HOUSE BILL NO. 4890

May 20, 2021, Introduced by Reps. Hope, Anthony, Young, Scott, Weiss, Aiyash, Kuppa, Whitsett, Manoogian, Hood and Brixie and referred to the Committee on Regulatory Reform.

A bill to amend 1966 PA 291, entitled "Firefighters training council act,"

by amending sections 2, 11, 13, and 14 (MCL 29.362, 29.371, 29.373, and 29.374), section 2 as amended by 2020 PA 133 and sections 11, 13, and 14 as amended by 2017 PA 144.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- 2 (a) "Airport rescue firefighter" means an employee of or
- 3 volunteer assigned by a political subdivision to assist an

- 1 organized fire department or public safety department who is
- 2 certified under National Fire Protection Association standard no.
- 3 1003 and meets the requirements of the Federal Aviation
- 4 Administration under 14 CFR part 139, whose job description,
- 5 duties, or responsibilities include responding to an aircraft
- 6 accident.
- 7 (b) "Certificate" means a numbered document issued by the
- 8 state fire marshal to a person an individual who has obtained
- 9 certification under this act.
- 10 (c) "Certification" means either of the following:
- 11 (i) A determination by the state fire marshal that a person an
- 12 individual meets the certification requirements for a position
- 13 within the fire service, as established by the council under this
- 14 act. Recognized positions in the fire service include, but are not
- 15 limited to, firefighter, fire chief, public safety director, fire
- 16 inspector, plans examiner, fire investigator, fire officer,
- 17 hazardous materials responder, technical rescue responder, airport
- 18 rescue firefighter, and fire service instructor. Certifications for
- 19 each position within the fire service must comply with the Michigan
- 20 occupational safety and health administration general industry
- 21 safety and health standard, R 408.17411 of the Michigan
- 22 Administrative Code.
- (ii) A determination by the state fire marshal that a person an
- 24 individual was employed as a firefighter before October 1, 1988 and
- 25 that the person individual is otherwise authorized under this act
- 26 to be employed as a firefighter.
- 27 (d) "Contested case" means that term as defined in section 3
- 28 of the administrative procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL
- **29** 24.203.

- (e) "Council" means the firefighters training council created
 under section 3.
- 3 (f) "Executive secretary" means the executive secretary of the
 4 council.
- 5 (g) "Felony" means a violation of the laws of this state,6 another state, or the United States that is designated as a felony.
- 7 (h) "Firefighter" means a member of an organized fire
 8 department or public safety department who is responsible for, or
 9 is in a capacity that includes responsibility for, the
 10 extinguishment of fires, the directing of the extinguishment of
- 11 fires, the directing or management of emergency response
- 12 activities, fire safety prevention inspection, plans examination,
- 13 fire investigation, hazardous materials response, technical rescue
- 14 response, airport rescue response, airport rescue firefighting,
- 15 fire service instruction, and the enforcement of the general fire
- 16 laws of this state and the community where he or she serves.
- (i) "Firefighter training" means an education or trainingprogram including a program eligible to receive funding from the
- 19 fireworks safety fund created in section 11 of the Michigan
- 20 fireworks safety act, former 2011 PA 256, MCL 28.461, and other
- 21 training programs as approved by the state fire marshal, designed
- 22 and intended to enhance the ability of an organized fire department
- 23 or public safety department and the personnel of an organized fire
- 24 department or public safety department to safeguard life and
- 25 property from damage from explosion, fire, or disaster, and to
- 26 deliver fire suppression, emergency medical service, hazardous
- 27 material response, technical rescue, airport rescue and
- 28 firefighting, fire inspection, fire investigation, fire safety
- 29 education, and other related fire services.

(j) "Fire chief" means the individual who serves as the
 administrative head of an organized fire department.

