

# HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 81

Reps. Farrington, LaFave, Maddock, Alexander, Hall, Crawford, Rendon, Afendoulis, Bellino, Brann, Cole, Eisen, Filler, Green, Griffin, Hauck, Hoitenga, Hornberger, Huizenga, Iden, Kahle, Leutheuser, Lightner, Markkanen, Meerman, Miller, O'Malley, Paquette, Reilly, Sheppard, Slagh, Vaupel, Wakeman, Wendzel, Wentworth, Whiteford, Wozniak and Yaroch offered the following resolution:

1           A resolution to urge the Congress of the United States to  
2           speedily approve the recently negotiated United States-Mexico-  
3           Canada Agreement.

4           Whereas, The North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) is a  
5           close tri-lateral relationship between the United States, Canada,  
6           and Mexico. For more than 25 years, NAFTA has been economically,  
7           culturally and strategically important for all parties; and

8           Whereas, NATFA is significant for the American economy. Trade



1 with Canada and Mexico supports nearly 12 million American jobs,  
2 and nearly 5 million of those jobs are supported by increased NAFTA  
3 trade. Since the agreement began in 1994, trade with Canada and  
4 Mexico has nearly quadrupled to \$1.3 trillion, and the two  
5 countries buy more than one-third of U.S. merchandise exports. U.S.  
6 service exports to Canada and Mexico have also tripled, rising from  
7 \$27.5 billion in 1993 to \$91.3 billion in 2017, thanks to the trade  
8 agreement's new market access and clearer rules; and

9       Whereas, Trade with Canada and Mexico is significant to U.S.  
10 states. For 43 states, our contiguous international neighbors  
11 represent the first or second largest export market, and all but  
12 one state counts Canada or Mexico as a top three trading partner.  
13 Canada is Michigan's largest export market, and Mexico is  
14 Michigan's third largest export market. NAFTA has also contributed  
15 to a 300 percent increase in Michigan's agricultural exports to  
16 Canada and Mexico; and

17       Whereas, Small and medium-sized enterprises in the United  
18 States rely on trade with Canada and Mexico to support and grow  
19 their business. Canada and Mexico are the top two export  
20 destinations for U.S. small and medium-sized enterprises, more than  
21 125,000 of which sold their goods and services in Canada and Mexico  
22 in 2014; and

23       Whereas, Trade among our North American trading partners is  
24 made up predominantly of intellectual property (IP)-intensive goods  
25 and services that employ millions of Americans in high paying jobs  
26 and generate billions of dollars in economic output. However, many  
27 of the IP-intensive goods, services, and exchanges through which  
28 trade is facilitated did not exist when the agreement was drafted.  
29 This situation has resulted in uneven and weak IP enforcement.



1 Stronger enforcement of IP rights will encourage more foreign  
2 direct investment and increase gross domestic product; and

3       Whereas, The United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA)  
4 creates a 21st century trade agreement for North America. The  
5 renegotiated USMCA has provisions favorable to U.S. autoworkers  
6 that would help level the playing field between U.S. and Mexican  
7 autoworkers. The updated agreement is also more beneficial to the  
8 agricultural sector than NAFTA and will offer a higher degree of  
9 certainty and stability to Michigan farmers. The new IP provisions  
10 are the most comprehensive of any multilateral U.S. trade agreement  
11 and are vastly superior to those included in NAFTA; and

12       Whereas, A seamless transition between NAFTA and the USMCA  
13 will ensure that none of the benefits in trade accomplished by the  
14 integration of the three North American economies will be lost;  
15 now, therefore, be it

16       Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we urge the  
17 Congress of the United States to speedily approve the recently  
18 negotiated United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement; and be it further

19       Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the  
20 President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United  
21 States House of Representatives, and the members of the Michigan  
22 congressional delegation.
