## SENATE RESOLUTION NO.5

Senators McMorrow, Chang, Moss, Hertel, Ananich, Polehanki, Geiss, Bayer, Brinks, McCann, Irwin, Hollier, Wojno, Alexander, Santana and Bullock offered the following resolution:

- A resolution to urge the Congress and President of the United
  States to end the partial federal government shutdown.
- 3 Whereas, The President and Congress failed to agree on
- 4 sufficient appropriations for Fiscal Year 2019 beyond December 21,
- 5 2018, leading to a partial federal government shutdown beginning on
- 6 December 22, 2018; and
- 7 Whereas, Almost 400,000 federal employees have been furloughed
- 8 as a result of the shutdown, while more than 400,000 others are
- 9 working without pay. In Michigan, more than 5,200 federal workers
- 10 are currently furloughed or working without pay. Missed paychecks
- 11 and uncertainty about when the next one will come place an enormous

- 1 strain on federal employees who we count on to provide important
- 2 services and administer critical programs. Creating financial
- 3 insecurity for these public servants is deeply unfair and harms our
- 4 state and national interest; and
- 5 Whereas, With a limited number of federal employees authorized
- 6 to work during the shutdown, many important programs, public
- 7 services, and offices are closed or working at diminished capacity.
- 8 The shutdown has already impacted park maintenance, food safety
- 9 inspections, air travel, small business loans, federal correctional
- 10 facilities, museums, research, and a host of other functions. If
- 11 the shutdown continues, assistance programs, tax return processing,
- 12 housing programs, and court operations will be impacted; and
- 13 Whereas, The health of the entire economy is threatened by an
- 14 extended shutdown. The ongoing government shutdown has cost the
- 15 economy \$3.6 billion. For each additional week where the government
- 16 remains shut down, experts say that it could cost the U.S. economy
- 17 \$1.2 billion of real gross domestic product; and
- 18 Whereas; Reaching agreement to resolve the budget impasse is
- 19 essential for the safety and well-being of federal employees in
- 20 Michigan and the people of the entire country. The current
- 21 shutdown, already the longest in American history, must be ended
- 22 before its impacts become even more severe; now, therefore, be it
- 23 Resolved by the Senate, That we urge the Congress and
- 24 President of the United States to end the partial federal
- 25 government shutdown; and be it further
- 26 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 27 President of the United States, the President of the United States
- 28 Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives,
- 29 and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.
