

HOUSE BILL No. 5468

March 13, 2012, Introduced by Reps. Nesbitt, Horn, Price and Roy Schmidt and referred to the Committee on Energy and Technology.

A bill to amend 1986 PA 32, entitled
"Emergency 9-1-1 service enabling act,"
by amending sections 102, 401a, 401b, 401c, and 401d (MCL 484.1102,
484.1401a, 484.1401b, 484.1401c, and 484.1401d), section 102 as
amended and sections 401c and 401d as added by 2007 PA 164 and
sections 401a and 401b as amended by 2008 PA 379.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 102. As used in this act:

2 (a) "Automatic location identification" or "ALI" means a 9-1-1
3 service feature provided by the service supplier that automatically
4 provides the name and service address or, for a CMRS service
5 supplier, the location associated with the calling party's
6 telephone number as identified by automatic number identification
7 to a 9-1-1 public safety answering point.

8 (b) "Automatic number identification" or "ANI" means a 9-1-1

1 service feature provided by the service supplier that automatically
2 provides the calling party's telephone number to a 9-1-1 public
3 safety answering point.

4 (c) "Commercial mobile radio service" or "CMRS" means
5 commercial mobile radio service regulated under section 3 of title
6 I and section 332 of title III of the communications act of 1934,
7 chapter 652, 48 Stat. 1064, 47 USC 153 and 332, and the rules of
8 the federal communications commission or provided under the
9 wireless emergency service order. Commercial mobile radio service
10 or CMRS includes all of the following:

11 (i) A wireless 2-way communication device, including a radio
12 telephone used in cellular telephone service or personal
13 communication service.

14 (ii) A functional equivalent of a radio telephone
15 communications line used in cellular telephone service or personal
16 communication service.

17 (iii) A network radio access line.

18 (d) "Commission" means the Michigan public service commission.

19 (e) "Committee" means the emergency 9-1-1 service committee
20 created under section 712.

21 (f) "Common network costs" means the costs associated with the
22 common network required to deliver a 9-1-1 call with ALI and ANI
23 from a selective router to the proper PSAP and the costs associated
24 with the 9-1-1 database and data distribution system of the primary
25 9-1-1 service supplier identified in a county 9-1-1 plan. As used
26 in this subdivision, "common network" means the elements of a
27 service supplier's network that are not exclusive to the supplier

1 or technology capable of accessing the 9-1-1 system.

2 (g) "Communication service" means a service capable of
3 accessing, connecting with, or interfacing with a 9-1-1 system,
4 exclusively through the numerals 9-1-1, by dialing, initializing,
5 or otherwise activating the 9-1-1 system through the numerals 9-1-1
6 by means of a local telephone device, cellular telephone device,
7 wireless communication device, interconnected voice over the
8 internet device, or any other means.

9 (h) "CMRS connection" means each number assigned to a CMRS
10 customer.

11 (i) "Consolidated dispatch" means a countywide or regional
12 emergency dispatch service that provides dispatch service for 75%
13 or more of the law enforcement, fire fighting, emergency medical
14 service, and other emergency service agencies within the
15 geographical area of a 9-1-1 service district or serves 75% or more
16 of the population within a 9-1-1 service district.

17 (j) "County 9-1-1 charge" means the charge allowed under
18 sections 401b , ~~401c~~, and 401e.

19 (k) "Database service provider" means a service supplier who
20 maintains and supplies or contracts to maintain and supply an ALI
21 database or an MSAG.

22 (l) "Direct dispatch method" means that the agency receiving
23 the 9-1-1 call at the public safety answering point decides on the
24 proper action to be taken and dispatches the appropriate available
25 public safety service unit located closest to the request for
26 public safety service.

27 (m) "Emergency response service" or "ERS" means a public or

1 private agency that responds to events or situations that are
2 dangerous or that are considered by a member of the public to
3 threaten the public safety. An emergency response service includes
4 a police or fire department, an ambulance service, or any other
5 public or private entity trained and able to alleviate a dangerous
6 or threatening situation.

7 (n) "Emergency service zone" or "ESZ" means the designation
8 assigned by a county to each street name and address range that
9 identifies which emergency response service is responsible for
10 responding to an exchange access facility's premises.

11 (o) "Emergency telephone charge" means **THE** emergency telephone
12 operational charge and emergency telephone technical charge allowed
13 under section 401.

