A bill to make, supplement, and adjust appropriations for various state departments and agencies for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022; to provide for certain conditions on appropriations; and to provide for the expenditure of the appropriations.

## PART 2

## PROVISIONS CONCERNING APPROPRIATIONS

**GENERAL SECTIONS**

1           Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state  
2 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under  
3 part 1 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022 is \$0.00 and  
4 total state spending from state sources to be paid to local units  
5 of government is \$0.00.  
6

7           Sec. 202. The appropriations made and expenditures authorized  
8 under this part and part 1 and the departments, commissions,  
9 boards, offices, and programs for which appropriations are made  
10 under this part and part 1 are subject to the management and budget  
11 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.  
12

13           Sec. 203. If the state administrative board, acting under  
14 section 3 of 1921 PA 2, MCL 17.3, transfers funds from an amount  
15 appropriated under this act, the legislature may, by a concurrent  
16 resolution adopted by a majority of the members elected to and  
17 serving in each house, inter-transfer funds within this act for the  
18 particular department, board, commission, office, or institution.  
19

20           Sec. 204. Funds appropriated in part 1 are subject to  
21 applicable federal audit and reporting requirements. Prompt action  
22 shall be taken if instances of noncompliance are identified,  
23 including noncompliance identified in an audit finding. If any  
24 instance of noncompliance is identified, including noncompliance  
25 identified in an audit finding, the state budget director shall  
26 take necessary and immediate action to rectify it. The state budget  
27 director shall notify the senate and house appropriations  
28 committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies when an  
29 instance of noncompliance is identified.

1           Sec. 205. Funds appropriated in part 1 from the federal  
2 American rescue plan act of 2021, Public Law 117-2, must be  
3 allocated and expended in a manner consistent with federal rules  
4 and regulations.

5           Sec. 206. The state budget director shall report on the status  
6 of funds appropriated in part 1, and all funds appropriated related  
7 to the coronavirus relief effort, to the senate and house  
8 appropriations committees and the senate and house fiscal agencies  
9 on a monthly basis until all funds are exhausted.

10

11 **CAPITAL OUTLAY**

12           Sec. 226. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for the new  
13 comprehensive state public health and environmental science  
14 laboratory shall be used for the planning and design of a  
15 consolidated, comprehensive, state-of-the-art laboratory to improve  
16 laboratory capacity for public health and safety.

17           (2) The department shall submit all of the following to the  
18 house and senate appropriations committees and the joint capital  
19 outlay subcommittee:

20           (a) Program statements and schematic planning documents,  
21 including a comparative assessment of building new laboratories,  
22 expanding existing laboratories, renovating existing laboratories,  
23 or repurposing another state-owned building.

24           (b) A summary of bid results.

25           (c) A progress report no later than June 1, 2022 and every 6  
26 months thereafter.

27           Sec. 227. The cost to construct the Michigan Technological  
28 University H-STEM Engineering and Health Technology  
29 Complex - Phase I project, initially authorized for construction in

1 2020 PA 257, is hereby increased by \$8,400,000.00 to a new total  
2 project cost of \$53,100,000.00 (total state building authority  
3 share \$29,699,800.00; Michigan Technological University share  
4 \$23,400,000.00; state general fund/general purpose share \$200.00).

5 **DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

6 Sec. 251. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
7 work-based learning health services academies, the department of  
8 education shall allocate \$250,000.00 as competitive grants to  
9 school districts and intermediate school districts that provide  
10 pupils in grades 9 through 12 with expanded opportunities for work-  
11 based learning health services academies hosted in partnership with  
12 NAF. Programs funded under this subsection are intended to increase  
13 the number of pupils who are college- and career-ready after high  
14 school graduation.

15 (2) To be eligible for a competitive grant funded under this  
16 section, the school district or intermediate school district must  
17 demonstrate that it has established a partnership with NAF, has at  
18 least 1 business entity on its advisory council, and has a higher  
19 education institution or technical school on its advisory council,  
20 and submit a spending plan.

21 (3) The department of education shall prioritize competitive  
22 grant awards under this section that target critical-need  
23 occupations.

24 (4) The department of education may award planning grants not  
25 to exceed \$12,000.00 and expense grants for NAF partnerships not to  
26 exceed \$3,500.00 a year.

