HOUSE BILL NO. 4034

A bill to amend 1939 PA 176, entitled

"An act to create a commission relative to labor disputes, and to prescribe its powers and duties; to provide for the mediation and arbitration of labor disputes, and the holding of elections thereon; to regulate the conduct of parties to labor disputes and to require the parties to follow certain procedures; to regulate and limit the right to strike and picket; to protect the rights and privileges of employees, including the right to organize and engage in lawful concerted activities; to protect the rights and privileges of employers; to make certain acts unlawful; to make appropriations; and to prescribe means of enforcement and penalties for violations of this act,"

by amending sections 1, 2, 8, 14, 17, and 22 (MCL 423.1, 423.2, 423.8, 423.14, 423.17, and 423.22), as amended by 2012 PA 348.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 1. It is hereby declared as the public policy of this 2 state that the best interests of the people of the state are served 3 by protecting their right to work in a manner consistent with section 14(b) of the national labor relations act, 29 USC 164(b), 4 5 and preventing or promptly settling the prevention or prompt settlement of labor disputes; that strikes and lockouts and other 6 7 forms of industrial strife, regardless of where the merits of the 8 controversy lie, are forces productive ultimately of economic waste; that the interests and rights of the consumers and the 9 people of the state, while not direct parties thereto, should 10 11 always be considered, respected and protected; and that the 12 voluntary mediation of such disputes under the quidance and 13 supervision of a governmental agency will tend to promote permanent

industrial peace and the health, welfare, comfort and safety of the

Sec. 2. As used in this act:

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- 17 (a) "Company union" includes any employee association, 18 committee, agency, or representation plan, formed or existing for 19 the purpose, in whole or in part, of dealing with employers 20 concerning grievances or terms and conditions of employment, which in any manner or to any extent, and by any form of participation, 21 22 interference, or assistance, financial or otherwise, either in its organization, operation, or administration, is dominated or 23 24 controlled, sponsored or supervised, maintained, directed, or 25 financed by the employer.
 - (b) "Dispute" and "labor dispute" include but are not

- 1 restricted to any controversy concerning terms, tenure, or
- 2 conditions of employment, or concerning the association or
- 3 representation of employees in negotiating, fixing, maintaining, or
- 4 changing terms or conditions of employment, regardless of whether
- 5 the disputants stand in the proximate relation of employer and
- 6 employee.
- 7 (c) "Commission" means the employment relations commission
- 8 created by section 3.
- 9 (d) "Person" includes an individual, partnership, association,
- 10 corporation, business trust, or labor organization. , or any other
- 11 private entity.
- 12 (e) "Employee" includes any employee, and is not limited to
- 13 the employees of a particular employer, unless the act explicitly
- 14 provides otherwise, and includes any individual whose work has
- 15 ceased as a consequence of, or in connection with, any current
- 16 labor dispute or because of any act that is illegal under this act,
- 17 and who has not obtained any other regular and substantially
- 18 equivalent employment, but does not include any individual employed
- 19 as an agricultural laborer, or in the domestic service of any
- 20 family or any person at his home, or any individual employed by his
- 21 parent or spouse, or any individual employed as an executive or
- 22 supervisor, or any individual employed by an employer subject to
- 23 the railway labor act, 45 USC 151 to 188, or by any other person
- 24 who is not an employer as defined in this act.
- 25 (f) "Employer" means a person and includes any person acting
- 26 as an agent of an employer, but does not include the United States
- 27 or any corporation wholly owned by the United States; any federal
- 28 reserve bank; any employer subject to the railway labor act, 45 USC
- 29 151 to 188; the state or any political subdivision thereof; or any

- 1 labor organization, or anyone acting in the capacity of officer or
- 2 agent of such labor organization, other than when acting as an
- 3 employer.; or any entity subject to 1947 PA 336, MCL 423.201 to
- 4 423.217.
- 5 (g) "Labor organization" means any organization of any kind,
- 6 or any agency or employee representation committee or plan, in
- 7 which employees participate and that exists for the purpose, in
- 8 whole or in part, of dealing with employers concerning grievances,
- 9 labor disputes, wages, rates of pay, hours of employment, or
- 10 conditions of work.
- Sec. 8. Employees may do any of the following:
- 12 (a) Organize organize together or form, join, or assist in
- 13 labor organization; engage in lawful concerted activities for the
- 14 purpose of collective negotiation or bargaining or other mutual aid
- 15 and protection; or negotiate or bargain collectively with their
- 16 employers through representatives of their own free choice.
- (b) Refrain from any or all of the activities identified in
- 18 subdivision (a).
- 19 Sec. 14. (1) An individual shall not be required as a
- 20 condition of obtaining or continuing employment to do any of the
- 21 following:
- 22 (a) Refrain or resign from membership in, voluntary
- 23 affiliation with, or voluntary financial support of a labor
- 24 organization.
- 25 (b) Become or remain a member of a labor organization.
- 26 (c) Pay any dues, fees, assessments, or other charges or
- 27 expenses of any kind or amount or provide anything of value to a
- 28 labor organization.
- 29 (d) Pay to any charitable organization or third party an