14 (p) "Emergency 9-1-1 district" or "9-1-1 service district"
15 means the area in which 9-1-1 service is provided or is planned to
16 be provided to service users under a 9-1-1 system implemented under
17 this act.

18 (q) "Emergency 9-1-1 district board" means the governing body
19 created by the board of commissioners of the county or counties
20 with authority over an emergency 9-1-1 district.

21 (r) "Emergency telephone operational charge" means a charge
22 allowed under section 401 for nonnetwork technical equipment and
23 other costs directly related to the dispatch facility and the
24 operation of 1 or more PSAPs including, but not limited to, the
25 costs of dispatch personnel and radio equipment necessary to
26 provide 2-way communication between PSAPs and a public safety
27 agency. Emergency telephone operational charge does not include

1 non-PSAP related costs such as response vehicles and other
2 personnel.

3 (s) "Emergency telephone technical charge" means a charge as
4 allowed under section 401 or 401d for costs directly related to 9-
5 1-1 service including plant-related costs associated with the use
6 of the public switched telephone network from the end user to the
7 selective router, the network start-up costs, customer notification
8 costs, common network costs, administrative costs, database
9 management costs, and network nonrecurring and recurring
10 installation, maintenance, service, and equipment charges of a
11 service supplier providing 9-1-1 service under this act. Emergency
12 telephone technical charge does not include costs recovered under
13 sections ~~401b(9)~~ **401B(10)** and 408(2).

14 (t) "Exchange access facility" means the access from a
15 particular service user's premises to the communication service.
16 Exchange access facilities include service supplier provided access
17 lines, PBX trunks, and centrex line trunk equivalents, all as
18 defined by tariffs of the service suppliers as approved by the
19 public service commission. Exchange access facilities do not
20 include telephone pay station lines or WATS, FX, or incoming only
21 lines.

22 (u) "Final 9-1-1 service plan" means a tentative 9-1-1 service
23 plan that has been modified only to reflect necessary changes
24 resulting from ~~any exclusions of public agencies from the 9-1-1~~
25 ~~service district of the tentative 9-1-1 service plan under section~~
26 ~~306 and~~ any failure of public safety agencies to be designated as
27 PSAPs or secondary PSAPs under section 307.

1 (v) "Master street address guide" or "MSAG" means a perpetual
2 database that contains information continuously provided by a
3 service district that defines the geographic area of the service
4 district and includes an alphabetical list of street names, the
5 range of address numbers on each street, the names of each
6 community in the service district, the emergency service zone of
7 each service user, and the primary service answering point
8 identification codes.

9 (w) "Obligations" means bonds, notes, installment purchase
10 contracts, or lease purchase agreements to be issued by a public
11 agency under a law of this state.

12 (x) "Person" means an individual, corporation, partnership,
13 association, governmental entity, or any other legal entity.

14 **(Y) "PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE" MEANS A**
15 **COMMERCIAL MOBILE RADIO SERVICE THAT ALLOWS A CALLER TO DIAL 9-1-1**
16 **TO ACCESS THE 9-1-1 SYSTEM AND IS PAID FOR IN ADVANCE AND SOLD IN**
17 **PREDETERMINED UNITS OR DOLLARS OF WHICH THE NUMBER DECLINES WITH**
18 **USE IN A KNOWN AMOUNT.**

19 **(Z)** ~~(y)~~—"Primary public safety answering point", "PSAP", or
20 "primary PSAP" means a communications facility operated or answered
21 on a 24-hour basis assigned responsibility by a public agency or
22 county to receive 9-1-1 calls and to dispatch public safety
23 response services, as appropriate, by the direct dispatch method,
24 relay method, or transfer method. It is the first point of
25 reception by a public safety agency of a 9-1-1 call and serves the
26 jurisdictions in which it is located and other participating
27 jurisdictions, if any.

1 **(AA)** ~~(z)~~—"Prime rate" means the average predominant prime rate
2 quoted by not less than 3 commercial financial institutions as
3 determined by the department of treasury.

4 **(BB)** ~~(aa)~~—"Private safety entity" means a nongovernmental
5 organization that provides emergency fire, ambulance, or medical
6 services.

7 **(CC)** ~~(bb)~~—"Public agency" means a village, township, charter
8 township, or city within the state and any special purpose district
9 located in whole or in part within the state.

10 **(DD)** ~~(cc)~~—"Public safety agency" means a functional division
11 of a public agency, county, or the state that provides fire
12 fighting, law enforcement, ambulance, medical, or other emergency
13 services.