27 (5) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
28 work-based learning health services academies are designated as a  
29 work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted



1 funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be  
2 available for expenditures for projects under this section until  
3 the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance  
4 with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,  
5 MCL 18.1451a:

6 (a) The purpose of the project is to support work-based  
7 learning health services academies in partnership with NAF.

8 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing competitive  
9 grants.

10 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$250,000.00.

11 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2023.

12

13 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

14 Sec. 301. (1) The funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
15 cooperative agreement for emergency response must be allocated by  
16 the department to local and tribal public health departments,  
17 school districts, public school academies, intermediate school  
18 districts, and nonpublic schools.

19 (2) Of the funds appropriated in part 1, no less than  
20 \$14,900,000.000 shall be appropriated to school districts, public  
21 school academies, intermediate school districts, and nonpublic  
22 schools to administer and support coronavirus testing of staff and  
23 students, including, but not limited to, teachers, counselors,  
24 administrators, support staff, aides, bus drivers, coaches,  
25 cafeteria staff, custodians, students playing contact sports, and  
26 other students as determined by the eligible school district,  
27 public school academy, intermediate school district, or nonpublic  
28 school.

29 (3) The department shall not allocate funds in this section to

1 local public health departments for which a county board of  
2 commissioners has passed a resolution rejecting these funds, if the  
3 rejection of these funds has occurred within 30 days of the  
4 effective date of this act.

5 (4) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
6 cooperative agreement for emergency response are designated as a  
7 work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted  
8 funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be  
9 available for expenditures for projects under this section until  
10 the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance  
11 with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,  
12 MCL 18.1451a:

13 (a) The purpose of the project is to conduct activities  
14 necessary to support the efforts of schools and local and tribal  
15 public health officials with respect to coronavirus testing,  
16 contact tracing, vaccine distribution efforts, and the  
17 administration of COVID-19 mitigation efforts.

18 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state  
19 employees or contracts.

20 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$29,704,700.

21 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.

22 Sec. 302. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for FEMA -  
23 COVID-19 early treatment and testing sites, the department of  
24 health and human services shall allocate \$75,000,000.00 to  
25 establish not less than 1 COVID-19 early treatment and testing site  
26 within each of this state's 8 emergency preparedness regions.

27 (2) An eligible COVID-19 early treatment and testing site may  
28 be a local department of health and human services office, a local  
29 public health department office, or a local health care provider.

1           (3) Not less than \$10,000,000.00 of the funds appropriated  
2 pursuant to this section must be allocated to local health care  
3 providers.

4           (4) An eligible COVID-19 early treatment and testing site must  
5 do all of the following:

6           (a) Maximize the number of COVID-19 therapeutic treatments  
7 that can be administered and minimize the time period between known  
8 infection and actual administering of the treatment.

9           (b) Utilize eligibility and prioritization criteria for COVID-  
10 19 therapeutic treatments that are not more stringent than federal  
11 eligibility and prioritization criteria for COVID-19 therapeutic  
12 treatments.

13           (c) Prioritize COVID-19 therapeutic treatments for high-risk  
14 individuals.

15           (d) Not use an individual's vaccination status as a factor for  
16 denying eligibility for COVID-19 therapeutic treatments.

17           (e) Demonstrate the ability to bill public and private  
18 insurance for the cost to administer COVID-19 therapeutic  
19 treatments.

20           (f) Provide COVID-19 therapeutic treatments at no cost to the  
21 individual.

22           (g) Follow informed consent requirements prior to  
23 administering a COVID-19 therapeutic treatment, as established by  
24 the United States Food and Drug Administration, or described by the  
25 emergency use authorization, or both, including providing all of  
26 the following:

27           (i) Information on alternatives to receiving a COVID-19  
28 therapeutic treatment.

29           (ii) Information on whether the COVID-19 therapeutic treatment

1 has received full or emergency use authorization from the United  
2 States Food and Drug Administration.

3 (iii) Information on and in what manner the development of the  
4 COVID-19 therapeutic treatment utilized aborted fetal tissue or  
5 human embryonic stem cell derivation lines.

6 (iv) Age-appropriate communications.

