HOUSE RESOLUTION NO.131

Reps. Tate, Yancey, Lasinski, Rabhi and Rogers offered the following resolution:

1 A resolution to declare June 19, 2021, as Juneteenth

2 Independence Day in recognition of June 19, 1865, the date on which

3 the end of slavery was finally announced in every slave-holding

4 state in the United States.

5 Whereas, News of the end of slavery did not reach the frontier

6 areas of the United States, in particular the state of Texas and

7 the other Southwestern states, until months after the conclusion of

8 the Civil War, nearly 2.5 years after President Abraham Lincoln

9 issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863; and

10 Whereas, On June 19, 1865, Union soldiers, led by Major

11 General Gordon Granger, arrived in Galveston, Texas, with news that

12 the Civil War had ended and that the enslaved were free; and

- Whereas, African-Americans from the Southwest have continued
 the tradition of observing Juneteenth Independence Day for over 150
 years; and
- Whereas, Juneteenth Independence Day celebrations have been
 held to honor African-American freedom while encouraging self development and respect for all cultures; and
- 11 Whereas, The faith and strength of character demonstrated by
 12 former slaves and the descendants of former slaves remain an
 13 example for all people of the United States, regardless of
 14 background, religion, or race; and
- Whereas, Slavery was not officially abolished until the ratification of the 13th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States in December 1865; and
- Whereas, Over the course of its history, the United States has grown into a symbol of democracy and freedom around the world; now, therefore, be it
- Resolved by the House of Representatives, That the members of this legislative body declare June 19, 2021, as Juneteenth Independence Day in recognition of June 19, 1865, the date on which the end of slavery was finally announced in every slave-holding