14 **(EE)** ~~(dd)~~—"Qualified obligations" means obligations that meet
15 1 or more of the following:

16 (i) The proceeds of the obligations benefit the 9-1-1 district,
17 and for which all of the following conditions are met:

18 (A) The proceeds of the obligations are used for capital
19 expenditures, costs of a reserve fund securing the obligations, and
20 costs of issuing the obligations. The proceeds of obligations shall
21 not be used for operational expenses.

22 (B) The weighted average maturity of the obligations does not
23 exceed the useful life of the capital assets.

24 (C) The obligations shall not in whole or in part appreciate
25 in principal amount or be sold at a discount of more than 10%.

26 (ii) The obligations are issued to refund obligations that meet
27 the conditions described in subparagraph (i) and the net present

1 value of the principal and interest to be paid on the refunding
2 obligations, excluding the cost of issuance, will be less than the
3 net present value of the principal and interest to be paid on the
4 obligations being refunded, as calculated using a method approved
5 by the department of treasury.

6 (FF) ~~(ee)~~ "Relay method" means that a PSAP notes pertinent
7 information and relays it by a communication service to the
8 appropriate public safety agency or other provider of emergency
9 services that has an available emergency service unit located
10 closest to the request for emergency service for dispatch of an
11 emergency service unit.

12 (GG) ~~(ff)~~ "Secondary public safety answering point" or
13 "secondary PSAP" means a communications facility of a public safety
14 agency or private safety entity that receives 9-1-1 calls by the
15 transfer method only and generally serves as a centralized location
16 for a particular type of emergency call.

17 (HH) ~~(gg)~~ "Service supplier" means a person providing a
18 communication service to a service user in this state.

19 (II) ~~(hh)~~ "Service user" means a person receiving a
20 communication service.

21 (JJ) ~~(ii)~~ "State 9-1-1 charge" means the charge provided for
22 under ~~sections~~ **SECTION 401a. and 401e.**

23 (KK) ~~(jj)~~ "Tariff" means the rate approved by the public
24 service commission for 9-1-1 service provided by a particular
25 service supplier. Tariff does not include a rate of a commercial
26 mobile radio service by a particular supplier.

27 (ll) ~~(kk)~~ "Tentative 9-1-1 service plan" means a plan prepared

1 by 1 or more counties for implementing a 9-1-1 system in a
 2 specified 9-1-1 service district.

3 (MM) ~~(H)~~—"Transfer method" means that a PSAP transfers the 9-
 4 1-1 call directly to the appropriate public safety agency or other
 5 provider of emergency service that has an available emergency
 6 service unit located closest to the request for emergency service
 7 for dispatch of an emergency service unit.

8 (NN) ~~(mm)~~—"Universal emergency number service" or "9-1-1
 9 service" means public communication service that provides service
 10 users with the ability to reach a public safety answering point by
 11 dialing the digits "9-1-1".

12 (OO) ~~(nn)~~—"Universal emergency number service system" or "9-1-
 13 1 system" means a system for providing 9-1-1 service under this
 14 act.

15 (PP) ~~(oo)~~—"Wireless emergency service order" means the order
 16 of the federal communications commission, FCC docket No. 94-102,
 17 adopted June 12, 1996 with an effective date of October 1, 1996.

18 Sec. 401a. (1) ~~Except as otherwise provided under section~~
 19 ~~401e, each~~ **EACH** service supplier within a 9-1-1 service district
 20 shall bill and collect a state 9-1-1 charge from all service users,
 21 **EXCEPT FOR USERS OF A PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE,**
 22 of the service supplier within the geographical boundaries of the
 23 9-1-1 service district or as otherwise provided by this section.
 24 The billing and collection of the state 9-1-1 charge shall begin
 25 July 1, 2008. The state 9-1-1 charge shall be uniform per each
 26 service user within the 9-1-1 service district.

27 (2) The amount of the state 9-1-1 charge payable monthly by a

1 service user shall be established as provided under subsection (4).
2 The amount of the state 9-1-1 charge shall not be more than 25
3 cents or less than 15 cents. The charge may be adjusted annually as
4 provided under subsection (4).

