HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 143

Reps. Brixie, Arbit, Rheingans, Breen, T. Carter, Foreman, Longjohn, Wooden, B. Carter, Grant, Price, Paiz, Wilson, Edwards, Martus, Hope, MacDonell and Myers-Phillips offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution urging members of Congress to reject President
- 2 Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" in its entirety, and to
- 3 instead pursue policies that fully fund Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC,
- 4 protect vulnerable communities, expand access to healthcare,
- 5 promote clean energy, and ensure a fair and equitable tax system
- 6 for all Americans.
- 7 Whereas, The Trump Administration and congressional
- 8 Republican's support of the divisive "One Big Beautiful Bill Act"
- 9 is reprehensible. It raises costs for Michiganders, slashes
- 10 Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and
- 11 the Women, Infants and Children program (WIC), adds burdensome

- 1 hurdles to important tax relief measures for low-income households,
- 2 drives more families into poverty by giving tax cuts to the
- 3 wealthiest households, and sets back progress on a clean energy
- 4 future while increasing energy costs on Americans; and
- 5 Whereas, The Trump Administration's budget reconciliation
- 6 bill, House Bill 1, named the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act," is a
- 7 bad deal for the citizens of the U.S. and Michigan by cutting
- 8 programs that millions of citizens rely on and giving tax breaks to
- 9 multi-millionaires and billionaires; and
- 10 Whereas, President Trump and congressional Republicans have
- 11 campaigned for the past ten years on concerns regarding the
- 12 national debt but are preparing to add 2.8 trillion dollars of
- 13 additional debt to the U.S. over the next decade. This represents
- 14 an economic and national security threat to our citizens and will
- 15 burden our children and grandchildren with even more indebtedness;

- Whereas, President Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill Act" will
- 18 significantly increase the financial burden on working- and middle-
- 19 class Americans by eliminating or reducing basic needs programs;
- **20** and
- Whereas, The bill proposes deep systemic cuts to Medicaid,
- 22 jeopardizing healthcare access for millions of low-income families,
- 23 seniors, children, and individuals with disabilities; and
- 24 Whereas, Medicaid covers one in four Michiganders, with 2.6
- 25 million Michiganders receiving access to healthcare each month
- 26 through Medicaid, including one million children, 300,000 people
- 27 living with disabilities, 168,000 seniors, and 750,000 adults in
- 28 the Healthy Michigan Plan. Medicaid also covers 45 percent of all
- 29 Michigan births; and

Whereas, Medicaid is the largest health insurance program in 1 the U.S. and restricting access to this vital lifeline will 2 negatively impact the access of millions of citizens to healthcare 3 as hospitals will be forced to reduce staffing, eliminate services, 4 and close their doors, with rural hospitals, often the largest 5 6 employers, taking the hardest hit; and 7 Whereas, President Trump's legislation slashes funding for SNAP, taking away food from over 1.4 million Michiganders, 15 8 percent of our state's population, and forcing food insecurity on 9 10 vulnerable households, including children, veterans, and the 11 elderly; and Whereas, Cuts to Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC, as proposed by the 12 Trump Administration and congressional Republicans, will create an 13 estimated 2 billion dollar hole in Michigan's budget; and 14 15 Whereas, This bill takes the money cut from Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC and gives it to wealthy individuals and large corporations 16 through tax cuts, by extending the 2017 tax breaks that resulted in 17 18 benefits for the wealthiest ten percent and rising costs for the bottom 90 percent; and 19 20 Whereas, The bill increases the Child Tax Credit only for the wealthiest of families and leaves 20 million children in working 21 families with no additional benefit and receiving less or no 22 23 healthcare or food support, pushing more families especially those 24 with children into poverty; and 25 Whereas, Millions of families that rely on the Earned Income Tax Credit will now have additional burdensome hurdles to receiving 26 27 their benefits, hindering and stifling families from rising out of 28 poverty; and

Whereas, The legislation seeks to eliminate or scale back

- 1 resources for clean energy projects, undermining climate goals,
- 2 exacerbating the effects of climate change, stifling innovation,
- 3 and threatening progress toward a sustainable and environmentally
- 4 secure future; and
- 5 Whereas, An independent analysis estimates that the
- 6 congressional Republicans' bill will raise the cost of energy
- 7 prices for households and businesses by nearly seven percent by
- 8 2026, equating to approximately 110 dollars for the average
- 9 American household, nearly canceling out any benefit for working
- 10 class families; now, therefore, be it
- 11 Resolved by the House of Representatives, That we urge members
- 12 of Congress to reject this legislation in its entirety, and to
- 13 instead pursue policies that fully fund Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC,
- 14 protect vulnerable communities, expand access to healthcare,
- 15 promote clean energy, and ensure a fair and equitable tax system
- 16 for all Americans; and be it further
- 17 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 18 President of the United States, the President of the United States
- 19 Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives,
- 20 and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.