- 3 (k) "Fire inspector" means an employee of or volunteer
 4 assigned by a political subdivision to assist an organized fire
 5 department or public safety department whose job description,
 6 duties, or responsibilities include, or who is in a capacity that
 7 includes responsibility for, inspecting property for fire code
 8 violations and enforcing the general fire codes of the jurisdiction
 9 that he or she serves.
 - (*l*) "Fire instructor" means an employee of or volunteer assigned by a political subdivision to assist an organized fire department or public safety department, or other individual who is certified to instruct 1 or more council-approved fire service training programs.
- 15 (m) "Fire investigator" means an employee of or volunteer 16 assigned by a political subdivision to assist an organized fire 17 department or public safety department who is certified under 18 National Fire Protection Association standard no. 1033, whose job 19 description, duties, or responsibilities include investigating the 20 origin and cause of fires, and who has obtained the skills and 21 knowledge necessary to conduct, coordinate, and complete a fire 22 investigation. Fire investigator does not include a fire 23 investigator who is employed by a law enforcement agency as that term is defined in section 2 of the Michigan commission on law 24 25 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.602, other than a 26 public safety department, or a professional investigator licensed 27 under the professional investigator licensure act, 1965 PA 285, MCL 338.821 to 338.851. 28
- (n) "Fire officer" means a current member of an organized fire

- 1 department or public safety department assigned a rank above
- 2 firefighter who is responsible for, or is in a capacity that
- 3 includes responsibility for, performing supervisory or management
- 4 responsibilities of an emergency or nonemergency nature within his
- 5 or her organized fire department or public safety department. Fire
- 6 officer includes titles such as sergeant, lieutenant, captain, and
- 7 chief officer.
- 8 (o) "Fire service" means the engaging in the directing or
- 9 management of emergency response activities, fire safety prevention
- 10 inspection, plans examination, fire investigation, hazardous
- 11 material response, technical rescue response, airport rescue
- 12 response, airport rescue firefighting, fire service instruction,
- 13 and the enforcement of the general fire laws of this state and the
- 14 communities therein by fire service members and organized fire
- 15 departments and public safety departments.
- 16 (p) "Fire service course" means a training course or activity
- 17 that is approved by the council and meets the standard for
- 18 firefighter training in subdivision (i).
- 19 (q) "Fire service discipline" means each of the respective
- 20 certifiable fire service positions included under this act. Fire
- 21 service discipline includes fire chief, fire inspector, fire
- 22 instructor, fire investigator, fire officer, public safety
- 23 director, plans examiner, firefighter, hazardous materials
- 24 responder, technical rescue responder, and airport rescue
- 25 firefighter.
- 26 (r) "Fire service member" or "member" means a person an
- 27 individual described in subdivision (a), (h), (j), (k), (l), (m),
- 28 (n), (u), (aa), (dd), (ff), or (ii).
- 29 (s) "Full-time" means employment during which an individual

- 1 works scheduled shifts, is paid for all hours he or she works, and
- 2 works sufficient hours weekly to be classified as a full-time
- 3 employee by the applicable employing political subdivision.
- 4 (t) "Hazardous materials" means any chemical, substance,
- 5 compound, mixture, or other material defined as, designated as,
- 6 listed as, or having the same characteristics as any chemical
- 7 substance, compound, mixture, or material defined as, designated
- 8 as, or listed as hazardous under federal or state law or
- 9 regulations.
- 10 (u) "Hazardous materials responder" means an employee of or
- 11 volunteer assigned by a political subdivision to assist an
- 12 organized fire department or public safety department who is
- 13 certified under National Fire Protection Association standard no.
- 14 1072 and who is trained to or whose responsibilities include,
- 15 responding to and being actively involved with the mitigation of a
- 16 hazardous materials incident including a weapon of mass destruction
- 17 event.
- 18 (v) "Hazardous materials response" means any response to an
- 19 event involving any chemical, substance, compound, mixture, or
- 20 other material defined as, designated as, listed as, or having the
- 21 same characteristics as any substance, compound, mixture, or
- 22 material defined as, designated as, or listed as hazardous under
- 23 federal or state law or regulation.
- 24 (w) "Organized fire department" means that term as defined in
- 25 section 1 of the fire prevention code, 1941 PA 207, MCL 29.1.
- 26 (x) "Paid on-call" means employment during which an individual
- 27 works on an on-call basis, is paid for all hours he or she works,
- 28 and only occasionally works scheduled shifts.
- 29 (y) "Part-time" means employment during which an individual is