5 (3) The state 9-1-1 charge shall be collected in accordance
6 with the regular billings of the service supplier. Except as
7 otherwise provided under this act, the amount collected for the
8 state 9-1-1 charge shall be remitted quarterly by the service
9 supplier to the state treasurer and deposited in the emergency 9-1-
10 1 fund created under section 407. The charge allowed under this
11 section shall be listed separately on the customer's bill or
12 payment receipt **OR OTHERWISE DISCLOSED TO THE CONSUMER.**

13 (4) The initial state 9-1-1 charge shall be 19 cents and shall
14 be effective July 1, 2008. The state 9-1-1 charge shall reflect the
15 actual costs of operating, maintaining, upgrading, and other
16 reasonable and necessary expenditures for the 9-1-1 system in this
17 state. The state 9-1-1 charge may be reviewed and adjusted as
18 provided under subsection (5).

19 (5) The commission in consultation with the committee shall
20 review and may adjust the state 9-1-1 charge under this section and
21 the distribution percentages under section 408 to be effective on
22 July 1, 2009 and July 1, 2010. Any adjustment to the charge by the
23 commission shall be made no later than May 1 of the preceding year
24 and shall be based on the committee's recommendations under section
25 412. Any adjustments to the state 9-1-1 charge or distribution
26 percentages after December 31, 2010 shall be made by the
27 legislature.

1 (6) If a service user has multiple access points or access
2 lines, the state 9-1-1 charge will be imposed separately on each of
3 the first 10 access points or access lines and then 1 charge for
4 each 10 access points or access lines per billed account.

5 (7) This section takes effect July 1, 2008.

6 Sec. 401b. (1) In addition to the charge allowed under section
7 401a, after June 30, 2008 a county board of commissioners may
8 assess a county 9-1-1 charge to service users, **EXCEPT FOR USERS OF**
9 **A PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE**, located within that
10 county by 1 of the following methods:

11 (a) Up to \$0.42 per month by resolution.

12 (b) Up to \$3.00 per month with the approval of the voters in
13 the county.

14 (c) Any combination of subdivisions (a) and (b) with a maximum
15 county 9-1-1 charge of \$3.00 per month.

16 (2) A county assessing a county 9-1-1 charge amount approved
17 in the commission's order in case number U-15489 that exceeds the
18 amounts established in subsection (1) may continue to assess the
19 amount approved by the commission. Any proposed increase to the
20 amount approved in the commission order is subject to subsection
21 (1).

22 (3) The charge assessed under this section and section 401e
23 shall not exceed the amount necessary and reasonable to implement,
24 maintain, and operate the 9-1-1 system in the county.

25 (4) If the voters approve the charge to be assessed on the
26 service user's monthly bill on a ballot question under this
27 section, the service provider's bill shall state the following:

1 "This amount is for your 9-1-1 service which has been approved
2 by the voters on (DATE OF VOTER APPROVAL). This is not a charge
3 assessed by your service supplier. If you have questions concerning
4 your 9-1-1 service, you may call (INCLUDE APPROPRIATE TELEPHONE
5 NUMBER)."

6 (5) Within 90 days after the first day of each fiscal or
7 calendar year of a county, an annual accounting shall be made of
8 the charge approved under this section.

9 (6) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (10), the
10 county 9-1-1 charge collected under this section shall be paid
11 quarterly directly to the county and distributed by the county to
12 the primary PSAPs by 1 of the following methods:

13 (a) As provided in the final 9-1-1 service plan.

14 (b) If distribution is not provided for in the plan, then
15 according to any agreement for distribution between the county and
16 public agencies.

17 (c) If distribution is not provided in the plan or by
18 agreement, then according to population within the emergency 9-1-1
19 district.

20 (7) Subject to subsection (1), the county may adjust the
21 county 9-1-1 charge annually to be effective July 1. The county
22 shall notify the committee no later than May 15 of each year of any
23 change in the county 9-1-1 charge under this section.

24 (8) If a county has multiple emergency response districts, the
25 county 9-1-1 charge collected under this section shall be
26 distributed under subsection (6) in proportion to the population
27 within the emergency 9-1-1 district.

1 (9) This section shall not preclude the distribution of
2 funding to secondary PSAPs if the distribution is determined by the
3 primary PSAPs within the emergency 9-1-1 district to be the most
4 effective method for dispatching of fire or emergency medical
5 services and the distribution is approved within the final 9-1-1
6 service plan.

7 (10) The service supplier may retain 2% of the approved county
8 9-1-1 charge to cover the supplier's costs for billings and
9 collections under this section.

