HOUSE BILL No. 4146

January 26, 2011, Introduced by Reps. Gilbert and Muxlow and referred to the Committee on Transportation.

A bill to amend 1949 PA 300, entitled

"Michigan vehicle code,"

by amending section 698 (MCL 257.698), as amended by 1998 PA 247, and by adding section 682c.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 SEC. 682C. (1) A PERSON SHALL NOT OPERATE A COMMERCIAL SNOW
- 2 REMOVAL VEHICLE TO REMOVE SNOW OR ICE ON A PUBLIC STREET OR HIGHWAY
- 3 OR IN A PARKING LOT ACCESSIBLE FOR USE BY THE PUBLIC UNLESS BOTH OF
- 4 THE FOLLOWING APPLY:
 - (A) THE VEHICLE IS OPERATED WITH AT LEAST 1 FLASHING,
 - ROTATING, OR OSCILLATING YELLOW OR AMBER LIGHT THAT IS CLEARLY
- 7 VISIBLE IN A 360-DEGREE ARC FROM A DISTANCE OF 500 FEET WHEN IN
- 8 USE.

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(B) THE VEHICLE IS OPERATED WITH A REVERSE SIGNAL ALARM

- 1 AUDIBLE ABOVE THE SURROUNDING NOISE LEVEL OR THE VEHICLE IS BACKED
- 2 UP ONLY WHEN AN OBSERVER SIGNALS THAT IT IS SAFE TO DO SO. THIS
- 3 SUBDIVISION DOES NOT APPLY IF THE VEHICLE IS BEING OPERATED WITHIN
- 4 200 FEET OF A RESIDENCE BETWEEN THE HOURS OF MIDNIGHT AND 7 A.M.
- 5 (2) A PERSON WHO OWNS OR LEASES A COMMERCIAL SNOW REMOVAL
- 6 VEHICLE SHALL NOT KNOWINGLY ALLOW A PERSON TO OPERATE THAT VEHICLE
- 7 IN VIOLATION OF SUBSECTION (1).
- 8 (3) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS SECTION IS GUILTY OF A
- 9 MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY IMPRISONMENT FOR NOT MORE THAN 90 DAYS OR
- 10 A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$500.00, OR BOTH.
- 11 (4) AS USED IN THIS SECTION:
- 12 (A) "COMMERCIAL SNOW REMOVAL VEHICLE" MEANS A VEHICLE EQUIPPED
- 13 WITH A PLOW OR OTHER DEVICE THAT IS USED TO REMOVE SNOW OR ICE FOR
- 14 PAYMENT OR OTHER REMUNERATION.
- 15 (B) "PERSON" MEANS AN INDIVIDUAL, PARTNERSHIP, CORPORATION,
- 16 ASSOCIATION, GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY, OR OTHER LEGAL ENTITY.
- 17 Sec. 698. (1) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more
- 18 than 2 side cowl or fender lamps which THAT shall emit an amber or
- 19 white light without glare.
- 20 (2) A motor vehicle may be equipped with not more than 1
- 21 running board courtesy lamp on each side which THAT shall emit a
- 22 white or amber light without glare.
- 23 (3) Backing lights of red, amber, or white may be mounted on
- 24 the rear of a motor vehicle if the switch controlling the light is
- 25 so arranged that the light may be turned on only if the vehicle is
- 26 in reverse gear. The backing lights when unlighted shall be covered
- 27 or otherwise arranged so as not to reflect objectionable glare in

- 1 the eyes of a driver AN OPERATOR of a vehicle approaching from the
- 2 rear.
- 3 (4) Unless both covered and unlit, a vehicle driven OPERATED
- 4 on the highways of this state shall not be equipped with a lamp or
- 5 a part designed to be a reflector unless expressly required or
- 6 permitted by this chapter or that meets the standards prescribed in
- 7 49 C.F.R. CFR 571.108. A lamp or a part designed to be a reflector,
- 8 if visible from the front, shall display or reflect a white or
- 9 amber light; if visible from either side, shall display or reflect
- 10 an amber or red light; and if visible from the rear, shall display
- 11 or reflect a red light, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 12 (5) The use or possession of flashing, oscillating, or
- 13 rotating lights of any color is prohibited except as otherwise
- 14 provided by law, or under the following circumstances:
- 15 (a) A police vehicle shall be equipped with flashing,
- 16 rotating, or oscillating red or blue lights, for use in the
- 17 performance of police duties.
- 18 (b) A fire vehicle or ambulance available for public use or
- 19 for use of the United States, the state, or any unit of the state,
- 20 whether publicly or privately owned, shall be equipped with
- 21 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights and used as required
- 22 for safety.
- 23 (c) An authorized emergency vehicle as defined in section 2
- 24 may be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights
- 25 for use when responding to an emergency call if when in use the
- 26 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights are mounted on the
- 27 roof section of the vehicle, either as a permanent installation or

- 1 by means of suction cups or magnets and are clearly visible in a
- 2 360-degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. A person
- 3 operating lights under this subdivision at any time other than when
- 4 responding to an emergency call is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- 5 (d) Flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights, placed in
- 6 a position as to be visible throughout an arc of 360 degrees, shall
- 7 be used by a state, county, or municipal vehicle engaged in the
- 8 removal of ice, snow, or other material from the highway. and in
- 9 other operations designed to control ice and snow.
- 10 (e) A vehicle used for the cleanup of spills or a necessary
- 11 emergency response action taken pursuant to state or federal law or
- 12 a vehicle operated by an employee of the department of natural
- 13 resources that responds to a spill, emergency response action,
- 14 complaint, or compliance activity may be equipped with flashing,
- 15 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. Such lights shall not be
- 16 activated unless the vehicle is at the scene of a spill, emergency
- 17 response action, complaint, or compliance activity.
- 18 (f) A vehicle to perform public utility service, a vehicle
- 19 owned or leased by and licensed as a business for use in the
- 20 collection and hauling of refuse, an automobile service car or
- 21 wrecker, a vehicle engaged in authorized highway repair or
- 22 maintenance, a vehicle of a peace officer, a vehicle operated by a
- 23 rural letter carrier or a person under contract to deliver
- 24 newspapers or other publications by motor route, a vehicle utilized
- 25 for snow OR ICE removal UNDER SECTION 682C, a private security
- 26 guard vehicle as authorized in subsection (7), a motor vehicle
- 27 while engaged in escorting or transporting an oversize load that