7 (5) An eligible COVID-19 early treatment and testing site may  
8 use funds allocated in this section for facility upgrade and  
9 conversion costs, lease and rent costs, staffing costs, personal  
10 protection equipment costs, and any other costs associated with  
11 providing a COVID-19 therapeutic treatment that is not covered by  
12 public or private insurance of the individual that receives the  
13 COVID-19 therapeutic treatment.

14 (6) The department of health and human services may set aside  
15 not more than 10% of the funds allocated in this section to  
16 reimburse eligible COVID-19 treatment sites for the cost of  
17 administering COVID-19 therapeutic treatments to individuals  
18 without public or private health insurance.

19 (7) As other early treatments for COVID-19 are authorized by  
20 the United States Food and Drug Administration, eligible COVID-19  
21 early treatment and testing sites may also administer those early  
22 treatments, provided that the eligible COVID-19 early treatment and  
23 testing sites continue to follow the requirements of this section.

24 (8) As other early treatments for COVID-19 are authorized by  
25 the United States Food and Drug Administration, the department of  
26 health and human services may utilize the funds set aside in  
27 subsection (6) to reimburse eligible COVID-19 early treatment and  
28 testing sites for the cost of administering those treatments to  
29 individuals without public or private health insurance.

1 (9) As used in this section:

2 (a) "Local health care provider" includes, but is not limited  
3 to, a hospital, physician's office, pharmacy, infusion center,  
4 blood or plasma donation center, nursing facility, adult day care  
5 facility, and program of all-inclusive care for the elderly  
6 location.

7 (b) "High-risk individuals" means individuals at higher risk  
8 for progression to severe COVID-19, including, but not limited to,  
9 individuals classified as higher risk based on definitions and  
10 findings from the federal Centers for Disease Control and  
11 Prevention.

12 (10) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is  
13 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$75,000,000.00 in American  
14 Rescue Plan Act - Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds for  
15 COVID-19 early treatment and testing sites to be used for projects  
16 under this section, subject to both of the following:

17 (a) The amount appropriated under this subsection must not be  
18 spent or otherwise distributed after the Federal Emergency  
19 Management Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatment  
20 and testing sites.

21 (b) Money appropriated under this subsection that is spent or  
22 otherwise distributed before the Federal Emergency Management  
23 Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatment and testing  
24 sites must be offset with Federal Emergency Management Agency funds  
25 if received during the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022.

26 Sec. 303. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for FEMA -  
27 COVID-19 early treatments procurements, the department of health  
28 and human services shall allocate \$25,000,000.00 to purchase  
29 additional COVID-19 therapeutic treatments in addition to the

1 supply of federally allocated COVID-19 therapeutic treatments. The  
2 department of health and human services shall distribute the  
3 additional COVID-19 therapeutic treatments to eligible COVID-19  
4 early treatment and testing sites funded in this part and part 1  
5 based on need and utilization.

6 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated under part 1, there  
7 is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$25,000,000.00 in American  
8 Rescue Plan Act - Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds for  
9 COVID-19 early treatments procurements for projects under this  
10 section, subject to both of the following:

11 (a) The amount appropriated under this subsection must not be  
12 spent or otherwise distributed after the Federal Emergency  
13 Management Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatments  
14 procurements.

15 (b) Money appropriated under this subsection that is spent or  
16 otherwise distributed before the Federal Emergency Management  
17 Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatments  
18 procurements must be offset with Federal Emergency Management  
19 Agency funds if received during the fiscal year ending September  
20 30, 2022.

21 Sec. 304. (1) Funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
22 epidemiology and lab capacity enhancing detection expansion must be  
23 allocated and expended in a manner consistent with federal rules  
24 and regulations.

25 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
26 epidemiology and lab capacity enhancing detection expansion, there  
27 is allocated an amount not to exceed \$75,000,000.00 for COVID-19  
28 early treatment and testing sites for unreimbursed costs from the  
29 Federal Emergency Management Agency subject to both of the

1 following:

2 (a) The amount allocated under this subsection must not be  
3 spent or otherwise distributed after the Federal Emergency  
4 Management Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatment  
5 and testing sites.