10 (11) The charge allowed under this section shall be listed
11 separately on the customer's bill **OR OTHERWISE DISCLOSED TO THE**
12 **CONSUMER** and shall state by which means the charge was approved
13 under subsection (1).

14 (12) Information submitted by a service supplier to a county
15 under this section is exempt from the freedom of information act,
16 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to 15.246, and shall not be released by the
17 county without the consent of the service supplier. Unless required
18 or permitted by statute, court rule, subpoena, or court order, or
19 except as necessary for a county, the commission, committee, or
20 public agency to pursue or defend the public's interest in any
21 public contract or litigation, a county treasurer, the commission,
22 committee, agency, or any employee or representative of a PSAP,
23 database administrator, or public agency shall not divulge any
24 information acquired with respect to customers, revenues or
25 expenses, trade secrets, access line counts, commercial
26 information, or any other proprietary information with respect to a
27 service supplier while acting or claiming to act as an employee,

1 agent, or representative. An aggregation of information that does
2 not identify or effectively identify the number of customers,
3 revenues or expenses, trade secrets, access lines, commercial
4 information, and other proprietary information attributable to a
5 specific service supplier may be made public.

6 (13) If a service user has multiple access points or access
7 lines, the county 9-1-1 charge will be imposed separately on each
8 of the first 10 access points or access lines and then 1 charge for
9 each 10 access points or access lines per billed account.

10 (14) A county 9-1-1 charge assessed under subsection (1) shall
11 be used only to fund costs approved as allowable in a published
12 report by the committee ~~prior to~~ **BEFORE** December 1, 2008. The
13 committee shall notify the standing committees of the senate and
14 house of representatives having jurisdiction over issues pertaining
15 to communication technology at least 90 days ~~prior to~~ **BEFORE**
16 modifying what constitutes an allowable cost under this subsection.

17 ~~—— (15) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, the~~
18 ~~county 9-1-1 charge levied under this section shall not be levied~~
19 ~~after the repeal date provided in section 717. If all or a portion~~
20 ~~of the county 9-1-1 charge levied under this section has been~~
21 ~~pledged as security for the payment of qualified obligations, the~~
22 ~~county 9-1-1 charge shall be levied and collected only to the~~

25 Sec. 401c. ~~(1) Each CMRS supplier or reseller shall collect an~~
26 ~~emergency 9-1-1 charge from each of its prepaid customers. The~~
27 ~~amount of the emergency 9-1-1 charge shall be established annually~~

2 ~~subsections (2) and (3).~~

3 ~~—— (2) The CMRS supplier or reseller shall have a 1 time option~~
4 ~~of selecting 1 of the following methods of determining the portion~~

24 ~~—— (a) "Active prepaid accounts" means a customer who has~~

~~amount of the emergency 9-1-1 charge established under this section.~~

~~_____ (b) "CMRS reseller" means a provider who purchases telecommunication services from another telecommunication service provider and then resells, uses a component part of, or integrates the purchased services into a mobile telecommunication service.~~

~~_____ (c) "Earned prepaid revenue" means new revenue that has been generated from prepaid service accounts since the close of the last billing period or calendar month.~~

~~_____ (d) "Prepaid customer" means a CMRS subscriber who pays in full prospectively for the service and has 1 of the following:~~

~~_____ (i) A Michigan telephone number or a Michigan identification number for the service.~~

~~_____ (ii) A service for exclusive use in an automotive vehicle and whose place of primary use is within this state. As used in this sub-subparagraph, "place of primary use" means that phrase as defined under 4 USC 124.~~

(1) A SELLER SHALL COLLECT A PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGE FROM A CONSUMER FOR EACH RETAIL TRANSACTION OCCURRING IN THIS STATE.

(2) THE AMOUNT OF THE PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGE SHALL BE 1.92% PER RETAIL TRANSACTION. THE CHARGE ALLOWED UNDER THIS SECTION SHALL BE EITHER SEPARATELY STATED ON AN INVOICE, RECEIPT, OR OTHER SIMILAR DOCUMENT THAT IS PROVIDED TO A CONSUMER BY THE SELLER OR OTHERWISE DISCLOSED TO THE CONSUMER.

(3) EACH OF THE FOLLOWING TRANSACTIONS SHALL BE CONSIDERED TO HAVE OCCURRED IN THIS STATE:

1 (A) A RETAIL TRANSACTION THAT IS EFFECTED IN PERSON BY A
2 CONSUMER AT A BUSINESS LOCATION OF A SELLER LOCATED IN THIS STATE.

3 (B) A RETAIL TRANSACTION THAT IS TREATED AS OCCURRING IN THIS
4 STATE AS PROVIDED IN SECTION 3C OF THE USE TAX ACT, 1937 PA 94, MCL
5 205.93C, AS THAT SECTION APPLIES TO A PREPAID WIRELESS CALLING
6 SERVICE.

7 (4) A PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGE IS THE LIABILITY OF THE
8 CONSUMER AND NOT OF THE SELLER OR OF ANY PROVIDER.

9 (5) EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED IN SUBSECTION (6), IF A
10 PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE IS SOLD WITH 1 OR MORE
11 PRODUCTS OR SERVICES FOR A SINGLE, NONITEMIZED PRICE, THE SELLER
12 SHALL COLLECT 1.92% ON THE ENTIRE NONITEMIZED PRICE UNLESS THE
13 SELLER ELECTS TO DO THE FOLLOWING:

14 (A) IF THE AMOUNT OF THE PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS
15 SERVICE IS DISCLOSED TO THE CONSUMER AS A DOLLAR AMOUNT, APPLY THE
16 PERCENTAGE TO THAT DOLLAR AMOUNT.

17 (B) IF THE SELLER CAN IDENTIFY THE PORTION OF THE PRICE THAT
18 IS ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE
19 BY REASONABLE AND VERIFIABLE STANDARDS FROM ITS BOOKS AND RECORDS

21 INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, NONTAX PURPOSES, APPLY THE
22 PERCENTAGE TO THAT PORTION.

23 (6) IF A MINIMAL AMOUNT OF PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS
24 SERVICE IS SOLD WITH A PREPAID WIRELESS DEVICE FOR A SINGLE,
25 NONITEMIZED PRICE, A SELLER MAY ELECT NOT TO APPLY THE PERCENTAGE
26 SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (5) (A) TO THAT TRANSACTION. AS USED IN THIS
27 SUBSECTION, "MINIMAL AMOUNT" MEANS AN AMOUNT OF SERVICE DENOMINATED

1 AS 10 MINUTES OR LESS OR \$5.00.

2 (7) A SELLER SHALL REMIT TO THE DEPARTMENT, BY AN ELECTRONIC
3 FUNDS TRANSFER METHOD APPROVED BY THE DEPARTMENT ON OR BEFORE THE
4 TWENTIETH DAY OF THE MONTH, ALL PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGES
5 COLLECTED IN THE PREVIOUS MONTH.

6 (8) A SELLER MAY RETAIN 2% OF PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1
7 SURCHARGES THAT ARE COLLECTED BY THE SELLER TO REIMBURSE THE SELLER
8 FOR ITS DIRECT COSTS IN COLLECTING AND REMITTING THE PREPAID
9 WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGES.

10 (9) THE DEPARTMENT MAY RETAIN NOT MORE THAN 2% OF REMITTED
11 PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGES TO REIMBURSE THE DEPARTMENT FOR
12 ITS DIRECT COSTS IN ADMINISTERING THE COLLECTION AND REMITTANCE OF
13 THE PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGE. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL DEPOSIT
14 THE REMAINING FUNDS INTO THE EMERGENCY 9-1-1 FUND CREATED IN
15 SECTION 407.

16 (10) A PROVIDER OR SELLER OF PREPAID WIRELESS
17 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE IS NOT LIABLE FOR DAMAGES TO ANY PERSON
18 RESULTING FROM OR INCURRED IN CONNECTION WITH THE PROVISION OF, OR
19 FAILURE TO PROVIDE, 9-1-1 SERVICE OR FOR IDENTIFYING OR FAILING TO
20 IDENTIFY THE TELEPHONE NUMBER, ADDRESS, LOCATION, OR NAME
21 ASSOCIATED WITH ANY PERSON OR DEVICE THAT IS ACCESSING OR
22 ATTEMPTING TO ACCESS 9-1-1 SERVICE.

23 (11) A PROVIDER OR SELLER OF PREPAID WIRELESS
24 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE IS NOT LIABLE FOR DAMAGES TO ANY PERSON
25 RESULTING FROM OR INCURRED IN CONNECTION WITH THE PROVISION OF ANY
26 LAWFUL ASSISTANCE TO ANY INVESTIGATIVE OR LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER
27 OF THE UNITED STATES, THIS STATE, OR ANY OTHER STATE IN CONNECTION

1 WITH ANY LAWFUL INVESTIGATION OR OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY BY
2 THAT LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER.

