## SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 64

Senator Cherry offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution to condemn the Trump Administration and
- 2 congressional Republican's support of the divisive "One Big
- 3 Beautiful Bill Act" that raises costs for Michiganders, slashes
- 4 Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and
- 5 the Women, Infants and Children program (WIC), adds burdensome
- 6 hurdles to important tax relief measures for low-income households,
- 7 drives more families into poverty by giving tax cuts to the most
- 8 wealthy households, and sets back progress on a clean energy future
- 9 while increasing energy costs on Americans.
- 10 Whereas, The Trump Administration's budget reconciliation
- 11 bill, House Resolution 1, named the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act,"
- 12 is a raw deal for the citizens of the United States (U.S.) and
- 13 Michigan by cutting programs that millions of citizens rely on and
- 14 gives tax breaks to multi-millionaires and billionaires; and

          Whereas, The bill proposes deep systematic cuts to Medicaid,
    jeopardizing healthcare access for millions of low-income families,

    seniors, children, and individuals with disabilities; and

          Whereas, Medicaid covers one in four Michiganders, with 2.6

    million Michiganders receiving access to healthcare each month
16
    through Medicaid, including one million children (Medicaid covers
17
    45 percent of all Michigan births), 300,000 people living with
    disabilities, 168,000 seniors, and 750,000 adults in the Healthy

    Michigan Plan; and

          Whereas, Medicaid is the largest health insurance program in
    the U.S. and restricting access to this vital lifeline will
21
    negatively impact the access of millions of citizens to healthcare

    as hospitals will be forced to reduce staffing, eliminate services,

    and close their doors, with rural hospitals, often the largest

    employers, taking the hardest hit; and
          Whereas, President Trump's legislation slashes funding for

    SNAP, taking away food from over 1.4 million Michiganders (15
    percent of our state's population), and forcing food insecurity on

    vulnerable households, including children, veterans, and the

- 2 Whereas, Cuts to Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC, as proposed by the

- 3 Trump Administration and congressional Republicans, will create an
- 4 estimated \$2 billion hole in Michigan's budget; and
- 5 Whereas, This bill takes the money cut from Medicaid, SNAP,
- 6 and WIC and gives it to wealthy individuals and large corporations
- 7 through tax cuts, by extending the 2017 tax cuts that resulted in
- 8 benefits to the wealthiest 10 percent and rising costs for the
- 9 bottom 90 percent from President Trump's tariffs and slashing of
- 10 basic needs programs; and
- 11 Whereas, The bill increases the Child Tax Credit only for the
- 12 wealthiest of families and leaves 20 million children in working
- 13 families with no additional benefit and receiving less (or no)
- 14 health care or food support, pushing more families (especially
- 15 those with children) into poverty; and
- 16 Whereas, Millions of families that rely on the Earned Income
- 17 Tax Credit will now have additional burdensome hurdles to receiving
- 18 their benefits, hindering and stifling families from rising out of
- 19 poverty; and
- 20 Whereas, The legislation seeks to eliminate or scale back
- 21 resources for clean energy projects, undermining climate goals,
- 22 exacerbating the effects of climate change, stifling innovation,
- 23 and threatening progress toward a sustainable and environmentally
- 24 secure future; and
- 25 Whereas, An independent analysis estimates that the
- 26 congressional Republicans' bill will raise the cost of energy
- 27 prices for households and businesses by nearly seven percent by
- 28 2026, equating to approximately \$110 for the average American
- 29 household, nearly canceling out any benefit for working class

- 1 families; now, therefore, be it
- 2 Resolved by the Senate, That the members of this legislative
- 3 body condemn the Trump Administration and congressional
- 4 Republican's support of the divisive "One Big Beautiful Bill Act"
- 5 that raises costs for Michiganders, slashes Medicaid, the
- 6 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), and the Women,
- 7 Infants and Children program (WIC), adds burdensome hurdles to
- 8 important tax relief measures for low-income households, drives
- 9 more families into poverty by giving tax cuts to the most wealthy
- 10 households, and sets back progress on a clean energy future while
- 11 increasing energy costs on Americans; and be it further
- 12 Resolved, That we urge members of Congress to reject this
- 13 legislation in its entirety, and to instead pursue policies that
- 14 fully fund Medicaid, SNAP, and WIC, protect vulnerable communities,
- 15 expand access to healthcare, promote clean energy, and ensure a
- 16 fair and equitable tax system for all Americans; and be it further
- 17 Resolved, That copies of this resolution be transmitted to the
- 18 President of the United States, the President of the United States
- 19 Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives,
- 20 and the members of the Michigan congressional delegation.