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amount that is in lieu of, equivalent to, or any portion of dues, 1 2 fees, assessments, or other charges or expenses required of members of or employees represented by a labor organization. 3 4 (2) An agreement, contract, understanding, or practice between 5 or involving an employer and a labor organization that violates 6 subsection (1) is unlawful and unenforceable. This subsection 7 applies only to an agreement, contract, understanding, or practice that takes effect or is extended or renewed after the effective 8 9 date of the 2012 amendatory act that amended this section. 10 (3) Subsections (1) and (2) shall be implemented to the 11 maximum extent permitted by the United States constitution and 12 federal law. 13 (4) The court of appeals has exclusive original jurisdiction 14 over any action challenging the validity of subsection (1), (2), or 15 (3). The court of appeals shall hear the action in an expedited 16 manner. 17 (5) A person, employer, or labor organization that violates subsection (1) is liable for a civil fine of not more than \$500.00. 18 19 A civil fine recovered under this section shall be submitted to the 20 state treasurer for deposit in the general fund of this state. 21 (6) Except for actions required to be brought under subsection (4), a person who suffers an injury as a result of a violation or 22 23 threatened violation of subsection (1) may bring a civil action for 24 damages, injunctive relief, or both. In addition, a court shall 25 award court costs and reasonable attorney fees to a plaintiff who prevails in an action brought under this subsection. Remedies 26 27 provided for in this subsection are independent of and in addition to other penalties and remedies prescribed by this act. 28

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(7) For fiscal year 2012-2013, \$1,000,000.00 is appropriated

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to the department of licensing and regulatory affairs to be
expended to do all of the following regarding the amendatory act
that added this subsection:

- 4 (a) Respond to public inquiries regarding the amendatory act.
- (b) Provide the commission with sufficient staff and other
 resources to implement the amendatory act.
- (d) Any other purposes that the director of the department of
 licensing and regulatory affairs determines in his or her
 discretion are necessary to implement the amendatory act. Nothing in
 this act shall be construed to do either of the following:

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- (a) Interfere with the right of an employer to enter into an all-union agreement with 1 labor organization if it is the only organization established among the employer's employees and recognized by the employer, by consent, as the representative of a majority of the employer's employees.
- (b) Interfere with the right of the employer to make an all-union agreement with more than 1 labor organization established among the employer's employees if the labor organizations are recognized by the employer, by consent, as the representatives of a majority of the employer's employees.
- Sec. 17. (1) An employee or other person shall not by force, intimidation, or unlawful threats compel or attempt to compel any person to do any of the following:

- 4 (c) Pay to any charitable organization or third party an
 5 amount that is in lieu of, equivalent to, or any portion of dues,
 6 fees, assessments, or other charges or expenses required of members
 7 of or employees represented by a labor organization.
- 8 (2) A person who violates this section is liable for a civil
 9 fine of not more than \$500.00. A civil fine recovered under this
 10 section shall be submitted to the state treasurer for deposit in
 11 the general fund of this state.
 - (a) Become or remain a member of a labor organization.
 - (b) Refrain from engaging in employment.

- 15 Sec. 22. (1) It shall be unlawful for an An employer to shall
 16 not engage in a lockout or for and a labor organization to shall
 17 not engage in or instigate a strike without first having served
 18 notice as required in section 9.
- (2) It shall be unlawful for any An individual to shall notinstigate a lockout or strike that is unlawful under this section.
 - (3) Any person may pursue any appropriate legal or equitable remedy or other relief in any circuit court having jurisdiction with respect to any act or conduct in violation of any of the provisions of this act, except subsection (1) and sections $\frac{14(4)}{7}$, 16, and 17a. The existence of a criminal penalty with respect to any such act or conduct does not preclude appropriate equitable relief.
- Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days after the date it is enacted into law.