- 1 paid for all hours he or she works and works scheduled shifts but
- 2 works fewer hours weekly than the hours necessary to be classified
- 3 as a full-time employee by the applicable employing political
- 4 subdivision.
- 5 (z) "PFAS" means a perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl
- 6 substance.
- 7 (aa) "Plans examiner" means an employee of or volunteer
- 8 assigned by a political subdivision to assist an organized fire
- 9 department or public safety department who is certified under
- 10 National Fire Protection Association standard no. 1031 and whose
- 11 job description, duties, or responsibilities include conducting
- 12 plan reviews of construction documents for compliance with the
- 13 general fire codes of the community that he or she serves.
- 14 (bb) "Political subdivision" means a county, municipality,
- 15 school district, or any other local governmental unit, agency,
- 16 body, board, or commission but does not include a state department,
- 17 board, commission, or agency of state government.
- 18 (cc) "Public safety department" means a department of a
- 19 political subdivision providing both law enforcement and fire
- 20 services either separately or utilizing a combined response force
- 21 with personnel trained and certified as both firefighters under
- 22 this act and law enforcement officers under the Michigan commission
- 23 on law enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.601 to
- 24 28.615, under the direction and administration of a single
- 25 director.
- 26 (dd) "Public safety director" means the individual who serves
- 27 as the administrative head of a public safety department.
- 28 (ee) "Rule" means a rule promulgated under the administrative
- 29 procedures act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.201 to 24.328.

- 1 (ff) "Technical rescue responder" means an employee of or
- 2 volunteer assigned by a political subdivision to assist an
- 3 organized fire department or public safety department who is
- 4 certified under National Fire Protection Association standard no.
- 5 1006 and who has received training in the application of special
- 6 knowledge, skills, and equipment to safely resolve unique and
- 7 complex rescue situations.
- 8 (gg) "Technical rescue response" means those aspects of saving
- 9 life or property that employ the use of tools and skills that
- 10 exceed those normally reserved for firefighting, medical emergency,
- 11 and rescue. These disciplines include, but are not limited to, rope
- 12 rescue, confined space rescue, trench and excavation rescue, and
- 13 building collapse rescue.
- 14 (hh) "Volunteer" means appointment or employment for which an
- 15 individual receives no compensation for work provided, or
- 16 appointment or employment for which an individual receives
- 17 compensation in the form of reasonable expenses incurred during the
- 18 course of his or her appointment or employment or other reasonable
- 19 benefits, including, but not limited to, length of service awards
- 20 or nominal fees.
- 21 (ii) "Volunteer firefighter" or "paid on-call firefighter"
- 22 means an individual who is charged with the prevention or
- 23 suppression of fires and who is directly engaged in the hazards of
- 24 firefighting or in charge of a designated fire company or companies
- 25 that are directly engaged in the hazards of firefighting on a
- 26 volunteer or paid on-call basis. Volunteer or paid on-call
- 27 firefighter does not include a full-time firefighter.
- Sec. 11. (1) Under the direction of the state fire marshal,
- 29 the council may do all of the following:

- (a) Visit and inspect any firefighter training school, or
 examine the curriculum or training procedures, for which
 application for approval has been made.
- 4 (b) Issue certificates to firefighter training schools5 qualifying under the regulations promulgated under this act.
- 6 (c) Authorize the issuance of certificates of graduation or
 7 diplomas to students who have satisfactorily completed the minimum
 8 requirements in each of the fire service courses.
- 9 (d) Cooperate with state, federal, and local fire agencies in 10 establishing and conducting local or area schools or regional 11 training centers for instruction and training of firefighters of 12 this state and its cities, counties, townships, and villages.
- (e) Make recommendations to the state fire marshal, the governor, and the legislature on matters pertaining to qualification and training of fire service members.
- 16 (f) Establish preservice basic training programs at high
 17 schools, colleges, community colleges, and universities.
- 18 (g) Require an examination in order to pass each of the fire
 19 service courses qualifying under the standards set forth in this
 20 act.
 - (h) Establish continuing education requirements for maintaining certification under this act.

