **OVERVIEW**

In a letter dated February 28, the State Budget Office requested a variety of supplemental adjustments to the FY 2010-11 state budget. The requested adjustments include a funding shift of \$87.4 million Gross (\$57.3 million GF/GP) between the Higher Education and Human Services budgets intended to better position the state to meet federal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) maintenance-of-effort (MOE) requirements, as well as funding increases available from federal and restricted sources in multiple budget areas totaling \$61.2 million.

The Senate-passed version of House Bill 4407 reflects the requested adjustments, along with an adjustment in the Community Health budget originally proposed as a legislative transfer, appropriations of \$41.3 million in from restricted fund sources in the Environmental Quality and Natural Resources budgets (along with a shift of \$300,000 in GF/GP funding within the budget), and boilerplate language appropriating remaining funds in the Homeowner Construction Lien Recovery Fund in the Licensing and Regulatory Affairs budget. The bill would have no net impact on GF/GP appropriations.

## FY 2010-11 Appropriation Items: COMMUNITY HEALTH 1. Medicare Premium Payments ARRA federal funding authorization of \$4.9 million is transferred from Federal -- -- -- 0

ARRA federal funding authorization of \$4.9 million is transferred from the Departmentwide Health Projects line to the Medicare Premium Payments line to recognize additional ARRA Title XIX funding for services to individuals who are dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid. Authorization in the Departmentwide Health Projects line is currently unexpended and available to be transferred.

LICENSING AND REGULATORY AFFAIRS  2. Unemployment Insurance Agency (UIA)  The supplemental request re-appropriates federal Reed Act funds initially received by the state in 2002. The state originally received \$291.5 million in Reed Act funding, with \$213.0 million allocated for employment services (Michigan Works and welfare-to-work programs), \$3.5 million for internet job search access at libraries, and \$75.0 million for the Unemployment Insurance Agency. The UIA used its funds to support agency operations, establish call centers, update computer software, and establish an Internet-based claims system. The UIA is now proposing to use the remaining funds to replace its mainframe-based legacy systems that support its core functions of tax administration, benefit claims processing, income eligibility verification, and trust fund accounting with an integrated system that enable these core tax and benefit systems to share data, in real time and across several varied agency functions, including adjudication, trust fund accounting, and field audits. An integrated system would improve the agency's interaction with claimants and employers, improve agency efficiency through reduced paperwork and duplicative data entry, and improve program integrity through real time data verification. The DTMB sent out an RFP in October 2010, with responses due in January 2011. 3. Office of Financial and Insurance Regulation – Securities The supplemental request increases funding for the Office of Financial and Insurance Regulation, supported by existing securities fees revenue and Insurance Bureau Fund revenue, to implement additional responsibilities placed on the office under the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act. The Dodd-Frank Act shifts regulatory oversight over investment advisors with assets under management between \$25 million and \$100 million from SEC oversight to state oversight. States previously regulated smaller investment firms with less than \$25 million - \$30 million in investments under management. These additional firms, totaling about 170, are very large firms from a state regulatory standpoint. OFIR indicates that most of these firms haven't had an SEC examination. Office of Financial and Insurance Regulation – Life Insurance The Dodd-Frank Act also makes many other changes affecting the regulation of insurance companies (historically a state, rather than federal, regulatory function). OFIR indicates that these changes will have particularly significant implications on domestic life insurance companies. This adjustment is included in the FY 2011-12 Executive Recommendation. TANF Fund Shift for Financial Aid Programs Replaces \$57.3 million in GF/GP revenue and \$30.1 million in Merit Award Trust Fund revenue appropriated for state financial aid programs with an equal amount of federal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funding. Affected programs are State Competitive Scholarships, Tuition Grants, and Tuition Incentive Program. Offsetting adjustments are recommended in the Human Services budget (see below).