6 (b) Money allocated under this subsection that is spent or  
7 otherwise distributed before the Federal Emergency Management  
8 Agency approves a project for COVID-19 early treatment and testing  
9 sites must be offset with Federal Emergency Management Agency funds  
10 if received during the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022.

11 (3) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
12 epidemiology and lab capacity enhancing detection expansion are  
13 designated as a work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or  
14 unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and  
15 shall be available for expenditures for projects under this section  
16 until the projects have been completed. The following is in  
17 compliance with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984  
18 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

19 (a) The purpose of the project is to continue to monitor,  
20 respond to, and prevent COVID-19 by expanding testing, contact  
21 tracing, disease investigations and surveillance activities.

22 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state  
23 employees or contracts.

24 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is  
25 \$367,327,300.00.

26 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.

27 Sec. 305. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
28 epidemiology and lab capacity school safety, the department of  
29 health and human services shall purchase and maintain an inventory

1 of coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies and equipment,  
2 including home test kits, to distribute to school districts, public  
3 school academies, intermediate school districts, and nonpublic  
4 schools. The coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies and  
5 equipment, including home test kits, shall be used for coronavirus  
6 testing and contact tracing staff and students including, but not  
7 limited to, teachers, counselors, administrators, support staff,  
8 aides, bus drivers, coaches, cafeteria staff, custodians, students  
9 playing contact sports, and other students as determined by the  
10 eligible school district, public school academy, intermediate  
11 school district, or nonpublic school, regardless of the  
12 individual's vaccination status.

13 (2) Within 15 calendar days of the effective date of this act,  
14 the department of health and human services shall notify school  
15 districts, public school academies, intermediate school districts,  
16 and nonpublic schools of the option to not participate in the  
17 direct distribution of coronavirus testing and contact tracing  
18 supplies and equipment, including home test kits, the method by  
19 which the school district, public school academy, intermediate  
20 school district, or nonpublic school can opt out, and the maximum  
21 amount of direct financial reimbursement that each school district,  
22 public school academy, intermediate school district, or nonpublic  
23 school could receive based on an equitable head count distribution.  
24 If a school district, public school academy, intermediate school  
25 district, or nonpublic school notifies the department of health and  
26 human services and the Michigan Association of Intermediate School  
27 Administrators not more than 10 business days after receiving the  
28 required notification in this subsection from the department of  
29 health and human services that it does not wish to participate in



1 the direct distribution of coronavirus testing and contact tracing  
2 supplies and equipment, including home test kits, that school  
3 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or  
4 nonpublic school may request to receive direct financial  
5 reimbursement from the department of health and human services for  
6 coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies and equipment,  
7 including home test kits, purchased directly by that school  
8 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or  
9 nonpublic school. A school district, public school academy,  
10 intermediate school district, or nonpublic school that opts out as  
11 described in this subsection may purchase coronavirus testing and  
12 contact tracing supplies and equipment, including home test kits,  
13 either directly from the department of health and human services or  
14 from another source. The department of health and human services  
15 must provide direct financial reimbursement within 30 days of  
16 receipt of the request.

17 (3) The department of health and human services must maintain  
18 a publicly accessible online list of acceptable coronavirus testing  
19 and contact tracing supplies and equipment, including home test  
20 kits, that could be purchased with the funds appropriated in this  
21 section.

22 (4) No state or local government entity shall confiscate or  
23 redistribute coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies and  
24 equipment, including home test kits, from an eligible school  
25 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or  
26 nonpublic school without first receiving the consent of that  
27 eligible school district, public school academy, intermediate  
28 school district, or nonpublic school.

29 (5) The department of health and human services shall

1 collaborate with the Michigan Association of Intermediate School  
2 Administrators to establish procedures for the as-needed  
3 redistribution of coronavirus testing and contact tracing supplies  
4 and equipment, including home kits, from school districts, public  
5 school academies, intermediate school districts, and nonpublic  
6 schools. The Michigan Association of Intermediate School  
7 Administrators shall coordinate the redistribution of coronavirus  
8 testing and contact tracing supplies and equipment, including home  
9 kits, based on need and after receiving the consent of that school  
10 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or  
11 nonpublic school. Not more than 1% of the funds appropriated in  
12 part 1 for ARP - epidemiology and lab capacity school safety, or an  
13 amount equal to actual costs incurred, whichever is less, may be  
14 used by the Michigan Association of Intermediate School  
15 Administrators for administrative and logistical costs related to  
16 this subsection.