- 1 has been issued a permit by the state transportation department or
- 2 a local authority with respect to highways under its jurisdiction,
- 3 a vehicle owned by the national guard or a United States military
- 4 vehicle while traveling under the appropriate recognized military
- 5 authority, a motor vehicle while towing an implement of husbandry,
- 6 or an implement of husbandry may be equipped with flashing,
- 7 rotating, or oscillating amber lights. However, a wrecker may be
- 8 equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights which
- 9 THAT shall be activated only when the wrecker is engaged in
- 10 removing or assisting a vehicle at the scene of a traffic accident
- 11 or disablement. The flashing, rotating, or oscillating amber lights
- 12 shall not be activated except in those circumstances that WHEN the
- 13 warning produced by the lights is required for public safety.
- 14 (g) A vehicle engaged in leading or escorting a funeral
- 15 procession or any vehicle that is part of a funeral procession may
- 16 be equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating purple or amber
- 17 lights which THAT shall not be activated except during a funeral
- 18 procession.
- (h) An authorized emergency vehicle may display flashing,
- 20 rotating, or oscillating white lights in conjunction with an
- 21 authorized emergency light as prescribed in this section.
- (i) A private motor vehicle of a physician responding to an
- 23 emergency call may be equipped with and the physician may use
- 24 flashing, rotating, or oscillating red lights mounted on the roof
- 25 section of the vehicle either as a permanent installation or by
- 26 means of magnets or suction cups and clearly visible in a 360-
- 27 degree arc from a distance of 500 feet when in use. The physician

- 1 shall first obtain written authorization from the county sheriff.
- 2 (j) A public transit vehicle may be equipped with a flashing,
- 3 oscillating, or rotating light mounted on the roof of the vehicle
- 4 approximately 6 feet from the rear of the vehicle which THAT
- 5 displays a white light to the front, side, and rear of the vehicle,
- 6 which light may be actuated by the driver for use only in inclement
- 7 weather such as fog, rain, or snow, when boarding or discharging
- 8 passengers, from 1/2 hour before sunset until 1/2 hour after
- 9 sunrise, or where WHEN conditions hinder the visibility of the
- 10 public transit vehicle. As used in this subdivision, "public
- 11 transit vehicle" means a motor vehicle, other than a station wagon
- 12 or passenger van, with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than
- 13 10,000 pounds.
- 14 (k) A person engaged in the manufacture, sale, or repair of
- 15 flashing, rotating, or oscillating lights governed by this
- 16 subsection may possess the lights for the purpose of employment,
- 17 but shall not activate the lights upon the highway unless
- 18 authorized to do so under subsection (6).
- 19 (6) A person shall not sell, loan, or otherwise furnish a
- 20 flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or red light designed
- 21 primarily for installation on an authorized emergency vehicle to a
- 22 person except a police officer, sheriff, deputy sheriff, authorized
- 23 physician, volunteer or paid fire fighter, volunteer ambulance
- 24 driver, licensed ambulance driver or attendant of the state, a
- 25 county or municipality within the state, a person engaged in the
- 26 business of operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 27 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization which THAT

- 1 owns and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 2 emergencies. This subsection does not prohibit an authorized
- 3 vehicle, equipped with flashing, rotating, or oscillating blue or
- 4 red lights, from being operated by a person other than a person
- 5 described in this section if the person receives authorization to
- 6 operate the emergency vehicle from a police officer, sheriff,
- 7 deputy sheriff, authorized physician, volunteer or paid fire
- 8 fighter, volunteer ambulance driver, licensed ambulance driver or
- 9 attendant, a person operating an ambulance or wrecker service, or a
- 10 federally recognized nonprofit charitable organization which THAT
- 11 owns and operates an emergency support vehicle used exclusively for
- 12 emergencies, except that the authorization shall not permit the
- 13 person to operate lights as described in subsection (5)(a), (b),
- 14 (c), (i), or (j), or to exercise the privileges described in
- 15 section 603. A person who operates an authorized emergency vehicle
- 16 in violation of the terms of an authorization is guilty of a
- 17 misdemeanor PUNISHABLE BY IMPRISONMENT FOR NOT MORE THAN 90 DAYS OR
- 18 A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$100.00, OR BOTH.
- 19 (7) A private motor vehicle of a security guard agency or
- 20 alarm company licensed pursuant to UNDER the private security quard
- 21 act of 1968, BUSINESS AND SECURITY ALARM ACT, 1968 PA 330, MCL
- 22 338.1051 to 338.1085 **338.1092**, may display flashing, rotating, or
- 23 oscillating amber lights. The flashing, rotating, or oscillating
- 24 amber lights shall not be activated on a public highway when a
- 25 vehicle is in motion.
- 26 (8) This section shall not be construed to DOES NOT prohibit,
- 27 restrict, or limit the use of lights authorized or required under

- 1 sections 697, 697a, and 698a.
- 2 (9) A person who violates OPERATES A VEHICLE IN VIOLATION OF
- 3 subsection (1), (2), (3), or (4) is responsible for a civil
- 4 infraction.
