## SUBSTITUTE FOR

## SENATE BILL NO. 743

A bill to adopt the uniform child abduction prevention act; to allow courts in this state to impose measures to prevent the abduction of children; to establish standards for determining whether a child is subject to a significant risk of abduction; and to provide remedies.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 "uniform child abduction prevention act".
- 3 Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- 4 (a) "Abduction" means the wrongful removal or wrongful
- 5 retention of a child.
- 6 (b) "Child" means an unemancipated individual who is less than
- 7 18 years of age.
- 8 (c) "Child-custody determination" means a judgment, decree, or

- 1 other order of a court providing for the legal custody, physical
- 2 custody, or visitation with respect to a child. Child custody
- 3 determination includes a permanent, temporary, initial, or
- 4 modification order.
- 5 (d) "Child-custody proceeding" means a proceeding in which
- 6 legal custody, physical custody, or visitation with respect to a
- 7 child is at issue. The term includes a proceeding for divorce,
- 8 dissolution of marriage, separation, neglect, abuse, dependency,
- 9 guardianship, paternity, termination of parental rights, or
- 10 protection from domestic violence.
- (e) "Court" means an entity authorized under the law of a
- 12 state to establish, enforce, or modify a child-custody
- 13 determination.
- 14 (f) "Domestic violence" means that term as defined in section
- 15 1 of 1978 PA 389, MCL 400.1501.
- 16 (g) "Enhanced driver license" and "enhanced official state
- 17 personal identification card" mean those terms as defined in
- 18 section 2 of the enhanced driver license and enhanced official
- 19 state personal identification card act, 2008 PA 23, MCL 28.302.
- 20 (h) "Home state" means that term as defined in section 102 of
- 21 the uniform child-custody jurisdiction and enforcement act, 2001 PA
- 22 195, MCL 722.1102.
- (i) "Petition" includes a motion or its equivalent.
- 24 (j) "Protection order" means either of the following:
- 25 (i) An order entered under section 2950 or 2950a of the revised
- 26 judicature act of 1961, 1961 PA 236, MCL 600.2950 and 600.2950a,
- 27 under section 6b of chapter V or section 3(2)(0) of chapter XI of

- 1 the code of criminal procedure, 1927 PA 175, MCL 765.6b and 771.3,
- 2 under section 13a of chapter XIIA of the probate code of 1939, 1939
- 3 PA 288, MCL 712a.13a, or under section 36(16) of the corrections
- 4 code of 1953, 1953 PA 232, MCL 791.236.
- 5 (ii) A foreign protection order as defined in section 2950h of
- 6 the revised judicature act of 1961, 1961 PA 236, MCL 600.2950h.
- 7 (k) "Record" means information that is inscribed on a tangible
- 8 medium or that is stored in an electronic or other medium and is
- 9 retrievable in perceivable form.
- 10 (l) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of
- 11 Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any
- 12 territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the
- 13 United States. State includes a federally recognized Indian tribe
- 14 or nation.
- 15 (m) "Travel document" means records relating to a travel
- 16 itinerary, including travel tickets, passes, reservations for
- 17 transportation, or accommodations. Travel document does not include
- 18 a passport or visa.
- 19 (n) "Visitation" includes parenting time as that term is used
- 20 in the support and parenting time enforcement act, 1982 PA 295, MCL
- 21 552.601 to 552.650.
- (o) "Wrongful removal" means the taking of a child that
- 23 breaches rights of custody or visitation given or recognized under
- 24 the law of this state. Wrongful removal does not include actions
- 25 taken to provide for the safety of a party or the child.
- (p) "Wrongful retention" means the keeping or concealing of a
- 27 child that breaches rights of custody or visitation given or

