

**SUBSTITUTE FOR
SENATE BILL NO. 429**

A bill to amend 1990 PA 250, entitled
"DNA identification profiling system act,"
by amending section 6 (MCL 28.176), as amended by 2018 PA 310.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 6. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the
2 department shall permanently retain a DNA identification profile of
3 an individual obtained from a sample in the manner prescribed by
4 the department under this act if any of the following apply:

5 (a) The individual is arrested for committing or attempting to
6 commit a felony offense or an offense that would be a felony
7 offense if committed by an adult.

8 (b) The individual is convicted of or found responsible for a
9 felony or attempted felony, or any of the following misdemeanors,



1 or local ordinances that are substantially corresponding to the
2 following misdemeanors:

3 (i) A violation of section 167(1)(c), (f), or (i) of the
4 Michigan penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.167, disorderly person by
5 window peeping, engaging in indecent or obscene conduct in public,
6 or loitering in a house of ill fame or prostitution.

7 (ii) A violation of section 335a(1) of the Michigan penal code,
8 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.335a, indecent exposure.

9 (iii) A violation punishable under section 451(1) or (2) of the
10 Michigan penal code, 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.451, first and second
11 prostitution violations.

12 (iv) A violation of section 454 of the Michigan penal code,
13 1931 PA 328, MCL 750.454, leasing a house for purposes of
14 prostitution.

15 (2) The DNA identification profiles of DNA samples received
16 under this act must only be disclosed as follows:

17 (a) To a criminal justice agency for law enforcement
18 identification purposes.

19 (b) In a judicial proceeding as authorized or required by a
20 court.

21 (c) To a defendant in a criminal case if the DNA
22 identification profile is used in conjunction with a charge against
23 the defendant.

24 (d) For an academic, research, statistical analysis, or
25 protocol developmental purpose only if personal identifications are
26 removed.

27 (3) Notwithstanding subsection (1), if at the time the
28 individual is arrested, convicted of, or found responsible for the
29 violation the investigating law enforcement agency or the



1 department already has a sample from the individual that meets the
2 requirements of this act, the individual is not required to provide
3 another sample or pay the assessment required under subsection (5).

4 (4) The county sheriff or the investigating law enforcement
5 agency as ordered by the court shall provide for collecting the
6 samples required to be provided under subsection (1) in a medically
7 approved manner by qualified persons using supplies provided by the
8 department and shall forward those samples and any samples
9 described in subsection (1) that were already in the agency's
10 possession to the department after the individual from whom the
11 sample was taken has been arraigned in the district court. However,
12 the individual's DNA sample must not be forwarded to the department
13 if the individual is not charged with committing or attempting to
14 commit a felony offense or an offense that would be a felony if
15 committed by an adult. If the individual's DNA sample is forwarded
16 to the department despite the individual not having been charged as
17 described in this subsection, the law enforcement agency shall
18 notify the department to destroy that sample. The collecting and
19 forwarding of samples must be done in the manner required under
20 this act. A sample must be collected by the county sheriff or the
21 investigating law enforcement agency after arrest but before
22 sentencing or disposition as ordered by the court and promptly
23 transmitted to the department of state police after the individual
24 is charged with committing or attempting to commit a felony offense
25 or an offense that would be a felony if committed by an adult. This
26 subsection does not preclude a law enforcement agency or state
27 agency from obtaining a sample at or after sentencing or
28 disposition. At the time a DNA sample is taken from an individual
29 under this section, the individual ~~shall~~**must** be notified in



1 writing of all of the following:

2 (a) That, except as otherwise provided by law, the
3 individual's DNA sample or DNA identification profile, or both,
4 shall ~~must~~ be destroyed or expunged, as appropriate, if the charge
5 for which the sample was obtained has been dismissed or resulted in
6 acquittal, or no charge was filed within the limitations period.

7 (b) That the individual's DNA sample or DNA identification
8 profile, or both, will not be destroyed or expunged, as
9 appropriate, if the department determines that the individual from
10 whom the sample is taken is otherwise obligated to submit a sample
11 or if it is evidence relating to another individual that would
12 otherwise be retained under this section.

13 (c) That the burden is on the arresting law enforcement agency
14 and the prosecution to request the destruction or expunction of a
15 DNA sample or DNA identification profile as required under this
16 section, not on the individual.