3 (12) AS USED IN THIS SECTION:

4 (A) "CONSUMER" MEANS A PERSON WHO PURCHASES PREPAID WIRELESS
5 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES IN A RETAIL TRANSACTION.

6 (B) "DEPARTMENT" MEANS THE MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY.

7 (C) "PREPAID WIRELESS 9-1-1 SURCHARGE" MEANS THE CHARGE THAT
8 IS REQUIRED TO BE COLLECTED BY A SELLER FROM A CONSUMER IN THE
9 AMOUNT ESTABLISHED UNDER SUBSECTION (2).

10 (D) "PROVIDER" MEANS A PERSON THAT PROVIDES PREPAID WIRELESS
11 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICES UNDER A LICENSE ISSUED BY THE FEDERAL
12 COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION.

13 (E) "RETAIL TRANSACTION" MEANS THE PURCHASE OF PREPAID
14 WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE FROM A SELLER FOR ANY PURPOSE
15 OTHER THAN RESALE.

16 (F) "SELLER" MEANS A PERSON WHO SELLS PREPAID WIRELESS
17 TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE TO ANOTHER PERSON.

18 Sec. 401d. (1) Each local exchange provider within a 9-1-1
19 service district shall provide a billing and collection service for
20 an emergency telephone technical charge from all service users,
21 EXCEPT FOR USERS OF A PREPAID WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS SERVICE,
22 of the provider within the geographical boundaries of the emergency
23 telephone or 9-1-1 service district. The billing and collection of
24 the emergency telephone technical charge used for billing cost
25 shall begin as soon as feasible after the final 9-1-1 service plan
26 has been approved. The billing and collection of the emergency
27 telephone technical charge not already collected for billing costs

1 shall begin as soon as feasible after installation and operation of
2 the 9-1-1 system. The emergency telephone technical charge shall be
3 uniform per each exchange access facility within the 9-1-1 service
4 district. The portion of the emergency telephone technical charge
5 that represents start-up costs, nonrecurring billing, installation,
6 service, and equipment charges of the service supplier, including
7 the costs of updating equipment necessary for conversion to 9-1-1
8 service, shall be amortized at the prime rate plus 1% over a period
9 not to exceed 10 years and shall be billed and collected from all
10 service users only until those amounts are fully recouped by the
11 service supplier. The prime rate to be used for amortization shall
12 be set before the first assessment of nonrecurring charges and
13 remain at that rate for 5 years, at which time a new rate may be
14 set for the remaining amortization period. Recurring costs and
15 charges included in the emergency telephone technical charge shall
16 continue to be billed to the service user.

17 (2) The amount of the emergency telephone technical charge to
18 be billed to the service user shall be computed by dividing the
19 total emergency telephone technical charge by the number of
20 exchange access facilities within the 9-1-1 service district.

21 (3) The amount of emergency telephone technical charge payable
22 monthly by a service user for recurring costs and charges shall not
23 exceed 4% of the lesser of \$20.00 or the highest monthly rate
24 charged by the local exchange provider for primary basic local

27 service district. The amount of emergency telephone technical

1 charge payable monthly by a service user for nonrecurring costs and

6 service district. The difference, if any, between the amount of the
7 emergency telephone technical charge computed under subsection (2)
8 and the maximum permitted under this section shall be paid by the
9 county from funds available to the county or through cooperative
10 arrangements with public agencies within the 9-1-1 service
11 district.

12 (4) The emergency telephone technical charge shall be
13 collected in accordance with the regular billings of the local
14 exchange provider. The emergency telephone technical charge payable
15 by service users under this act shall be added to and shall be
16 stated separately in the billings to service users **OR OTHERWISE**
17 **DISCLOSED TO THE CONSUMER.**

18 (5) As used in this section, "local exchange provider" means a
19 provider of basic local exchange service as defined in section 102
20 of the Michigan telecommunications act, 1991 PA 179, MCL 484.2102.

21 Enacting section 1. Section 717 of the emergency 9-1-1 service
22 enabling act, 1986 PA 32, MCL 484.1717, is repealed.

23 Enacting section 2. This amendatory act takes effect July 1,
24 2012.