17 (6) Subsections (4) and (5) do not prohibit an eligible school  
18 district, public school academy, intermediate school district, or  
19 nonpublic school from voluntarily sending coronavirus testing and  
20 contact tracing supplies and equipment, including home test kits,  
21 in its possession to another eligible school district, public  
22 school academy, intermediate school district, or nonpublic school  
23 that is in need of additional coronavirus testing and contact  
24 tracing supplies and equipment, including home test kits.

25 (7) The department of health and human services shall  
26 collaborate with the department of education to effectuate this  
27 section.

28 (8) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
29 epidemiology and lab capacity school safety are designated as a

1 work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted  
2 funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be  
3 available for expenditures for projects under this section until  
4 the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance  
5 with section 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,  
6 MCL 18.1451a:

7 (a) The purpose of the project is to support screening and  
8 testing activities to facilitate the safe operations of in-person  
9 school instruction at eligible school districts, public school  
10 academies, intermediate school districts, and nonpublic schools.

11 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state  
12 employees or contracts.

13 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is  
14 \$150,799,300.00.

15 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.

16 Sec. 306. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
17 health care recruitment, retention, and training, the department of  
18 health and human services shall allocate \$300,000,000.00 for health  
19 care recruitment, retention, and training programming to health  
20 care employers that can demonstrate an eligible qualifying need  
21 under the rules and regulations of the federal coronavirus state  
22 fiscal recovery funding. Additionally, health care employers must  
23 not request funds under this section for any investments related to  
24 recruitment or retention announced before December 1, 2021.

25 (2) The department of health and human services must allocate  
26 75% of the funds appropriated pursuant to this section to the  
27 Michigan Health and Hospital Association for administration to  
28 acute care and behavioral health care providers, of which not less  
29 than 10% appropriated pursuant to this subsection must be allocated

1 to critical access hospitals and small and rural providers that are  
2 awarded rural access payments under section 1802(2) of article 6 of  
3 2021 PA 87.

4 (3) The department of health and human services must allocate  
5 25% of the funds appropriated pursuant to this section to post-  
6 acute care providers and federally qualified health centers  
7 (FQHCs).

8 (4) If a health care employer receives funds appropriated  
9 pursuant to this section and has established a COVID-19 vaccine  
10 policy, the policy must allow for an employee exemption for both of  
11 the following:

12 (a) Any employee for whom a physician certifies and properly  
13 documents that a COVID-19 vaccine is clinically contraindicated for  
14 the employee.

15 (b) Any employee who provides a written statement and can  
16 document in a manner consistent with the health care employer's  
17 policies and procedures that the requirements of the COVID-19  
18 vaccine policy cannot be met because of the employee's religious  
19 convictions.

20 (5) Health care recruitment, retention, and training  
21 programming may include, but is not limited to, cash recruitment  
22 bonuses, student loan payment assistance, cash retention bonuses,  
23 tuition assistance, and other forms of training programming. The  
24 maximum amount any health care employer, except for critical access  
25 hospitals and small and rural providers that are awarded rural  
26 access payments under section 1802(2) of article 6 of 2021 PA 87,  
27 can use for cash recruitment bonuses is 25%, and the maximum amount  
28 any health care employer, except for critical access hospitals and  
29 small and rural providers that are awarded rural access payments

1 under section 1802(2) of article 6 of 2021 PA 87, can use for cash  
2 retention bonuses is 20%.

3 (6) Nothing in this section requires a health care employer  
4 that receives funds appropriated in this section to violate any  
5 federal rule or regulation on a COVID-19 vaccine policy.

6 (7) If a health care employer receives funds appropriated in  
7 this section and has established a COVID-19 vaccine policy, the  
8 policy must require the employer to respond in a written statement  
9 of an employee's COVID-19 vaccine exemption approval or  
10 disapproval.

11 (8) As a condition of receiving funds appropriated in this  
12 section, a health care employer must agree to not use an employee's  
13 vaccination status as a factor for distributing recruitment,  
14 retention, and training program funds under this section.