- 1 recognized under the law of this state. Wrongful retention does not
- 2 include actions taken to provide for the safety of a party or the
- 3 child.
- 4 Sec. 3. Sections 110 to 112 of the uniform child-custody
- 5 jurisdiction and enforcement act, 2001 PA 195, MCL 722.1110 to
- 6 722.1112, apply to cooperation and communications among courts in
- 7 proceedings under this act.
- 8 Sec. 4. (1) A court on its own motion may order abduction
- 9 prevention measures in a child-custody proceeding if the court
- 10 finds that the evidence establishes a credible risk of abduction of
- 11 the child.
- 12 (2) A party to a child-custody determination or another
- 13 individual or entity having a right under the law of this state or
- 14 any other state to seek a child-custody determination for the child
- 15 may file a petition seeking abduction prevention measures to
- 16 protect the child under this act.
- 17 (3) A prosecutor or the attorney general may seek a warrant to
- 18 take physical custody of a child under section 9 or other
- 19 appropriate prevention measures.
- 20 Sec. 5. (1) A petition under this act may be filed only in a
- 21 court that has jurisdiction to make a child-custody determination
- 22 with respect to the child at issue under the uniform child-custody
- 23 jurisdiction and enforcement act, 2001 PA 195, MCL 722.1101 to
- **24** 722.1406.
- 25 (2) A court of this state has temporary emergency jurisdiction
- 26 under section 204 of the uniform child-custody jurisdiction and
- 27 enforcement act, 2001 PA 195, MCL 722.1204, if the court finds a

- 1 credible risk of abduction.
- 2 Sec. 6. A petition under this act shall be verified and
- 3 include a copy of any existing child-custody determination, if
- 4 available. The petition shall specify the risk factors for
- 5 abduction, including the relevant factors described in section 7.
- 6 Subject to section 209(5) of the uniform child-custody jurisdiction

- 7 and enforcement act, 2001 PA 195, MCL 722.1209, if reasonably
- 8 ascertainable, the petition must contain all of the following:
- 9 (a) The name, date of birth, and gender of the child.
- 10 (b) The customary address and current physical location of the
- 11 child.
- 12 (c) The identity, customary address, and current physical
- 13 location of the respondent.
- 14 (d) A statement of whether a prior action to prevent abduction
- 15 or domestic violence has been filed by a party or other individual
- 16 or entity having custody of the child, and the date, location, and
- 17 disposition of the action.
- 18 (e) A statement of whether a party to the proceeding has been
- 19 arrested for a crime related to domestic violence, stalking, or
- 20 child abuse or neglect, and the date, location, and disposition of
- 21 the case.
- (f) Information regarding any protection order previously
- 23 entered involving either party or the child.
- 24 (g) Any other information required to be submitted to the
- 25 court for a child-custody determination under section 209 of the
- 26 uniform child-custody jurisdiction and enforcement act, 2001 PA
- 27 195, MCL 722.1209.

1 Sec. 7. (1) In determining whether there is a credible risk of

- 2 abduction of a child, the court shall consider any evidence that
- 3 the petitioner or respondent has done any of the following or that
- 4 any of the following apply to the petitioner or respondent:
- 5 (a) Previously abducted or attempted to abduct the child.
- 6 (b) Threatened to abduct the child.
- 7 (c) Except for planning activities related to providing for
- 8 the safety of a party or the child while avoiding or attempting to
- 9 avoid domestic violence, recently engaged in activities that may
- 10 indicate a planned abduction, including any of the following:
- 11 (i) Abandoning employment.
- 12 (ii) Selling a primary residence.
- 13 (iii) Terminating a lease.
- 14 (iv) Closing bank or other financial management accounts,
- 15 liquidating assets, hiding or destroying financial documents, or
- 16 conducting any unusual financial activities.
- 17 (v) Applying for a passport or visa or obtaining travel
- 18 documents for the respondent, a family member, or the child.
- 19 (vi) Applying for or obtaining an enhanced driver license or
- 20 enhanced official state personal identification card for the
- 21 respondent, a family member, or the child.
- 22 (vii) Seeking to obtain the child's birth certificate or school
- 23 or medical records.
- 24 (d) Engaged in domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or
- 25 neglect.
- 26 (e) Refused to follow a child-custody determination.
- 27 (f) Lacks strong familial, financial, emotional, or cultural