- (i) Establish the requisite level of fire instructor activity to maintain certification as a fire instructor.
- (j) Establish and charge a fee to recover the cost of testing and training provided to a person an individual who is not employed by an organized fire department or public safety department of this state and who is seeking to be employed as a fire service member.
 - (k) Promulgate rules for the development, conduct, and

- 1 responsibilities of a county training committee in each county in
 2 this state.
- 3 (2) The council may allow 2 or more counties to form and
 4 jointly operate a regional training committee charged with the
 5 oversight of training needs in those counties.
- 6 (3) Fees collected under subsection (1) (j) must be deposited
 7 into the fireworks safety fund created in section 11 of the
 8 Michigan fireworks safety act, former 2011 PA 256., MCL 28.461.
- 9 Sec. 13. (1) Firefighter training provided under this act must 10 be funded by the money collected from fireworks safety fees imposed 11 under section 8 of the Michigan fireworks safety act, former 2011 12 PA 256, MCL 28.458, and the fees collected under section 11 of this act and deposited in the fireworks safety fund created in section 13 14 11 of the Michigan fireworks safety act, former 2011 PA 256. , MCL 15 28.461. The fund must be distributed to fund firefighter training 16 programs as provided in section 11 of the Michigan fireworks safety 17 act, former 2011 PA 256. , MCL 28.461.
- 18 (2) Firefighter training provided under this act may also be
 19 funded by any additional funding sources identified by the council
 20 or state fire marshal.

28 29 Sec. 14. (1) From the amount annually deposited in and appropriated to the fireworks safety fund for firefighter training under section 11 of the Michigan fireworks safety act, former 2011 PA 256, MCL 28.461, the council may request and the state fire marshal may approve annual training expenditures for the purposes of payments to the designated fiduciary of each county's training committee to fund firefighter training and provide for firefighter training equipment and other related activities required under this act. The state fire marshal may deny requests not meeting the

1 requirements of this act.

- (2) The money approved under subsection (1) must be disbursed
 to county training committees using a formula composed 70% of
 county population and 30% of square miles within the county. A
 minimum disbursement to each county training committee may be
 requested by the council and approved by the state fire marshal.
- 7 (3) The chairperson of a firefighter training committee 8 established in each county shall survey the training needs of 9 organized fire departments and public safety departments in the 10 county and shall expend money for firefighter training, firefighter 11 training equipment, or other activities required under this act as prioritized by the organized fire departments or public safety 12 departments in the county. If money distributed to a county under 13 14 this section for a fiscal year is not designated by the chairperson 15 for expenditure as provided in this subsection by the county by 16 January 1 of the fiscal year, the undesignated money must be 17 returned to the council and may be redistributed by the council 18 through the application process under section 15. The state fire marshal may deny requests for redistribution that do not meet the 19 20 requirements of this act. The council shall deposit undesignated money that is not redistributed through an application under 21 section 15 into the fireworks safety fund created in section 11 of 22 23 the Michigan fireworks safety act, former 2011 PA 256. , MCL 24 28.461.
 - (4) Money must be distributed under this section only to support training for personnel from an organized fire department or public safety department that has adhered to the standards established under this act for personnel recruited or trained by the organized fire department or public safety department during

- 1 the current and prior fiscal years and that has complied with the
- 2 incident reporting requirements under section 4 of the fire
- 3 prevention code, 1941 PA 207, MCL 29.4, during the 12 months
- 4 preceding an application made under this act.
- 5 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days
- 6 after the date it is enacted into law.
- 7 Enacting section 2. This amendatory act does not take effect
- 8 unless Senate Bill No. or House Bill No. 4891 (request no.
- 9 03102'21) of the 101st Legislature is enacted into law.