15 (9) By September 30, 2022, the department of health and human  
16 services must provide a report to the house and senate  
17 appropriations committees, the house and senate fiscal agencies,  
18 and the state budget office on the overall efficacy of the funds  
19 appropriated in this section, including, but not limited to, the  
20 statewide outcomes of recruitment efforts, retention efforts, and  
21 training efforts to reduce statewide health care staffing  
22 vacancies. The Michigan Health and Hospital Association and other  
23 recipients shall provide data and metrics, in a manner approved by  
24 the department, to fulfill the reporting requirements of this  
25 section.

26 Sec. 307. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
27 nursing facility room conversion pilot project, the department of  
28 health and human services shall allocate \$10,000,000.00 as a  
29 competitive grant program to reimburse nursing facilities that are

1 awarded these grants for 50% of the cost for nursing facilities to  
2 convert multi-resident rooms into single resident rooms. The  
3 department of health and human services shall prioritize awarding  
4 competitive grants for the conversion of rooms that have more than  
5 2 residents into single resident rooms.

6 Sec. 308. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
7 nursing home respirators, the department of health and human  
8 services shall allocate \$5,000,000.00 to assist nursing facilities,  
9 assisted living facilities, and other long-term care facilities in  
10 complying with Occupational Safety and Health Administration  
11 respiratory protection standards.

12 Sec. 310. (1) The department shall allocate funds appropriated  
13 in part 1 for ARP - vaccine support to local public health  
14 departments for education, outreach, and other community engagement  
15 strategies.

16 (2) To the greatest extent allowed under federal rules and  
17 regulations, any vaccine education, outreach, and other community  
18 engagement strategies must be inclusive of other broader COVID-19  
19 education, outreach, and other community engagement strategies,  
20 including early treatment options, testing, and other mitigation  
21 strategies.

22 (3) The department shall not allocate funds in this section to  
23 local public health departments for which a county board of  
24 commissioners has passed a resolution rejecting these funds, if the  
25 rejection of these funds has occurred within 30 days of the  
26 effective date of this act.

27 (4) A recipient of a COVID-19 vaccine administered from the  
28 funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP - vaccine support shall be  
29 provided with information regarding or informed if and in what

1 manner the development of the vaccine utilized aborted fetal tissue  
2 or human embryonic stem cell derivation lines.

3 (5) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
4 vaccine support are designated as a work project appropriation, and  
5 any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of  
6 the fiscal year and shall be available for expenditures for  
7 projects under this section until the projects have been completed.  
8 The following is in compliance with section 451a of the management  
9 and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

10 (a) The purpose of the project is to increase vaccine  
11 education, outreach, and other community engagement strategies and  
12 must be inclusive of other broader COVID-19 education, outreach,  
13 and other community engagement strategies, including early  
14 treatment options, testing, and other mitigation strategies.

15 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing local public  
16 health departments.

17 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$54,143,900.00.

18 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.

19 Sec. 311. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for MI  
20 Choice waiver program presumptive eligibility risk pool, and to the  
21 greatest extent allowable under E-FMAP, the department of health  
22 and human services shall allocate \$5,000,000.00 to develop and  
23 implement a pilot risk pool in no fewer than 2 service areas to  
24 cover 90% of MI Choice waiver agents' exposure to financial losses  
25 in those service areas for up to 6 weeks of services costs  
26 associated with incorrect presumptive eligibility determinations.

27 (2) Any MI Choice waiver agent in the pilot service areas  
28 that, at any point in time, incorrectly presumes eligibility for  
29 not less than 20% of its enrollees is not eligible for funding from

1 this project for the balance of this project's term.

2 Sec. 312. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
3 Morris Hood kidney foundation, the department of health and human  
4 services shall provide \$14,000,000.00 in support to the National  
5 Kidney Foundation of Michigan for a multiyear initiative to  
6 implement the chronic kidney disease prevention initiative that was  
7 adopted by the department of health and human services and the  
8 National Kidney Foundation of Michigan in March 2021. This  
9 initiative, administered by the National Kidney Foundation of  
10 Michigan and its partners, shall be known as the Morris Hood III  
11 chronic kidney disease prevention initiative.