- 1 ties to this state or the United States.
- 2 (g) Has strong familial, financial, emotional, or cultural
- 3 ties to another state or country.
- 4 (h) Is likely to take the child to a country to which any of
- 5 the following apply:
- 6 (i) The country is not a party to the Hague convention on the
- 7 civil aspects of international child abduction and does not provide
- 8 for the extradition of an abducting parent or for the return of an
- 9 abducted child.
- 10 (ii) The country is a party to the Hague convention on the
- 11 civil aspects of international child abduction but 1 or more of the
- 12 following apply:
- 13 (A) The Hague convention on the civil aspects of international
- 14 child abduction is not in force between the United States and the
- 15 country.
- 16 (B) The country is noncompliant according to the most recent
- 17 compliance report issued by the United States department of state.
- 18 (C) The country lacks legal mechanisms for immediately and
- 19 effectively enforcing a return order under the Hague convention on
- 20 the civil aspects of international child abduction.
- 21 (iii) The country poses a risk that the child's physical or
- 22 emotional health or safety would be endangered in the country
- 23 because of specific circumstances relating to the child or because
- 24 of human rights violations committed against children.
- (iv) The country has laws or practices that would do 1 or more
- 26 of the following:
- 27 (A) Enable the respondent, without due cause, to prevent the

- 1 petitioner from contacting the child.
- 2 (B) Restrict the petitioner from freely traveling to or
- 3 exiting from the country because of the petitioner's gender,
- 4 nationality, marital status, or religion.
- 5 (C) Restrict the child's ability legally to leave the country

- 6 after the child reaches the age of majority because of the child's
- 7 gender, nationality, or religion.
- 8 (v) The country is included by the United States department of
- 9 state on a current list of state sponsors of terrorism.
- 10 (vi) The country does not have an official United States
- 11 diplomatic presence in the country.
- 12 (vii) The country is engaged in active military action or war,
- 13 including a civil war, to which the child may be exposed.
- 14 (i) Is undergoing a change in immigration or citizenship
- 15 status that would adversely affect the respondent's ability to
- 16 remain in the United States legally.
- 17 (j) Has had an application for United States citizenship
- 18 denied.
- 19 (k) Has forged or presented misleading or false evidence on
- 20 government forms or supporting documents to obtain or attempt to
- 21 obtain a passport, a visa, travel documents, a social security
- 22 card, a driver license, or other government-issued identification
- 23 card or has made a misrepresentation to the United States
- 24 government.
- 25 (l) Has used multiple names to attempt to mislead or defraud.
- 26 (m) Has engaged in any other conduct the court considers
- 27 relevant to the risk of abduction.

- 1 (2) If the court finds during a hearing on a petition under
- 2 this act that the respondent's conduct was intended to avoid
- 3 domestic violence or imminent harm to the child or the respondent,
- 4 the court shall not issue an abduction prevention order.
- 5 Sec. 8. (1) If a petition is filed under this act, the court
- 6 may enter an order. If entered, the order shall include all of the
- 7 following:
- **8** (a) The basis for the court's exercise of jurisdiction.
- 9 (b) The manner in which notice and opportunity to be heard
- 10 were given to the persons entitled to notice of the proceeding.
- 11 (c) A detailed description of each party's custody and
- 12 visitation rights and residential arrangements for the child.
- 13 (d) A provision stating that a violation of the order may
- 14 subject the party in violation to civil and criminal penalties.
- 15 (e) Identification of the child's home state or country of
- 16 habitual residence at the time of the issuance of the order.
- 17 (2) If, at a hearing on a petition under this act or on the
- 18 court's own motion, the court after reviewing the evidence finds a
- 19 credible risk of abduction of the child, the court shall enter an
- 20 abduction prevention order. The order shall include the provisions
- 21 required by subsection (1) and measures and conditions, including
- 22 those in subsections (3) to (5), that are reasonably calculated to
- 23 prevent abduction of the child, giving due consideration to the
- 24 custody and visitation rights of the parties and the safety of the
- 25 parties and the child. The court shall consider the age of the
- 26 child, the potential harm to the child from an abduction, the legal
- 27 and practical difficulties of returning the child to the