17 (5) The court shall order each individual found responsible
18 for or convicted of 1 or more crimes listed in subsection (1) to
19 pay an assessment of \$60.00. The assessment required under this
20 subsection is in addition to any fine, costs, or other assessments
21 imposed by the court. **This subsection does not apply to a juvenile
22 within the jurisdiction of the court under section 2 of chapter
23 XIIA of the probate code of 1939, 1939 PA 288, MCL 712A.2.**

24 (6) An assessment required under subsection (5) must be
25 ordered on the record and must be listed separately in the
26 adjudication order, judgment of sentence, or order of probation.

27 (7) After reviewing a verified petition by an individual
28 against whom an assessment is imposed under subsection (5), the
29 court may suspend payment of all or part of the assessment if it



1 determines the individual is unable to pay the assessment.

2 (8) The court that imposes the assessment prescribed under
3 subsection (5) may retain 10% of all assessments or portions of
4 assessments collected for costs incurred under this section and
5 shall transmit that money to its funding unit. On the last day of
6 each month, the clerk of the court shall transmit the assessments
7 or portions of assessments collected under this section as follows:

8 (a) Twenty-five percent to the county sheriff or other
9 investigating law enforcement agency that collected the DNA sample
10 as designated by the court to defray the costs of collecting DNA
11 samples.

12 (b) Sixty-five percent to the state treasurer for deposit in
13 the justice system fund created in section 181 of the revised
14 judicature act of 1961, 1961 PA 236, MCL 600.181.

15 (9) If a sample was collected under subsection (1) from an
16 individual who does not have more than 1 conviction, and that
17 conviction was reversed by an appellate court, the sentencing court
18 shall order the disposal of the sample collected and DNA
19 identification profile record for that conviction in the manner
20 provided in subsections (12) and (13).

21 (10) Any other DNA identification profile obtained by the
22 department must not be permanently retained by the department but
23 must be retained only as long as it is needed for a criminal
24 investigation or criminal prosecution. Except as provided in
25 subsection (11), the state police forensic laboratory shall dispose
26 of a DNA sample collected under subsection (1) or a DNA
27 identification profile, or both, if any of the following
28 circumstances occur:

29 (a) The department receives a written request for disposal



1 from the investigating police agency or prosecutor indicating that
2 the sample or profile is no longer necessary for a criminal
3 investigation or criminal prosecution.

4 (b) The department receives a written request for disposal and
5 a certified copy of a final court order establishing that the
6 charge for which the sample was obtained has been dismissed or has
7 resulted in an acquittal or that no charge was filed within the
8 applicable limitations period.

9 (11) Subsection (10) does not apply if either of the following
10 circumstances exists:

11 (a) The department determines that the individual from whom
12 the sample is taken has otherwise become obligated to submit a
13 sample.

14 (b) Subsection (15) applies.

15 (12) The state police forensic laboratory shall dispose of a
16 sample and a DNA identification profile record in the following
17 manner:

18 (a) Not more than 60 days after the department receives notice
19 under subsection (10), the laboratory shall dispose of the sample
20 in compliance with section 13811 of the public health code, 1978 PA
21 368, MCL 333.13811.

22 (b) The laboratory shall dispose of the sample and the DNA
23 identification profile record in the presence of a witness.

24 (13) After disposal in accordance with subsection (12), the
25 laboratory shall make and keep a written record of the disposal,
26 signed by the individual who witnessed the disposal.

27 (14) An identification, warrant, detention, probable cause to
28 arrest, arrest, or conviction based upon a DNA match or DNA
29 information is not invalidated if it is later determined that 1 or



1 more of the following errors occurred in good faith:

2 (a) A DNA sample was erroneously obtained.

3 (b) A DNA identification profile was erroneously retained.

4 (c) A DNA sample was not disposed of or there was a delay in
5 disposing of the sample.

6 (d) A DNA identification profile was not disposed of or there
7 was a delay in disposing of the profile.

8 (15) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, the
9 department is not required to dispose of physical evidence or data
10 obtained from a sample if evidence relating to an individual other
11 than the individual from whom the sample was taken would be
12 destroyed and the evidence or data relating to the other individual
13 would otherwise be retained under this section.

14 (16) The department shall send written notice to the
15 requesting law enforcement agency, court, or prosecutor when the
16 individual's DNA sample or DNA identification profile has been
17 destroyed under this act.

18 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect July 1,
19 2024.

20 Enacting section 2. This amendatory act does not take effect
21 unless all of the following bills of the 102nd Legislature are
22 enacted into law:
