HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 12

Reps. Cynthia Johnson, Brabec, Ellison, Aiyash, Young, Hammoud, Sowerby, Camilleri, Lasinski, Brenda Carter, Weiss, Cavanagh, Scott, Kuppa, Hood and Yancey offered the following concurrent resolution:

- 1 A concurrent resolution to support admitting Washington, D.C.
- 2 into the Union as a state of the United States of America and to
- 3 urge the United States Congress to enact legislation granting
- 4 statehood to the people of Washington, D.C.
- 5 Whereas, The people living on the land that would eventually
- 6 be designated as the District of Columbia were provided the right
- 7 to vote for representation in Congress when the U.S. Constitution
- 8 was ratified in 1788; and
- 9 Whereas, The passage of the Organic Act of 1801 placed the
- 10 District of Columbia under the exclusive authority of Congress and
- 11 abolished residents' right to vote for members of Congress and the
- 12 President and Vice President; and

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1 Whereas, Residents of the District of Columbia were granted

- 2 the right to vote for electors of the President and Vice President
- 3 through passage of the Twenty-third Amendment to the U.S.
- 4 Constitution in 1961, but they still lack full representation in
- 5 Congress; and
- 6 Whereas, As of 2020, the U.S. Census Bureau estimates that the
- 7 District of Columbia's resident population is almost 690,000,
- 8 comparable to the populations of Wyoming (576,851), Vermont
- **9** (643,077), Alaska (733,391), and North Dakota (779,094); and
- 10 Whereas, Residents of the District of Columbia share all of
- 11 the responsibilities of citizenship, including paying federal
- 12 taxes, serving on federal juries, and defending the country as
- 13 members of the U.S. Armed Forces, yet they are denied full
- 14 representation in Congress; and
- 15 Whereas, Congress has repeatedly interfered with the District
- 16 of Columbia's limited self-government by enacting laws that affect
- 17 its expenditure of locally-raised tax revenue. This interference
- 18 has included barring the use of local revenue, violating a
- 19 fundamental principle of democracy that states and local
- 20 governments are best suited to enact legislation that represents
- 21 the will of their citizens; and
- 22 Whereas, Although the District of Columbia has passed
- 23 consecutive balanced budgets since 1997, it still faces the
- 24 possibility of being shut down yearly because of congressional
- 25 deliberations over the federal budget; and
- 26 Whereas, The residents of the District of Columbia lack full
- 27 democracy, equality, and citizenship enjoyed by the residents of
- 28 the 50 states; and
- 29 Whereas, No other democratic nation denies the right of self-

1 government, including participation in its national legislature, to

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- 2 the residents of its capital. The United Nations Human Rights
- 3 Committee has called on Congress to address the District of
- 4 Columbia's lack of political equality, and the Organization of
- 5 American States has declared the disenfranchisement of District of
- 6 Columbia residents a violation of its charter agreement to which
- 7 the United States is a signatory; and
- 8 Whereas, The residents of the District of Columbia have
- 9 endorsed statehood and passed a referendum on November 8, 2016,
- 10 which favored statehood with nearly 86 percent of voters approving;
- **11** and
- 12 Whereas, It is time for Congress to act on this matter and
- 13 grant residents of Washington, D.C. the same rights enjoyed by
- 14 residents of the 50 states. District of Columbia U.S. Delegate
- 15 Eleanor Holmes Norton and Delaware U.S. Senator Tom Carper have
- 16 introduced H.R. 51 and S. 51, respectively, the Washington, D.C.
- 17 Admission Act, to admit the state of Washington, Douglass
- 18 Commonwealth into the Union; now, therefore, be it
- 19 Resolved by the House of Representatives (the Senate
- 20 concurring), That we support admitting Washington, D.C. into the
- 21 Union as a state of the United States of America and urge the
- 22 United States Congress to enact legislation granting statehood to
- 23 the people of Washington, D.C.; and be it further
- 24 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 25 President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United
- 26 States House of Representatives, and the members of the Michigan
- 27 congressional delegation.