12 (2) The Morris Hood III chronic kidney disease prevention  
13 initiative shall do all of the following:

14 (a) Create a collaborative and comprehensive kidney disease  
15 prevention and awareness system, including a focus on communities  
16 at the greatest risk of kidney disease and those facing health  
17 disparities.

18 (b) Increase knowledge, awareness, and understanding of  
19 preventable kidney disease, increase adoption of evidence-based  
20 strategies to reduce chronic kidney disease, and identify financial  
21 sustainability strategies for chronic kidney disease detection,  
22 management, and prevention.

23 (c) Identify patients at risk of developing chronic kidney  
24 disease through collaboration with the department of health and  
25 human services making use of Michigan Medicaid data, kidney disease  
26 data, lab data, and shared metrics from partner organizations.

27 (d) Develop a cost-benefit analysis on the strategies  
28 identified to reduce preventable kidney disease or mitigate the  
29 effect of kidney disease.



1           (3) Under the Morris Hood III chronic kidney disease  
2 prevention initiative, the department of health and human services  
3 shall work with the National Kidney Foundation of Michigan to do  
4 all of the following:

5           (a) Establish a statewide advisory committee to assist in the  
6 implementation of the initiative, drawing from consumers,  
7 providers, and advocates.

8           (b) Cooperate in sharing appropriate and timely data to enable  
9 the initiative to target resources effectively.

10           (c) Produce an annual status report to be shared with the  
11 legislature and interested parties.

12           (d) Convene periodic meetings with providers to assure  
13 awareness of the initiative and its targeted population.

14           (e) Cooperate with Michigan's Medicaid health plans to  
15 identify populations most at risk for kidney disease.

16           Sec. 313. From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
17 hospital airborne pathogen control program, \$10,000,000.00 shall be  
18 allocated to hospitals for in-room ceiling installations and  
19 internet of things-connected Michigan-based ultraviolet control  
20 technology filtration and cleaning systems or other devices that  
21 reduce surface pathogens and airborne contaminants for control of  
22 harmful pathogens in the air and on settled surfaces. The program  
23 shall be designed to meet all of the following parameters:

24           (a) The program shall be a pilot program.

25           (b) Hospitals and health systems that were in the top 10  
26 hospitals/health systems in the number of COVID patients treated in  
27 the state in calendar year 2021 and that have submitted letters of  
28 intent to utilize this technology to the Michigan department of  
29 health and human services by April 1, 2022 shall be given priority

1 for allocations.

2 (c) Allocation of these funds should be made through 2 equal  
3 grants to qualified applicants.

4 (d) Hospitals participating in the pilot program shall track  
5 the outcome metrics as defined during grant submission.

6 Sec. 314. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
7 adult foster care and homes for the aged COVID-19 relief, the  
8 department of health and human services shall establish a process  
9 to provide a \$700.00 per bed grant to eligible facilities as  
10 defined in subsection (4) to cover COVID-19 pandemic costs.

11 (2) The department of health and human services shall develop  
12 an application form for the funding.

13 (3) Eligible facilities must fill out and submit the  
14 application form referenced in subsection (2) to the department of  
15 health and human services within 90 days of the effective date of  
16 this act.

17 (4) Eligible facilities shall include adult foster care  
18 facilities licensed by the department of licensing and regulatory  
19 affairs, homes for the aged licensed by the department of licensing  
20 and regulatory affairs, facilities with approved status from the  
21 department of licensing and regulatory affairs for exemption from  
22 the home for the aged licensure, and self-directed and other  
23 nonlicensed residential settings for older adults and individuals

26 Sec. 315. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
27 health units, the department of health and human services shall  
28 allocate \$4,000,000.00 to a public university located in a city  
29 with a population greater than 500,000 according to the most recent

1 federal decennial census to help create a Michigan mobile health  
2 corps program.

3 (2) The Michigan mobile health corps shall be a collaborative  
4 to help address health disparities among populations with limited  
5 access to medical care and social services resources in Southeast  
6 Michigan.

7 Sec. 316. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
8 supplemental payments to private child caring institutions,  
9 \$6,200,000.00 shall be awarded as a supplemental payment adjustment  
10 to contracted child caring institutions for abuse, neglect, and  
11 juvenile justice services to address the economic impact of the  
12 COVID-19 public health emergency.