- 1 jurisdiction if abducted, and the reasons for the potential
- 2 abduction, including evidence of domestic violence, stalking, or
- 3 child abuse or neglect.
- 4 (3) An abduction prevention order may include 1 or more of the
- 5 following:
- 6 (a) An imposition of travel restrictions that require that a
- 7 party traveling with the child outside a designated geographical
- 8 area provide the other party with all of the following:
- 9 (i) The travel itinerary of the child.
- 10 (ii) A list of physical addresses and telephone numbers at
- 11 which the child can be reached at specified times.
- 12 (iii) Copies of all travel documents.
- 13 (b) A prohibition of the respondent directly or indirectly
- 14 doing any of the following:
- 15 (i) Removing the child from this state, the United States, or
- 16 another geographic area without permission of the court or the
- 17 petitioner's written consent.
- 18 (ii) Removing or retaining the child in violation of a child-
- 19 custody determination.
- 20 (iii) Removing the child from school or a child care or similar
- 21 facility.
- 22 (iv) Approaching the child at any location other than a site
- 23 designated for supervised visitation.
- (c) A requirement that a party register the order in another
- 25 state as a prerequisite to allowing the child to travel to that
- 26 state.
- (d) With regard to the child's passport, any of the following:

1 (i) A direction that the petitioner place the child's name in

- 2 the United States department of state's child passport issuance
- 3 alert program.
- 4 (ii) A requirement that the respondent surrender to the court
- 5 or the petitioner's attorney any United States or foreign passport
- 6 issued in the child's name, including a passport issued in the name
- 7 of both the parent and the child.
- 8 (iii) A requirement that the respondent surrender to the court
- 9 or the petitioner's attorney his or her enhanced driver license or
- 10 enhanced official state personal identification card issued in the
- 11 child's name.
- 12 (iv) A prohibition on the respondent applying on behalf of the
- 13 child for a new or replacement passport or visa.
- 14 (e) As a prerequisite to exercising custody or visitation, a
- 15 requirement that the respondent provide 1 or more of the following:
- 16 (i) To the United States department of state office of
- 17 children's issues and the relevant foreign consulate or embassy, an
- 18 authenticated copy of the order detailing passport and travel
- 19 restrictions for the child.
- 20 (ii) To the court, 1 or both of the following:
- 21 (A) Proof that the respondent has provided the information in
- 22 subparagraph (i).
- 23 (B) An acknowledgment in a record from the relevant foreign
- 24 consulate or embassy that no passport application has been made, or
- 25 passport issued, on behalf of the child.
- 26 (iii) To the petitioner, proof of registration with the United
- 27 States embassy or other United States diplomatic presence in the

- 1 destination country and with the central authority for the Hague
- 2 convention on the civil aspects of international child abduction,
- 3 if that convention is in effect between the United States and the
- 4 destination country, unless 1 of the parties objects.
- 5 (iv) A written waiver under 5 USC 552a, popularly known as the
- 6 privacy act, with respect to any document, application, or other
- 7 information pertaining to the child authorizing its disclosure to
- 8 the court and the petitioner.
- 9 (f) On the petitioner's request, a requirement that the
- 10 respondent obtain an order from the relevant foreign country
- 11 containing terms identical to the child-custody determination
- 12 issued in the United States.
- 13 (4) In an abduction prevention order, the court may impose
- 14 conditions on the exercise of custody or visitation that do 1 or
- **15** more of the following:
- 16 (a) Limit visitation or require that visitation with the child
- 17 by the respondent be supervised until the court finds that
- 18 supervision is no longer necessary and order the respondent to pay
- 19 the costs of supervision.
- 20 (b) Require the respondent to post a bond or provide other
- 21 security in an amount sufficient to serve as a financial deterrent
- 22 to abduction, the proceeds of which may be used to pay for the
- 23 reasonable expenses of recovery of the child, including reasonable
- 24 attorney fees and costs if there is an abduction.
- 25 (c) Require the respondent to obtain education on the
- 26 potentially harmful effects to the child from abduction.
- 27 (5) To prevent imminent abduction of a child, a court may do 1