13 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
14 supplemental payments to private child caring institutions,  
15 \$2,000,000.00 shall be awarded to a qualified residential treatment  
16 program that has been in existence for at least 75 years and is  
17 located in a city with a population of between 57,000 and 58,000  
18 located in a county with a population of greater than 1,500,000  
19 according to the 2010 federal decennial census. Funding in this  
20 subsection shall be paid to the qualifying entities within 30 days  
21 of the effective date of this act.

22 Sec. 317. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
23 homeless shelter repair grants, the department of health and human  
24 services shall establish a grant program targeted to homeless  
25 shelter service providers. In making grants under this section, the  
26 department shall maximize to the greatest extent possible broad  
27 geographic distribution. Grants are intended to fund necessary  
28 physical improvements to homeless shelter facilities, including,  
29 but not limited to:

1 (a) Repairs to plumbing, electrical, and heating, ventilation,  
2 and air-conditioning systems.

3 (b) Structural improvements to accommodate persons with  
4 disabilities.

5 (c) Creation of noncongregate housing spaces for individuals  
6 and families.

7 (d) Creation of separate noncongregate spaces for those who  
8 are medically recuperating.

9 (e) Installation of necessary safety and security  
10 enhancements, including, but not limited to, smoke alarms and fire  
11 abatement systems.

12 (2) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
13 homeless shelter repair grants are designated as a work project  
14 appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not  
15 lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for  
16 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects  
17 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section  
18 451a of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451a:

19 (a) The purpose of the project is to fund physical  
20 improvements to facilities operated by homeless shelter service  
21 providers.

22 (b) The project will be accomplished by utilizing state  
23 employees or contracts.

24 (c) The total estimated cost of the project is \$10,000,000.00.

25 (d) The tentative completion date is September 30, 2026.

26 Sec. 318. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
27 nursing home infection control grants, the department of health and  
28 human services shall allocate \$29,000,000.00 in grants to skilled  
29 nursing facilities. Grants shall fund structural and operational

1 improvements to skilled nursing facilities that would help reduce  
2 the spread of infectious disease. Eligible projects include, but  
3 are not limited to, the following:

4 (a) Efforts to improve indoor air quality, including  
5 maintenance and improvements to indoor heating, ventilation, and  
6 air-conditioning systems.

7 (b) The creation of negative air pressure rooms.

8 (c) The creation of isolation areas in nursing homes for sick  
9 residents.

10 (d) The purchase and installation of technologies to reduce  
11 the spread of infectious disease.

12 (2) Individual nursing facilities are limited to no more than  
13 \$500,000.00 in funds allocated in subsection (1).

14 (3) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
15 nursing home infection control grants are designated as a work  
16 project appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds  
17 shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be  
18 available for expenditures for projects under this section until  
19 the projects have been completed. The following is in compliance

29 Sec. 319. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -

1 child welfare mitigation payments, the department of health and  
2 human services shall provide a supplemental payment to licensed  
3 foster family homes or foster family group homes and unlicensed  
4 relative caregivers who are currently caring for a child placed in  
5 foster care and youth currently supported in independent living  
6 foster care arrangements.

7 (2) Payment of funds will be set at \$1,500.00 per child in a  
8 foster family home, foster family group home, or independent living  
9 arrangements.

10 (3) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
11 child welfare mitigation payments are designated as a work project  
12 appropriation, and any unencumbered or unallotted funds shall not  
13 lapse at the end of the fiscal year and shall be available for  
14 expenditures for projects under this section until the projects  
15 have been completed. The following is in compliance with section

25 Sec. 321. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
26 respite services home and community-based services waiver, the  
27 department of health and human services shall allocate  
28 \$20,000,000.00 for respite supports to in-home providers of  
29 department of health and human services-funded services to provide

1 respite relief for families providing continuous direct care  
2 support to a family member.

3 (2) The unexpended funds appropriated in part 1 for ARP -  
4 respite services home and community-based services waiver are  
5 designated as a work project appropriation, and any unencumbered or  
6 unallotted funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year and  
7 shall be available for expenditures for projects under this section  
8 until the projects have been completed. The following is in