- 1 or more of the following:
- 2 (a) Issue a warrant to take physical custody of the child

- 3 under section 9 or other law of this state.
- 4 (b) Direct the use of law enforcement to take any action
- 5 reasonably necessary to locate the child, obtain return of the
- 6 child, or enforce a custody determination under this act or other
- 7 law of this state.
- 8 (c) Grant any other relief allowed under the law of this
- 9 state.
- 10 (6) The remedies provided in this act are cumulative and do
- 11 not affect the availability of other remedies to prevent abduction.
- Sec. 9. (1) If a petition under this act alleges and the court
- 13 finds that there is a credible risk that the child is imminently
- 14 likely to be wrongfully removed, the court may issue an ex parte
- 15 warrant to take physical custody of the child.
- 16 (2) The respondent to a petition under subsection (1) shall be
- 17 afforded an opportunity to be heard at the earliest possible time
- 18 after the ex parte warrant is executed, but not later than the next
- 19 judicial day unless a hearing on that date is impossible. If a
- 20 hearing on the next judicial day is impossible, the court shall
- 21 hold the hearing on the first judicial day possible.
- 22 (3) An ex parte warrant under subsection (1) to take physical
- 23 custody of a child shall do all of the following:
- 24 (a) Recite the facts on which a determination of a credible
- 25 risk of imminent wrongful removal of the child is based.
- (b) Direct law enforcement officers to take physical custody
- 27 of the child immediately.

- 1 (c) State the date and time for the hearing on the petition.
- 2 (d) Provide for the safe interim placement of the child
- 3 pending further order of the court.
- 4 (4) If feasible, before issuing a warrant under this section
- 5 and before determining the placement of the child after the warrant
- 6 is executed, the court may order a search of the relevant databases
- 7 of the national crime information center system and similar state
- 8 databases to determine if either the petitioner or respondent has a
- 9 history of domestic violence, stalking, or child abuse or neglect.
- 10 (5) A petition and warrant under this section shall be served
- 11 on the respondent when or immediately after the child is taken into
- 12 physical custody.
- 13 (6) A warrant to take physical custody of a child, issued by
- 14 this state or another state, is enforceable throughout this state.
- 15 If the court finds that a less intrusive remedy will not be
- 16 effective, it may authorize law enforcement officers to enter
- 17 private property to take physical custody of the child. If required
- 18 by exigent circumstances, the court may authorize law enforcement
- 19 officers to make a forcible entry at any hour.
- 20 (7) If the court finds, after a hearing, that a petitioner
- 21 sought an ex parte warrant under subsection (1) for the purpose of
- 22 harassment or in bad faith, the court may award the respondent
- 23 reasonable attorney fees, costs, and expenses.
- 24 (8) This act does not affect the availability of relief
- 25 allowed under other law of this state.
- 26 Sec. 10. An abduction prevention order remains in effect until
- 27 the earliest of the following:

- 1 (a) The time stated in the order.
- 2 (b) The emancipation of the child.
- 3 (c) The child's attaining 18 years of age.
- 4 (d) The time the order is modified, revoked, vacated, or
- 5 superseded by a court with jurisdiction under sections 201 to 203
- 6 of the uniform child-custody jurisdiction and enforcement act, 2001
- 7 PA 195, MCL 722.1201 to 722.1203, or other applicable law of this
- 8 state.
- 9 Sec. 11. In applying and construing this uniform act, a court
- 10 shall consider the need to promote uniformity of the law with
- 11 respect to its subject matter among states that enact it.
- 12 Sec. 12. This act modifies, limits, and supersedes the federal
- 13 electronic signatures in global and national commerce act, 15 USC
- 14 7001 to 7031, but does not modify, limit, or supersede 15 USC
- 15 7001(c) or authorize electronic delivery of any of the notices
- 16 described in 15 USC 7003(b).
